

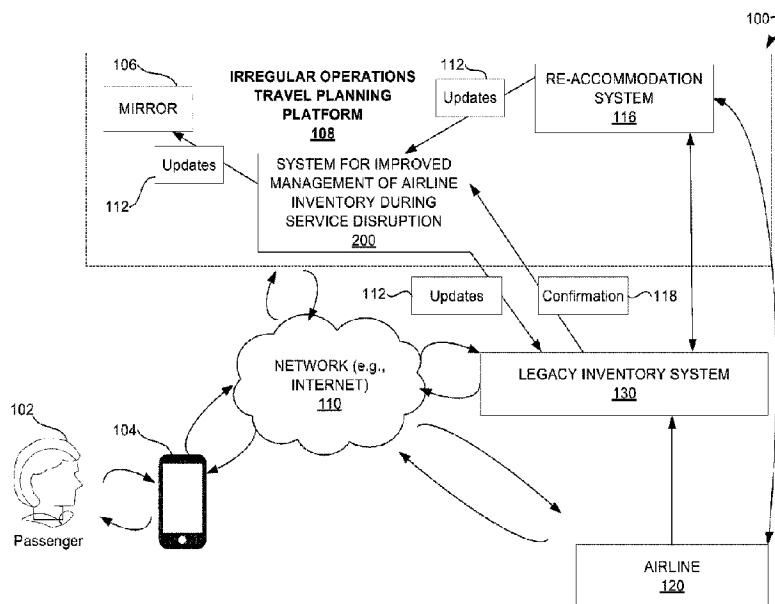
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(54) **Title:** THROTTLING SOLUTIONS INTO A LEGACY INVENTORY SYSTEM DURING A SERVICE DISRUPTION



A method for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption is described. The method comprises receiving, at a mirror of a legacy inventory system, one or more updates from a re-accommodation system. The mirror is populated with the one or more updates. The method proceeds with communicating the one or more updates to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate. The one or more updates communicated to the legacy inventory system are flagged as pending update. A confirmation that the one or more records are updated in the legacy inventory system is received. The confirmation indicates synchronization of the mirror and legacy inventory system. In response to the confirmation, the one or more updates are unflagged in the mirror. Statistical evaluation of the inventory is provided based on the one or more updates in the mirror.

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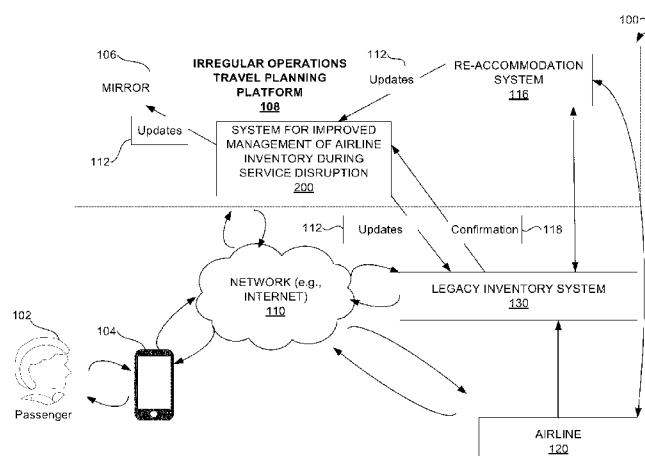

(57) Abstract: A method for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption is described. The method comprises receiving, at a mirror of a legacy inventory system, one or more updates from a re-accommodation system. The mirror is populated with the one or more updates. The method proceeds with communicating the one or more updates to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate. The one or more updates communicated to the legacy inventory system are flagged as pending update. A confirmation that the one or more records are updated in the legacy inventory system is received. The confirmation indicates synchronization of the mirror and legacy inventory system. In response to the confirmation, the one or more updates are unflagged in the mirror. Statistical evaluation of the inventory is provided based on the one or more updates in the mirror.

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THROTTLING SOLUTIONS INTO A LEGACY INVENTORY SYSTEM DURING A SERVICE DISRUPTION

CROSS-REFERENCE TO RELATED APPLICATIONS

[0001] The present utility patent application is related to and claims priority benefit of the U.S. provisional application No. 62/066,281, filed on October 20, 2014.

TECHNICAL FIELD

[0002] The present disclosure relates generally to data processing, and, more particularly, to methods and systems for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption.

BACKGROUND

[0003] Use of computerized systems in the travel and hospitality industries is advantageous both for customers and for suppliers. Computerized reservation systems facilitate storing and retrieving information as well as conducting transactions related to air travel, hotels, car rentals, and other activities. However, conventional systems have some limitations, including limited content, legacy environment, latency, and scalability. Additionally, conventional computerized systems used in the travel and hospitality industries serve limited areas of suppliers operations. Some operations are performed by operators, which makes such operations time-consuming and inefficient.

