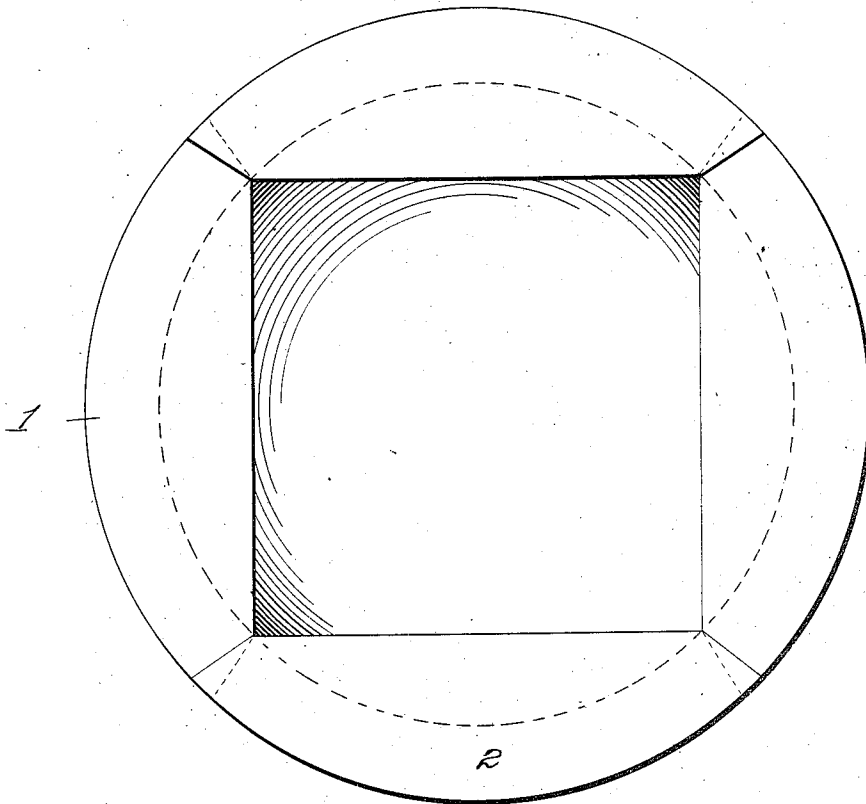
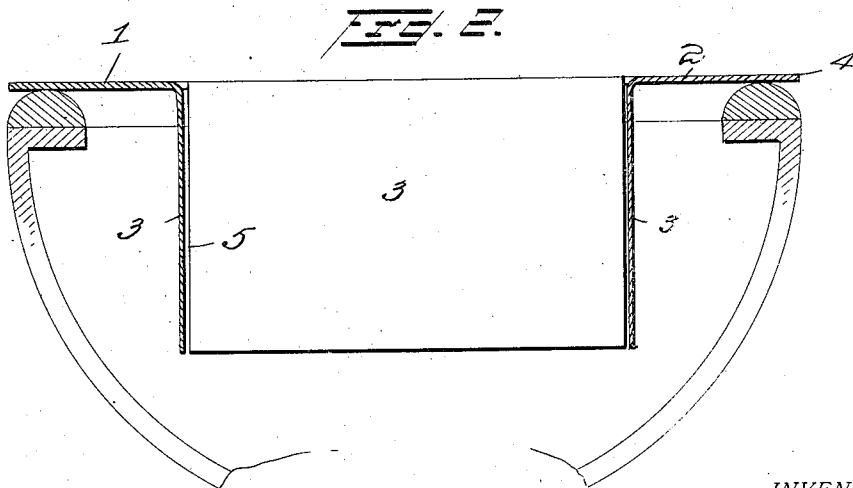

