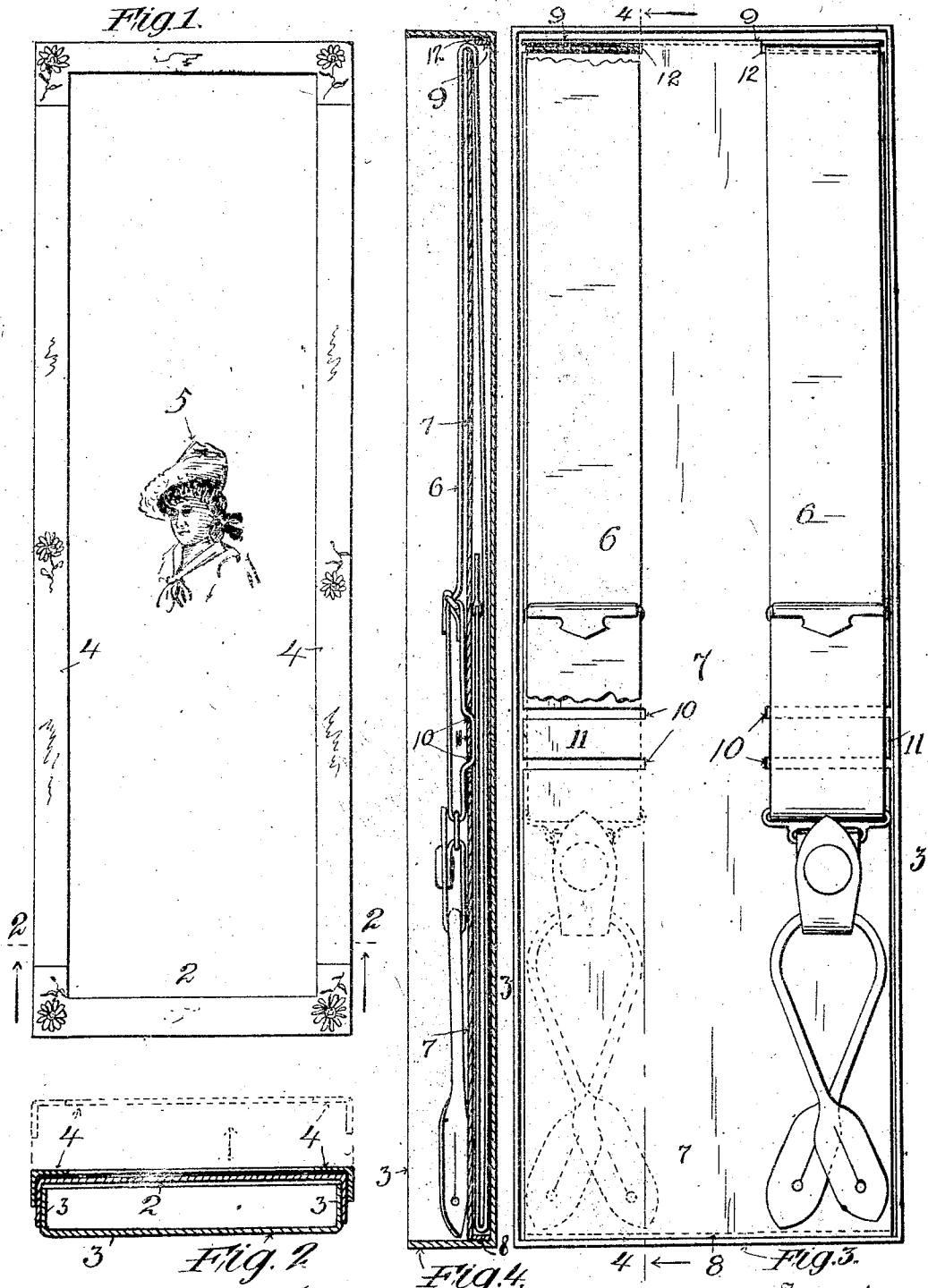

DISPLAY-BOX.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ISAAC W. LEVI, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Display-Boxes, of which the following is a specification.

The object of my invention is to provide a neat and attractive box which will be highly ornamental in appearance and which will display suspenders to the best advantage. This object is accomplished by my invention, one embodiment of which is hereinafter described.

For a more particular description of my invention reference is to be had to the accompanying drawings forming a part hereto, in which—

Figure 1 is a plan view of my improved box in its closed condition. Fig. 2 is a sectional view taken on the line 2—2 of Fig. 1, looking in the direction of the arrows. Fig. 3 is a plan view of the box with upper parts of a suspender broken away to more clearly reveal the structure. Fig. 4 is a sectional view taken on the line 4—4 of Fig. 3 looking in the direction of the arrows. Fig. 5 shows a portion of the supporting means for the suspenders.

Throughout the various views of the drawings, similar reference characters designate similar parts.

My improved box 1 has a cover 2 and a bottom 3, the character 1 being used generically to designate the entire structure. The cover 2 is surrounded by a border or frame 4 which is angular in cross section and highly ornamental in character so as to set off the picture 5 on the cover 2 or to display the goods more advantageously in the bottom 3 when the cover 2 is removed. This border or frame 4 is an independent entity and can be physically removed from

one box and placed on another of the same size. Its presence adds greatly to the appearance of the box.

The suspenders 6 are supported in the bottom 3 in the following manner: The support 7 has short ends 8 and 9 bent so as to rest snug against the bottom as shown in Fig. 4 and thereby hold the support 7 which is practically a false bottom. This support 7 has a pair of slots 10 at each edge and not quite at the middle and preferably placed substantially as shown. These slots 10 form tongues 11 at each edge which take into a portion of the suspender and hold the same in the box and yet are entirely concealed. Adjacent to the folded end 9 of the support 7 are slots 12 through which portions of the suspender pass when the same is placed in the box so that the parts on the support 7 lie smooth and even.

While I have shown and described one embodiment of my invention it is obvious that it is not limited thereto as the details may be varied without departing from its spirit.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim is—

In a device of the class described, a bottom with a support therein adapted to secure a pair of suspenders, said support having two pairs of parallel slots, ends at right angles to the main body of the support and slots near one of said ends through which portions of the suspenders displayed in the box are adapted to pass.