[0004] A computerized reservation system includes several components to manage different transportation areas. An airline inventory can be used to define *[continued]*

how many seats are available on a particular flight (e.g. aircrafts, crew, and passenger name records) and is conventionally managed by a legacy inventory system. The legacy inventory system can suffer from several limitations, some of which are direct consequence of its architecture. One of these limitations is the performance of the inventory system and its limited ability to update passenger name records (PNRs) during an increased activity. These limitations can become a serious bottleneck when airline operations are affected by weather conditions, flight delays, flight cancellations, airport shutdowns, and other service disruptions. Delays in passenger re-accommodation and schedule modifications can aggravate the effect of service disruptions. The reason for this is that the legacy inventory system cannot update its inventory at a rate sufficient to handle large number of changes created by a modern system. For example, a modern re-accommodation system creates solutions for passengers at up to 100,000 or more PNR changes in just a few minutes, while the legacy inventory system can process only up to 50,000 transactions an hour. Since these changes cannot be throttled into the legacy inventory system in under an hour, the state of the inventory is unknown until the update process is complete.

[0005] Moreover, while the legacy system update is in progress, external requests for inventory can be granted and further degrade the re-accommodation process, thereby resulting in failures for many transactions associated with a re-accommodation solution. Additionally, further solutions may be run against the inventory, the status of which may be unknown. Any solution generated is likely to override the current solution being throttled, thereby introducing further confusion into the system.

SUMMARY

[0007] According to one example embodiment of the disclosure, system for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption is provided. The system for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption can include at least one mirror of a legacy inventory system and at least one processor in communication with the at least one mirror. The at least one mirror may be configured to receive one or more updates from a re-accommodation system. The one or more updates may be associated with one or more records of an inventory. The processor may be configured to populate the mirror with the one or more updates. Additionally, the processor may communicate the one or more updates to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate. The one or more updates communicated to the legacy inventory system may be flagged as pending update. Furthermore, the processor may receive a confirmation that the one or more records are updated in the legacy inventory system. The confirmation may indicate synchronization of the mirror and the legacy inventory system. In response to the confirmation, the processor may unflag the one or more updates in the mirror.

[0010] FIG. 1 illustrates an environment within which the systems and methods for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption can be implemented.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION

[0017] The following detailed description includes references to the accompanying drawings, which form a part of the detailed description. The drawings show illustrations in accordance with exemplary embodiments. These exemplary embodiments, which are also referred to herein as “examples,” are described in enough detail to enable those skilled in the art to practice the present subject matter. The embodiments can be combined, other embodiments can be utilized, or structural, logical, and electrical changes can be made without departing from the scope of what is claimed. The following detailed description is, therefore, not to be taken in a limiting sense, and the scope is defined by the appended claims and their equivalents.

[0018] In air transportation, accuracy of airline inventory and its management are significant, while difficult to obtain. Volume and complexity of airline inventory does not allow determining its exact status even under normal operating conditions. One of the reasons for that can be an uncertainty about the exact number of passengers who show up for a flight. Since the knowledge of the inventory is statistical (no absolutely accurate information of the state of the inventory), it can be assumed that there is some level of error, which can be called “Internal Systems Error of the Architecture.”

[0019] Moreover, weather conditions, flight delays, flight cancellations, airport shutdowns, and other reasons may impact one or more flights and cause service disruptions in passenger journeys or itineraries. When this occurs, internal system error can increase. Re-accommodation actions, including passenger re-accommodation, alternative itineraries, re-planning for scheduling and finance, re-allocating an aircraft and crew, maintenance, and other actions provide updates to the itinerary, which require quick generation and implementation. Additionally,

consistent and coherent management of the inventory is of great importance.

Otherwise, the inventory and known data about the itinerary degrade.

[0020] The methods and system for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption described herein can significantly reduce the error and keep a coherent management of inventory through changes in schedules and various demands placed on the inventory. For this purpose, re-accommodation actions can be directed for processing to a mirror of the legacy inventory system. Corresponding changes can be introduced in the mirror and then communicated to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate. Changes communicated to the legacy inventory system can be flagged. When certain changes are introduced to the legacy inventory system, these changes can be unflagged in the mirror.

[0021] FIG. 1 illustrates an environment 100 within which the systems and methods for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption can be implemented, in accordance to some embodiments. The environment 100 may include a legacy inventory system 130 and an irregular operations travel planning platform (IROPS platform) 108. The IROPS platform 108 may include systems aimed at increasing efficiency of the legacy inventory system 130 and providing additional features and data. For the purpose of this disclosure, the IROPS platform 108 includes at least a re-accommodation system 116 and a system 200 for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption. Both systems 116 and 200 handle issues related to service disruption caused by weather conditions, flight delay, flight cancellation, schedule modifications, information, and so forth. The re-accommodation system 116 generates passenger re-accommodation solutions and communicates with the system 200 for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption and with the legacy inventory system 130 managing inventory of an airline 120. The

system 200 for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption can communicate with a mirror 106 of the legacy inventory system 130. Even though FIG. 1 shows only one mirror 106, there can be two or more mirrors 106 communicating with the legacy inventory system 130 and the re-accommodation system 116.