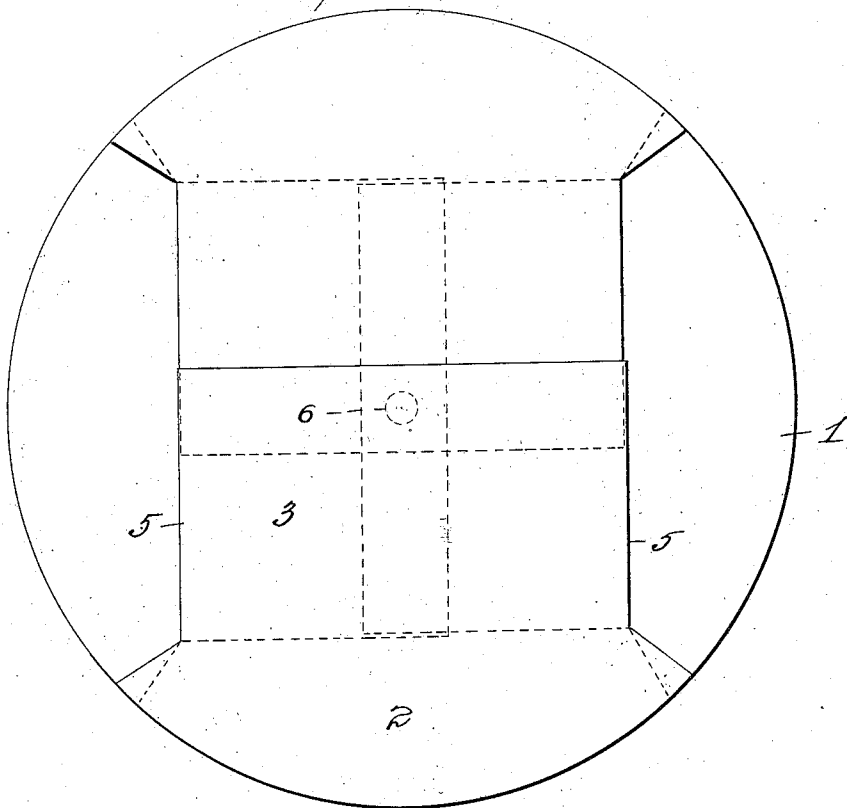
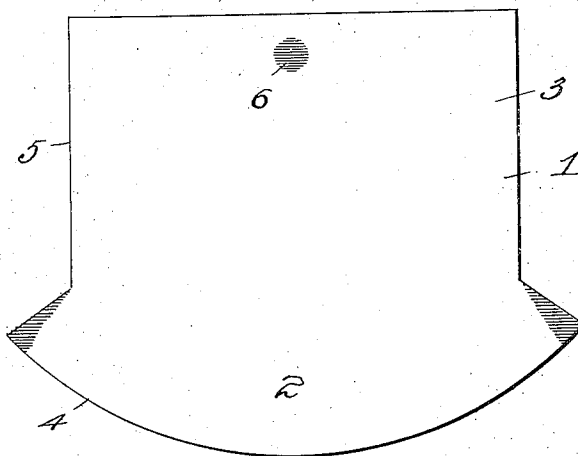

SEAT-COVER.

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To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, CHARLIE C. FAUST and JOHN ANDREW JOYNER, citizens of the United States, residing at Reeves, in the parish of Calcasieu and State of Louisiana, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Seat-Covers, of which the following is a specification.

This invention has relation to covers for closet seats and has for its object to provide a simple cover adapted to be applied to the seat for the purpose of preventing the person of a user of the seat from coming in contact with the same.

With the above object in view the cover consists of paper blanks suitably secured together, and having inner portions normally connected together by a seal. When the cover is in use this seal is broken so that portions of the blanks may rest upon the closet seat, and other portions of the blanks may hang down through the opening of the seat.

In the accompanying drawings:—Figure 1 is a plan view of the closet seat. Fig. 2 is a transverse sectional view of the same. Fig. 3 is a plan view of the cover. Fig. 4 is a side elevation of one of the blanks of the cover.

The cover consists of blanks which are four in number. These blanks are of the same configuration and a description for one will answer for all. Each blank consists of a marginal portion 2 and an inner portion 3. The marginal portions 2 are preferably provided with incurvate edges 4 and the inner portions 3 are provided with edges 5 which are disposed at angles with relation to each other.

To form the cover the edges of the marginal portions 2 are secured together by paste or glue, and the edges of the inner portions 3 are permitted to overlap each

other, as clearly shown in Fig. 3. The inner portions 3 are provided with a seal 6 which may be mucilage or other adhesive. The inner ends of the portions 3 are connected together, but the side edges of the portions 3 are disconnected from each other. Advertising or other reading matter may be printed upon the marginal portions 2.

To apply the cover to a closet seat, the seal is broken and the marginal portions 2 are permitted to rest upon the seat, and the portions 3 are permitted to hang down through the opening in the seat. Thus when a person uses the seat no part of the body comes in contact with the seat, and consequently any filth or germs which may be upon the seat does not come in contact with the body. After the seat has been used the cover may be employed for wiping the person and then may be thrown down into the bowl.

Having described the invention, what is claimed is:—

1. A seat cover comprising blanks of uniform configuration, said blanks having marginal portions connected together and overlapping inner portions with means for temporarily holding the inner portions together.

2. A seat cover comprising blanks of uniform configuration, said blanks having marginal portions connected together, and provided with inner portions having angularly disposed edges, the inner portions overlapping each other and a seal for securing the inner portions of the blanks together.
