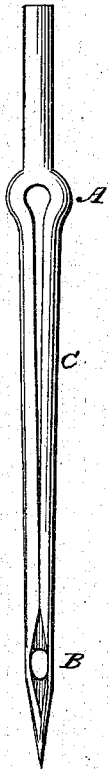
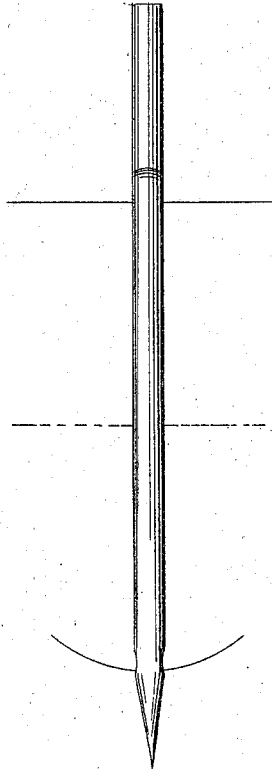

IMPROVEMENT IN NEEDLE FOR SEWING-MACHINE.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern :

Be it known that I, CHARLES R. S. CURTIS, of Quincy, in the county of Adams and State of Illinois, have invented a new and valuable Improvement in Sewing-machine Needles; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the construction and operation of the same, reference being had to the annexed drawings making a part of this specification, and to the letters and figures of reference marked thereon.

The object of my invention is to construct a sewing-machine needle that can be more easily threaded than any similar device heretofore known or used.

To this end I construct a needle in the form shown on the drawings, and especially set forth by Figure 1.

The letter A on said figure is a representation of a large eye, formed by an enlargement of the needle near its upper extremity.

Letter B is a small eye near the point of the needle, in which the thread is held when the needle is at work.

Letter C is a slit extending from the large eye A, to the small eye B, and entering the eye B on one side thereof.

There is a groove on one side of my needle, also extending from eye A to eye B.

My device is operated as follows:

When I desire to thread the needle, I pass the end of the thread through the large eye A. I then take hold of the thread on each side of the needle and force it down the slit C until it reaches and rests in the eye B.

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The sewing-machine needle herein described, having the large upper eye A, and the small lower eye B, connected by the slit C, as described, and for the purpose specified.