[0022] The re-accommodation system 116 may receive airline events related to service disruptions. This information may be received from the airline 120 or from a network 110. The network 110 may include the Internet or any other network capable of communicating data between devices. Suitable networks may include or interface with any one or more of, for instance, a local intranet, a PAN (Personal Area Network), a LAN (Local Area Network), a WAN (Wide Area Network), a MAN (Metropolitan Area Network), a virtual private network (VPN), a storage area network (SAN), a frame relay connection, an Advanced Intelligent Network (AIN) connection, a synchronous optical network (SONET) connection, a digital T1, T3, E1 or E3 line, Digital Data Service (DDS) connection, DSL (Digital Subscriber Line) connection, an Ethernet connection, an ISDN (Integrated Services Digital Network) line, a dial-up port such as a V.90, V.34 or V.34bis analog modem connection, a cable modem, an ATM (Asynchronous Transfer Mode) connection, or an FDDI (Fiber Distributed Data Interface) or CDDI (Copper Distributed Data Interface) connection. Furthermore, communications may also include links to any of a variety of wireless networks, including WAP (Wireless Application Protocol), GPRS (General Packet Radio Service), GSM (Global System for Mobile Communication), CDMA (Code Division Multiple Access) or TDMA (Time Division Multiple Access), cellular phone networks, GPS (Global Positioning System), CDPD (cellular digital packet data), RIM (Research in Motion, Limited) duplex paging network, Bluetooth radio, or an IEEE 802.11-based radio frequency network. The network 110 can further include or

interface with any one or more of an RS-232 serial connection, an IEEE-1394 (Firewire) connection, a Fiber Channel connection, an IrDA (infrared) port, a SCSI (Small Computer Systems Interface) connection, a Universal Serial Bus (USB) connection or other wired or wireless, digital or analog interface or connection, mesh or Digi® networking. The network 110 may include any suitable number and type of devices (e.g., routers and switches) for forwarding data between the systems and/or airline 120.

[0023] Additionally, the re-accommodation system 116 may receive data related to passenger, event triggers, transportation information, and other data from the airline 120 or from other sources. The data received may include personal data of each passenger (e.g. a PNR, passenger route data, passenger status, and so forth).

[0024] Based on the airline events, the re-accommodation system 116 may generate re-accommodation solutions for passengers affected by service disruption. The re-accommodation solutions may be provided to a passenger 102 for approval via a client device 104 (e.g., smartphone, tablet PC, and laptop) associated with the passenger. The response of the passenger 102 to the re-accommodation solution may be received and corresponding updates 112 to the inventory may be generated.

[0025] Updates 112 to the inventory associated with re-accommodation solutions may be sent to the system 200 for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption. The system 200 for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption sends the updates 112 to the mirror 106 and to the legacy inventory system 130. Communications of the updates 112 to the legacy inventory system 130 can be throttled at a controlled rate. The updates 112 sent to the legacy inventory system 130 can be flagged as pending update until a confirmation 118 that the updates 112 were performed in the legacy inventory system 130 is received. After the confirmation 118 is received, the updates 112 are unflagged

in the mirror 106. While the updates are throttled into the legacy inventory system 130, the re-accommodation system 116 may utilize data associated with the updates on the mirror 106 as an inventory of record. External booking requests may be processed using the data of the inventory of record on the mirror 106.

[0026] FIG. 2 is a block diagram showing various modules of the system 200 for improved management of airline inventory during service disruption, in accordance with certain embodiments. The system 200 for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption may comprise a mirror 210 of the legacy inventory system, a processor 220, and an optional database 230. The mirror 210 may duplicate the legacy inventory system and include all inventory data stored in the legacy inventory system, but without limitations of the legacy inventory system (e.g., performance and processing speed limitations). The mirror 210 may be configured to receive one or more updates from a re-accommodation system, wherein the one or more updates are associated with one or more records. The processor 220 may include a programmable processor, such as a microcontroller, central processing unit (CPU), and so forth. In other embodiments, the processor 220 may include an application-specific integrated circuit (ASIC) or programmable logic array (PLA), such as a field programmable gate array (FPGA), designed to implement the functions performed by the system 200. Thus, the processor 220 may populate the mirror with the one or more updates associated with service disruption. The processor 220 may communicate the one or more updates to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate. The one or more updates communicated to the legacy inventory system may be flagged by the processor 220 as pending update. Furthermore, the processor 220 may receive a confirmation that the one or more records are updated in the legacy inventory system. The confirmation may indicate synchronization of the mirror and the legacy inventory system. In response to the

confirmation, the processor 220 may unflag the one or more updates in the mirror 210. Additionally, the processor 220 may perform statistical evaluation of the inventory based on the one or more updates in the mirror and provide the statistical evaluation, for example, to an operation via a display of a client device associated with the operator. If the one or more updates of the records have failed, the processor 220 may receive a rejection associated with the one or more records. In response to the rejection, the processor 220 may update the mirror 210 to invalidate the one or more updates in the mirror 210. After the invalidation of the one or more updates, the one or more records may be returned to a state assigned to the one or more records before the one or more updates and added to a queue for generation of further updates. The database 230 may be configured to store at least data associated with the one or more updates, confirmations, rejections, and so forth.

[0027] FIG. 3 is a process flow diagram showing a method 300 for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption within the environment described with reference to FIG. 1. The method 300 may commence with receiving updates from a re-accommodation system at the mirror of the legacy inventory system at operation 302. The updates may be generated by the re-accommodation system and may represent re-accommodation of one or more passengers affected by a service disruption. At operation 304, the updates may be populated into the mirror. Additionally, at operation 306, the updates may be communicated to the legacy inventory system. Considering the limitations of the legacy inventory system, the updates are communicated to the legacy inventory system gradually, at a controlled rate. The updates that are communicated to the legacy inventory system may be flagged as pending updates at operation 306.

