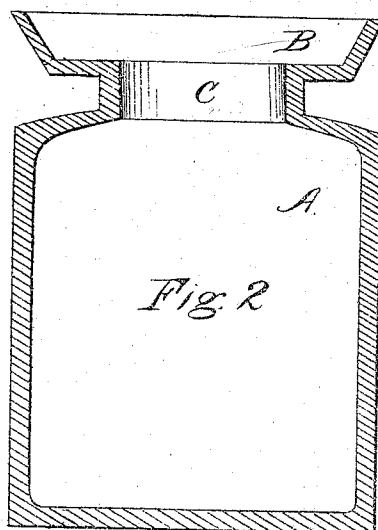
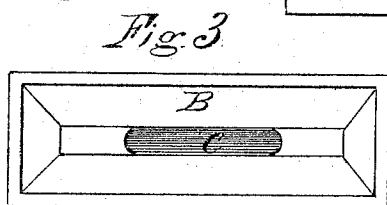
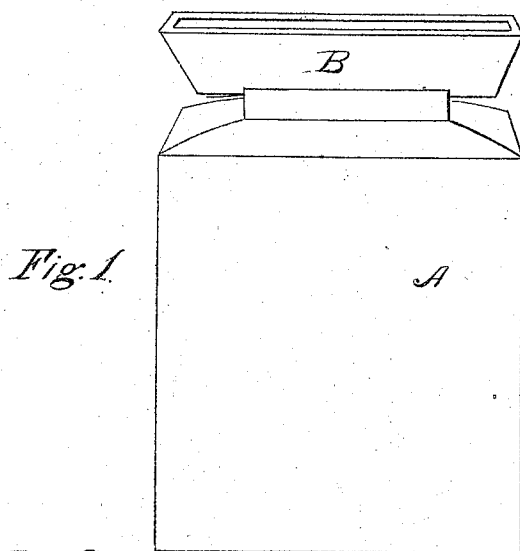

IMPROVEMENT IN TOILET-BOTTLES FOR TOOTH-POWDERS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 118,163, dated August 15, 1871.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WARREN A. SPALDING, of Waterbury, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new and Improved Toilet-Bottle, of which the following is a specification:

My invention relates to the construction of bottles for tooth-powders or other substances that are to be used with a brush; and it consists in providing the bottle with a funnel-shaped trough or spout around the orifice which shall be capable of receiving a brush upon which the powder is to be placed for use, so that the required quantity shall be taken upon the brush without wasting any or soiling the person or dress of the user.

Figure 1 is a side view of my improved bottle. Fig. 2 is a vertical section. Fig. 3 is a top view.

The bottle A is made with a trough, B, upon its neck and surrounding the orifice C, through

which the powder issues. This trough is to receive the brush when powder is to be used on it, and is so made with inclined sides that brushes of different sizes may fit in it and prevent any powder from dropping out around the brush when the bottle is inverted. The shape of the trough and its arrangement with regard to the bottle and its orifice is clearly shown in the drawing.

I claim—

As a new and improved article of manufacture, a toilet-bottle constructed with a cup or cavity, B, for a brush, upon which the powder is distributed for use, substantially as and for the purposes set forth and specified.
