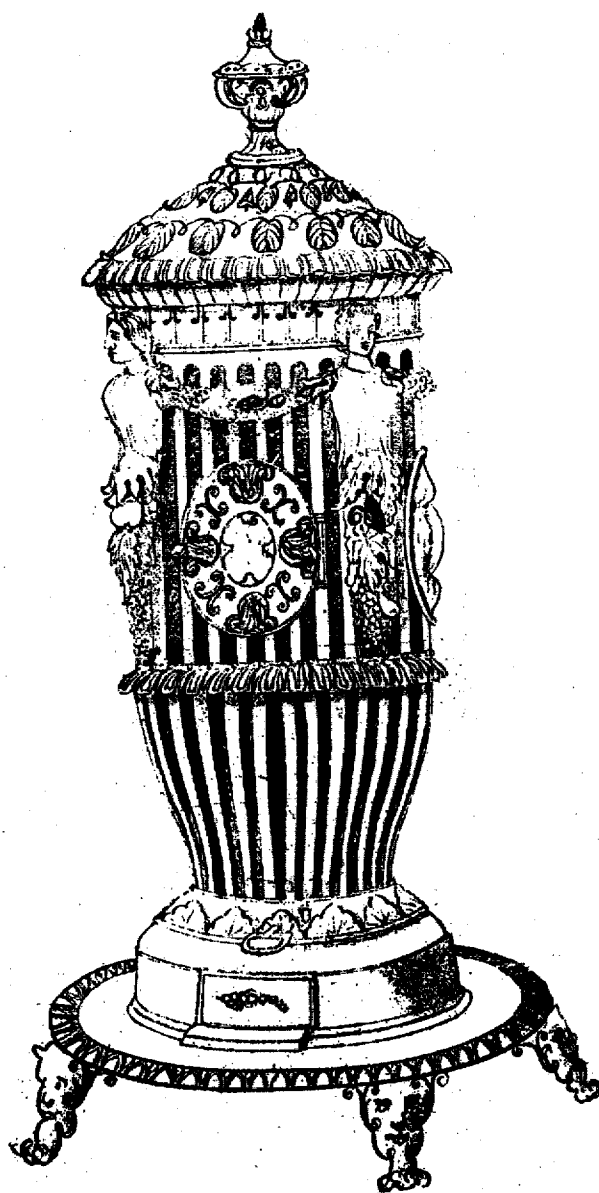

The schedule referred to in these Letters Patent, and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we John Hauffbauer & Henry Maas, of Cincinnati; and County of Hamilton, and State of Ohio, have made a new design for stoves, and we do hereby declare that the following is a full and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawing.

The nature of our design consists in the distinct arrangement of the ornaments, the combination and arrangement of the ornaments being distinct, and different from any design for a stove heretofore known.

To enable others skilled in the art, to make and use our design, we will proceed to describe its form and arrangement.

On the top of our design stands an ornamental urn, finished by a nut or pineapple ornament. The remaining portion of the top, below, is in the shape of a truncated cone, ornamented with leaves and running vines, and finished by a projecting edge of Grecian shell ornament, under which there is a carved ovole, which finishes with the body of the stove which is cylindrical and deeply fluted, and surmounted by ornaments in alto relievo, one of which is elliptic, with shell and scroll ornaments. The other is the human figure as low as the waist, and continued downwards by fruit-leaves, and wreaths of fruit-leaves and flowers, depending from shoulder

to shoulder of the figure. That part of the body of the stove whose sides are parallel to each other is now continued downward by a projecting moulding of grecian shell, below which a portion of the stove is fluted, and narrows toward the bottom in the shape of an ogee, when it again projects with an ovole, surrounded by a leaf ornament. The stove is then continued downward and outward by a plain ovole, thence continued downward to the bottom by straight sides, and finishing to the bottom with an ovole base mould. The bottom now spreads to six inches, more or less, and finishes on the edge by an ornamental rim. Each foot of the stove of the stove represents the face and part of an animal, terminated on the sides by scroll ornaments.

What we claim as our invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is the combination of the different ornaments as represented in the drawing.

We do not claim any of the ornaments, but simply the general design and arrangement of the ornaments.
