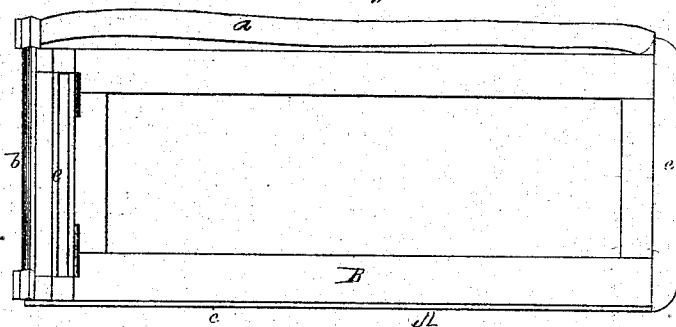

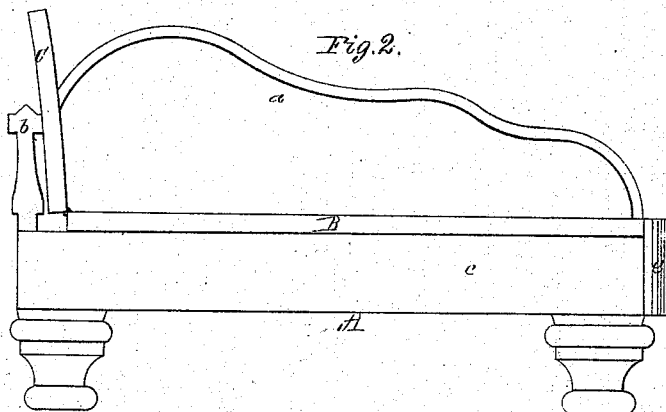

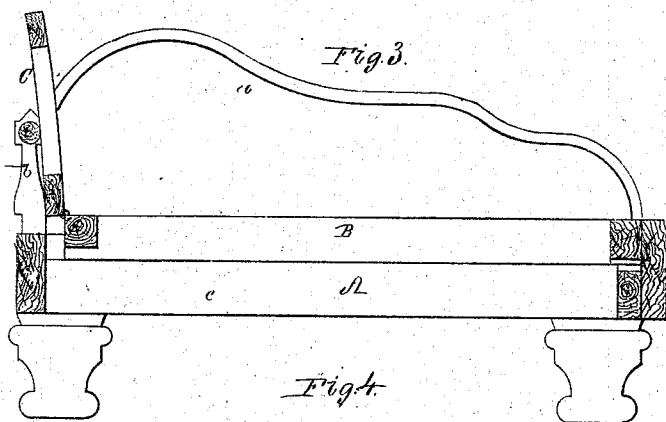
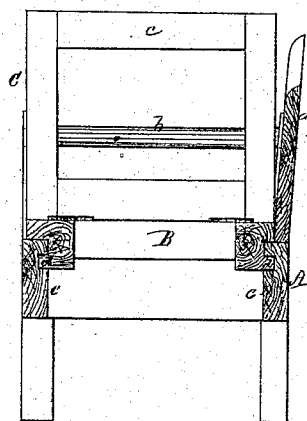

IMPROVEMENT IN EXTENSION LOUNGES.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all persons to whom these presents may come:

Be it known that I, JOHN SHEARER PAINE, of Cambridge, of the county of Middlesex and State of Massachusetts, have invented an Improved Extension Lounge; and do hereby declare the same to be fully described in the following specification and represented in the accompanying drawing, of which—

Figure 1 is a top view;

Figure 2, a front elevation;

Figure 3, a longitudinal section; and

Figure 4, a transverse section of the frame of such lounge and the extension parts thereto belonging.

In the drawing—

A denotes the frame made in the ordinary way, with a back, *a*, and arm-rest *b*, and having the bottom parallel bars *c c* grooved on their inner faces, to receive tongues *d d*, projecting from an extension seat-frame B.

The said seat-frame B has a length about equal to that of the frame A, and is provided with lips *d d*, to project in opposite directions, and over the tops of the side bars of the bottom frame, in manner as shown.

The seat-frame also has a finishing board, *e*, applied to its foot or outer end, and extended down to the depth of the bottom frame.

Furthermore, there is hinged or applied to the inner or head end of the extension seat-frame another or

auxiliary frame, C, which, when the seat-frame is "in," stands vertically or about so against the arm-rest.

By drawing the seat-frame sufficiently out of the frame A, the frame C may be inclined upon the arm-rest, or it may be laid down into a horizontal position, the whole being to effect the extension of the lounge in order that it may be used as a bed, and to support the legs and body of a person.

The seat-frame B and the auxiliary frame C are to be upholstered or cushioned. The same may be said with respect to the back, in order to complete the lounge.

If desirable, the arm-rest may also be cushioned or upholstered.

I am aware that it is not new to make a lounge with a frame or slide at its foot, to draw out therefrom for the support of a cushion, and therefore I make no claim thereto.

What I claim is—

The improved extension lounge, as composed of the frame A with its arm-rest and back, and the seat-frame B, and the auxiliary frame C, all constructed, arranged, and applied together, substantially in manner and to operate as described.