[0028] When the updates at the legacy inventory system are done, a confirmation is received at operation 308. The confirmation indicates synchronization of the

mirror and the legacy inventory system. Thus, in response to the confirmation, the updates may be unflagged in the mirror at operation 310. When the inventory on the mirror and in the legacy inventory system is synchronized, statistical evaluation of inventory based on the updates in the mirror may be provided at operation 312.

[0029] FIG. 4 shows a representation 400 of populating the mirror 406 with updates and submitting the updates to the legacy inventory system 402 via a legacy inventory system middleware 404. Updates of PNRs may be throttled into the legacy inventory system 402 at a controlled rate and provided to a mirror 406. Updates in the mirror 406 may be flagged as pending update. When a particular PNR is updated in the legacy inventory system 402, a confirmation of the update of the PNR may be sent to the IROPS platform. When the confirmation is received, the pending update flag for that PNR may be removed.

[0030] Any transactions included in the updates that do not succeed may be returned as failed. Rejects 410 associated with failed transactions may be communicated to a re-accommodation engine 412 via the legacy inventory system middleware 404. Additionally, the mirror 406 may be updated to invalidate re-accommodation solution 414. The PNR associated with the failed transaction may be returned to its previous state and added to a passenger re-protection queue 408 for repeated generation of the re-accommodation solution 414.

[0031] New service disruption events may utilize the mirror 406 together with the updates as the system and inventory of record. Thus, latency time of throttling the legacy inventory system 402 may be avoided. The mirror 406 may provide robust and coherent inventory.

[0032] FIG. 5 shows a representation 500 of forwarding inventory requests to a mirror 506 to avoid overriding a re-accommodation solution 514, in accordance with some embodiments. Part of the problem of maintaining control over the inventory is

synchronizing the re-accommodation solution 514, as it is throttled into a legacy inventory system 502, with external bookings that rely on the legacy inventory system 502 for information concerning availability. In order to avoid external bookings, the re-accommodation solution 514 and/or legacy inventory system inventory requests 516 associated with the external bookings may request information about the inventory from the IROPS platform, specifically, mirror 506. The mirror 506 may provide synchronized data to a re-accommodation engine 512, which generates the re-accommodation solution 514.

[0033] FIG. 6 shows a representation 600 of interactions with passengers concerning a re-accommodation solution 614 generated by a re-accommodation engine 612, in accordance to some embodiments. Inventory errors can be associated with the timing of when passengers are notified of their offers and the time it takes for them to respond (Accept/Reject) to the offers 620.

[0034] The longer the latency time in making an offer for re-protection, the smaller the number of offers that may be provided. The decrease in the number of offers may be caused by accepting certain offers by other passengers. Correspondingly, the uptake of offers may be diminished.

[0035] If the passengers do not respond or are slow in responding, then even if they are accepting the offer for re-protection, the airline has less information about its inventory. It is quite possible that with, for example, 100,000 solutions sent to passengers, 30,000 passengers may reject offers; and of the 70,000 who accept the offer, a substantial portion may already have alternative arrangements for their travel.

[0036] Instant communications with the passengers with timed responses is important since the passengers control the inventory. Therefore, the re-accommodation solution 614 may be provided to the passengers, for example, via

mobile phone notifications, e-mails, automated calls, and so forth. The passengers may have a predefined period of time to accept one of the provided options.

Information concerning passenger acceptance, rejection, or lack of action within the predefined time may be submitted to the re-accommodation engine 612. Even if 80% of the passengers respond, the re-accommodation solution 614 may be implemented.

[0037] Since the re-accommodation solution 614 is associated with the IROPS platform, the legacy inventory system 602 may have no data concerning the re-accommodation solution 614. However, the mirror 606 may have this data, since the mirror 606 may be up to date. Thus, the re-accommodation solution 614 may be implemented in the mirror 606. Furthermore, although there may be certain errors (e.g., 20%) from the passengers who have not responded, the error may be ignored, since a statistical extent to which the platform can rebook is known (no responses).

[0038] FIG. 7 shows a diagrammatic representation of a machine in the example electronic form of a computer system 700, within which a set of instructions for causing the machine to perform any one or more of the methodologies discussed herein may be executed. In various example embodiments, the machine operates as a standalone device or may be connected (e.g., networked) to other machines. In a networked deployment, the machine may operate in the capacity of a server or a client machine in a server-client network environment, or as a peer machine in a peer-to-peer (or distributed) network environment. The machine may be a PC, a tablet PC, a set-top box, a cellular telephone, a portable music player (e.g., a portable hard drive audio device such as an Moving Picture Experts Group Audio Layer 3 (MP3) player), a web appliance, a network router, switch or bridge, or any machine capable of executing a set of instructions (sequential or otherwise) that specify actions to be taken by that machine. Further, while only a single machine is illustrated, the term “machine” shall also be taken to include any collection of

The main memory 706 and the processors 702 may also constitute machine-readable media.

[0041] The instructions 722 may further be transmitted or received over a network via the network interface device 712 utilizing any one of a number of well-known transfer protocols (e.g., Hyper Text Transfer Protocol).

