







## DESIGN FOR TUMBLER.

Specification forming part of Design No. **7,241**, dated March 10, 1874; application filed February 4, 1874.  
[Term of Patent  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, STEWART MCKEE, of Pittsburg, in the county of Allegheny and in the State of Pennsylvania, have invented certain new and useful Design for Tumblers; and do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings and to the letters of reference marked thereon, making a part of this specification.

My design relates to that class of small tumblers known as "bar" tumblers, in which the exterior lower part is formed with a series of flutes, which extend from the base a short distance upward; and it consists in the design, as hereinafter described, and shown in the accompanying drawing.

Figure 1 represents a side elevation; Fig. 2, a sectional view, and Fig. 3 a bottom view.

A represents the tumbler, the exterior circumference, at the bottom, having a bevel, *a*. From the top of this bevel extend upward, all around the tumbler, a series of small, short, deep concaves, B B, as shown. In a tumbler

whose height is three and a half inches and diameter three inches, there are formed twelve flutes, B, of about one inch in height, beginning from the top edge of the bevel *a*, the greatest depth of these flutes being about one-sixteenth of an inch.

The number, size, and depth of these flutes are to be regulated in accordance with the size of the tumbler; hence I do not confine myself to either the size of the tumbler or the number, height, or depth of the flutes.

What I claim is—

The within-described design for tumblers, consisting of the body A, short deep concaves B, and bevel *a*, substantially as shown and described.