[0042] In some embodiments, the computer system 700 may be implemented as a cloud-based computing environment, such as a virtual machine operating within a computing cloud. In other embodiments, the computer system 700 may itself include a cloud-based computing environment, where the functionalities of the computer system 700 are executed in a distributed fashion. Thus, the computer system 700, when configured as a computing cloud, may include pluralities of computing devices in various forms, as will be described in greater detail below.

[0050] These computer program instructions may also be stored in a computer readable medium that can direct a computer, other programmable data processing apparatus, or other devices to function in a particular manner, such that the instructions stored in the computer readable medium produce an article of manufacture including instructions which implement the function/act specified in the flowchart and/or block diagram block or blocks.

[0051] Thus, computer-implemented methods and systems for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption are described.

Although embodiments have been described with reference to specific exemplary embodiments, it will be evident that various modifications and changes can be made to these exemplary embodiments without departing from the broader spirit and scope of the present application. Accordingly, the specification and drawings are to be regarded in an illustrative rather than a restrictive sense.

CLAIMS

What is claimed is:

- 1. A method for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption, the method comprising:**

receiving, at a mirror of a legacy inventory system, one or more updates from a re-accommodation system, wherein the one or more updates are associated with one or more records;

populating, by at least one processor, the mirror with the one or more updates;

communicating, by the at least one processor, the one or more updates to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate;

flagging, by the at least one processor, the one or more updates

communicated to the legacy inventory system as pending update;

receiving, by the at least one processor, a confirmation that the one or more records are updated in the legacy inventory system, the confirmation indicating synchronization of the mirror and legacy inventory system;

in response to the confirmation, unflagging, by the at least one processor, the one or more updates in the mirror;

wherein the one or more updates are associated with re-accommodation of one or more passengers affected by the service disruption.

- 2. The method of claim 1, further comprising generating, by the re-accommodation system, the one or more updates.**

- 3. The method of claim 1 or claim 2 further comprising:**

statistically evaluating, by the at least one processor, the airline inventory based on the one or more updates in the mirror; and

providing, by the at least one processor via at least one display, the statistical evaluation of the airline inventory.

4. The method of any one of claims 1 to 3 further comprising:

receiving, by the at least one processor, a rejection associated with a record of the one or more records, the rejection indicating a failure to update the record in the legacy inventory system; and

in response to the rejection, updating, by the at least one processor, the mirror to invalidate the one or more updates for the record in the mirror.

5. The method of claim 4, wherein the record is returned to a state assigned to the record before the one or more updates.

6. The method of claim 4 or 5, further comprising adding, by the at least one processor, the record to a queue for generation of further one or more updates.

7. The method of any one of claims 1 to 6, wherein the re-accommodation system utilizes data of the one or more updates on the mirror as an inventory of record to generate further one or more updates for a further service disruption.

8. The method of any one of claims 1 to 7, wherein one or more inventory requests are associated with one or more external bookings request information concerning availability of the airline inventory from the mirror.

9. A system for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption, the system comprising:

at least one mirror of a legacy inventory system configured to receive one or more updates from a re-accommodation system, wherein the one or more updates are associated with one or more records; and

at least one processor in communication with the at least one mirror, the at least one processor configured to:

populate the mirror with the one or more updates;

communicate the one or more updates to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate;

flag the one or more updates communicated to the legacy inventory system as pending update;

receive a confirmation that the one or more records are updated in the legacy inventory system, the confirmation indicating synchronization of the mirror and the legacy inventory system; and

in response to the confirmation, unflag the one or more updates in the mirror;

wherein the one or more updates are associated with re-accommodation of one or more passengers affected by the service disruption.

10. The system of claim 9, wherein the re-accommodation system is operable to communicate with the at least one mirror of the legacy inventory system and to generate the one or more updates.

11. The system of claim 9 or 10, wherein the at least one processor is further configured to:

statistically evaluate the airline inventory based on the one or more updates in the mirror; and

provide the statistical evaluation of the airline inventory for representation on at least one display.

12. The system of any one of claims 9 to 11, wherein the at least one processor is further configured to:

receive a rejection associated with a record of the one or more records, the rejection indicating a failure to update the record in the legacy inventory system; and

in response to the rejection, update the mirror to invalidate the one or more updates for the record in the mirror.

13. The system of claim 12, wherein the record is returned to a state assigned to the record before the one or more updates.

14. The system of claim 12 or 13, wherein the at least one processor is further configured to add the record to a queue for generation of further one or more updates.

15. The system of any one of claims 9 to 14, wherein the re-accommodation system utilizes data on the mirror as an inventory of record to generate further one or more updates for a further service disruption.

16. The system of claim 15, wherein the data communicated to the re-accommodation system includes the one or more updates.

17. The system of any one of claims 9 to 16, wherein a reservation system utilizes data on the mirror as an inventory of record to provide information on availability of the airline inventory.

18. The system of any one of claims 9 to 17, wherein one or more inventory requests associated with one or more external bookings request information about availability of the airline inventory from the mirror.

19. A non-transitory processor-readable medium having instructions stored thereon, which when executed by one or more processors, cause the one or more processors to implement a method for improved management of an airline inventory during a service disruption comprising steps of:

receiving, at a mirror of a legacy inventory system, one or more updates from a re-accommodation system, wherein the one or more updates are associated with one or more records;

populating the mirror with the one or more updates;

communicating the one or more updates to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate;

flagging the one or more updates communicated to the legacy inventory system as pending update;

receiving a confirmation that the one or more records are updated in the legacy inventory system, the confirmation indicating synchronization of the mirror and legacy inventory system; and

in response to the confirmation, unflagging the one or more updates in the mirror;

wherein the one or more updates are associated with re-accommodation of one or more passengers affected by the service disruption.

20. The non-transitory processor-readable medium of claim 19, wherein the steps further comprise generating, by the re-accommodation system, the one or more updates.

21. The non-transitory processor-readable medium of claim 19 or 20, wherein the steps further comprise:

statistically evaluating the airline inventory based on the one or more updates in the mirror; and
providing the statistical evaluation of the airline inventory via at least one display.

22. The non-transitory processor-readable medium of any one of claims 19 to 21, wherein the steps further comprise:

receiving a rejection associated with a record of the one or more records, the rejection indicating a failure to update the record in the legacy inventory system; and
in response to the rejection, updating the mirror to invalidate the one or more updates for the record in the mirror.

23. The non-transitory processor-readable medium of claim 22, wherein the record is returned to a state assigned to the record before the one or more updates.

24. The non-transitory processor-readable medium of claim 22 or 23, wherein the steps further comprise adding the record to a queue for generation of further one or more updates.

25. The non-transitory processor-readable medium of any one of claims 19 to 24, wherein the re-accommodation system utilizes data of the one or more updates on the mirror as an inventory of record to generate further one or more updates for a further service disruption.

26. The non-transitory processor-readable medium of any one of claims 19 to 25, wherein one or more inventory requests are associated with one or more external bookings request information concerning availability of the airline inventory from the mirror.

27. A method comprising:

receiving, by a mirror of a legacy inventory system and from a re-accommodation system, an update associated with a record;
populating the mirror of the legacy inventory system with the update associated with the record;

communicating the update to the legacy inventory system;

flagging the update communicated to the legacy inventory system as a pending update;

receiving a confirmation indicating that the record was updated in the legacy inventory system and indicating synchronization of the mirror and the legacy inventory system; and

after receiving the confirmation, unflagging the update in the mirror of the legacy inventory system.

28. The method of claim 27, comprising throttling communications to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate.

29. The method of claim 28, comprising: while the communications to the legacy inventory system are throttled at the controlled rate, using data associated with the update on the mirror as an inventory of record.

30. The method of any one of claims 27 to 29, comprising: processing an external booking request using the inventory of record on the mirror.

31. The method of any one of claims 27 to 30, comprising: duplicating, to the mirror of the legacy inventory system, all inventory data stored in the legacy inventory system.

32. The method of any one of claims 27 to 31, comprising: performing statistical evaluation of inventory based on the update in the mirror.

33. The method of claim 32, comprising: providing the statistical evaluation of the inventory to a display of a client device.

34. The method of any one of claims 27 to 33, comprising:

determining whether the update associated with the record has failed; and

after determining that the update associated with the record has failed, receiving a rejection associated with the record.

35. One or more non-transitory computer-readable media storing instructions that, when executed by one or more processors, cause a system to:

receive, from a re-accommodation system, an update associated with a record;
populate a mirror of a legacy inventory system with the update associated with the record;
communicate the update to the legacy inventory system;
flag the update communicated to the legacy inventory system as a pending update;
receive a confirmation indicating that the record was updated in the legacy inventory system and
indicating synchronization of the mirror and the legacy inventory system; and
after receiving the confirmation, unflag the update in the mirror of the legacy inventory system.

36. The one or more non-transitory computer-readable media of claim 35, wherein the instructions, when executed, cause the system to: throttle communications to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate.

37. The one or more non-transitory computer-readable media of claim 36, wherein the instructions, when executed, cause the system to:

while the communications to the legacy inventory system are throttled at the controlled rate, use data associated with the update on the mirror as an inventory of record; and

process an external booking request using the inventory of record on the mirror.

38. The one or more non-transitory computer-readable media of any one of claims 35 to 37, wherein the instructions, when executed, cause the system to: duplicate, to the mirror of the legacy inventory system, all inventory data stored in the legacy inventory system.

39. The one or more non-transitory computer-readable media of any one of claims 35 to 38, wherein the instructions, when executed, cause the system to:

perform statistical evaluation of inventory based on the update in the mirror; and

provide the statistical evaluation of the inventory to a display of a client device.

40. The one or more non-transitory computer-readable media of any one of claims 35 to 39, wherein the instructions, when executed, cause the system to:

determine whether the update associated with the record has failed; and

after determining that the update associated with the record has failed, receive a rejection associated with the record.

41. A system comprising:

a legacy inventory system; and

a mirror of the legacy inventory system, the mirror comprising: one or more processors; and memory storing instructions that, when executed by the one or more processors, cause the mirror to:

receive, from a re-accommodation system, an update associated with a record;

populate the mirror with the update associated with the record;

communicate the update to the legacy inventory system;

flag the update communicated to the legacy inventory system as a pending update;

receive a confirmation indicating that the record was updated in the legacy inventory system and indicating synchronization of the mirror and the legacy inventory system; and

after receiving the confirmation, unflag the update in the mirror.

42. The system of claim 41, wherein the instructions of the memory of the mirror, when executed, cause the mirror to: throttle communications to the legacy inventory system at a controlled rate.

43. The system of claim 42, wherein the instructions of the memory of the mirror, when executed, cause the mirror to:

while the communications to the legacy inventory system are throttled at the controlled rate, use data associated with the update on the mirror as an inventory of record; and

process an external booking request using the inventory of record on the mirror.

44. The system of any one of claims 41 to 43, wherein the instructions of the memory of the mirror, when executed, cause the mirror to: duplicate, to the mirror of the legacy inventory system, all inventory data stored in the legacy inventory system.

45. The system of any one of claims 41 to 44, wherein the instructions of the memory of the mirror, when executed, cause the mirror to:

perform statistical evaluation of inventory based on the update in the mirror; and

provide the statistical evaluation of the inventory to a display of a client device.

46. The system any one of claims 41 to 45, wherein the instructions of the memory of the mirror, when executed, cause the mirror to:

determine whether the update associated with the record has failed; and after determining that the update associated with the record has failed, receive a rejection associated with the record

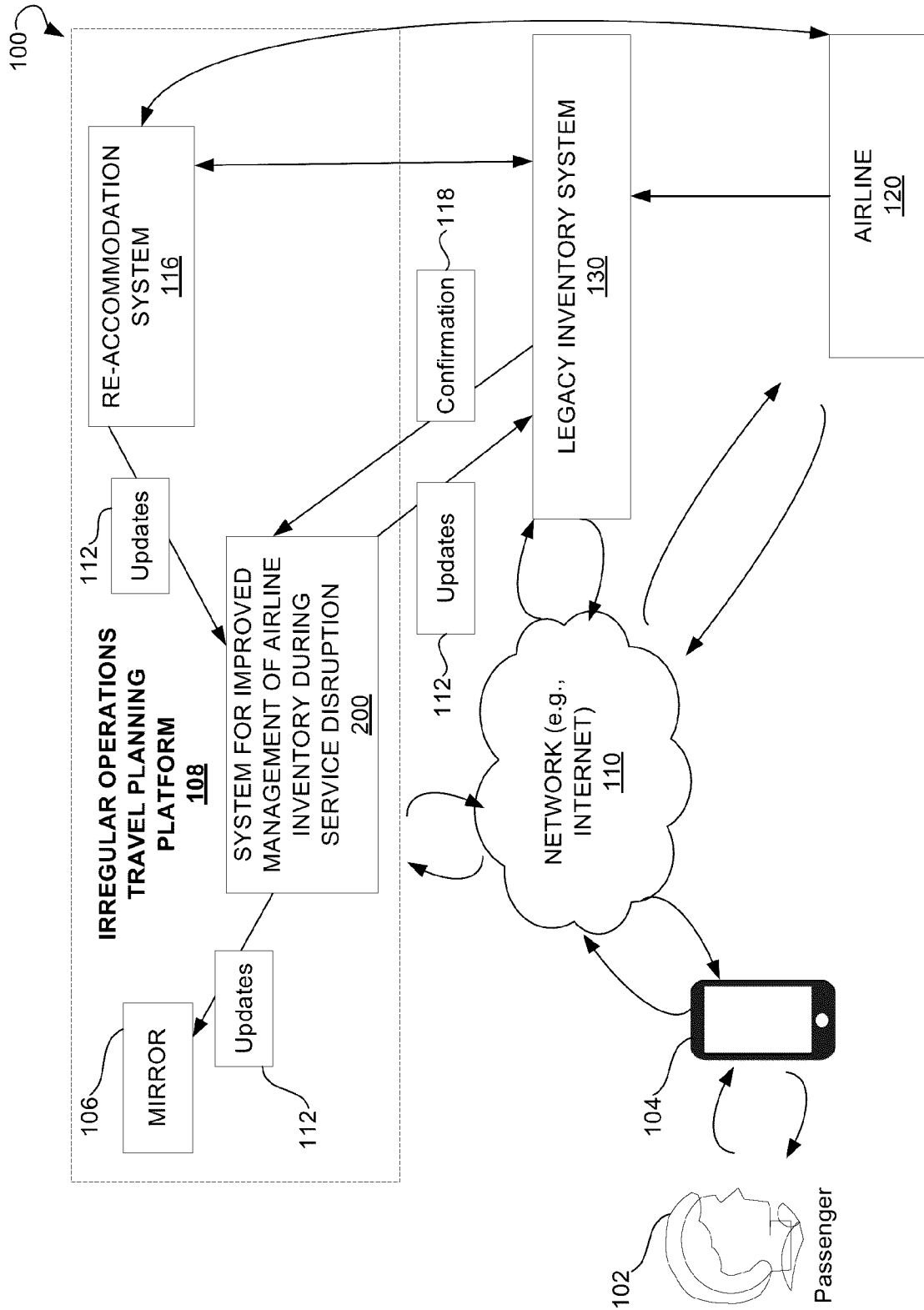

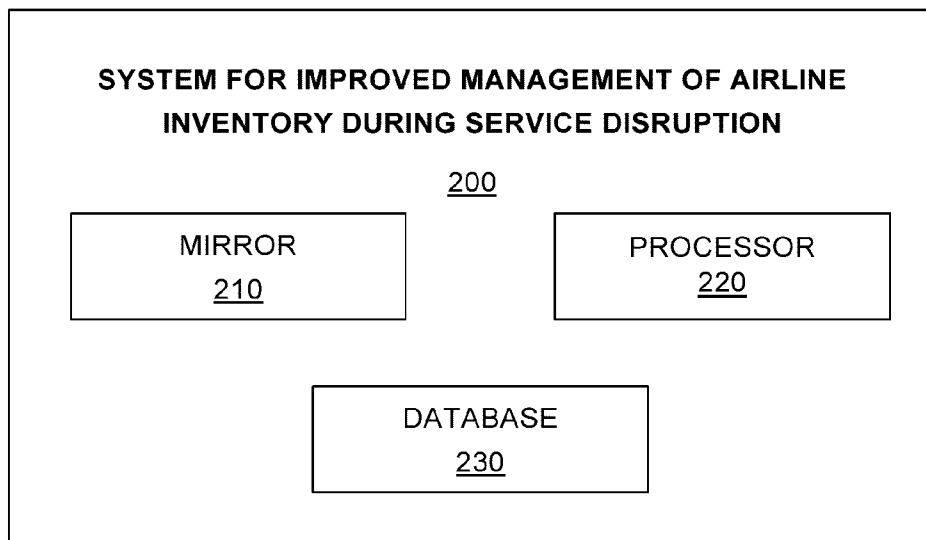

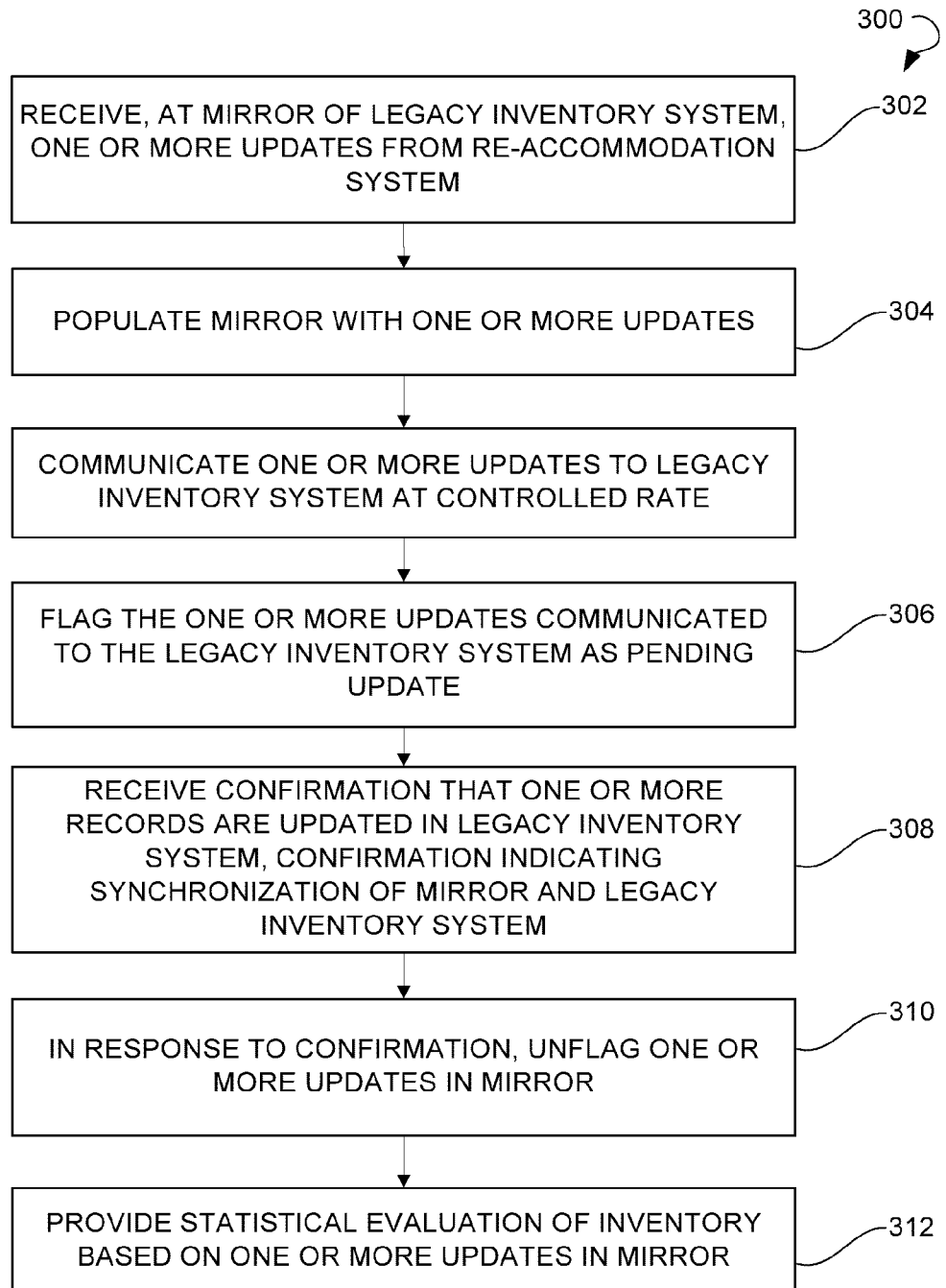

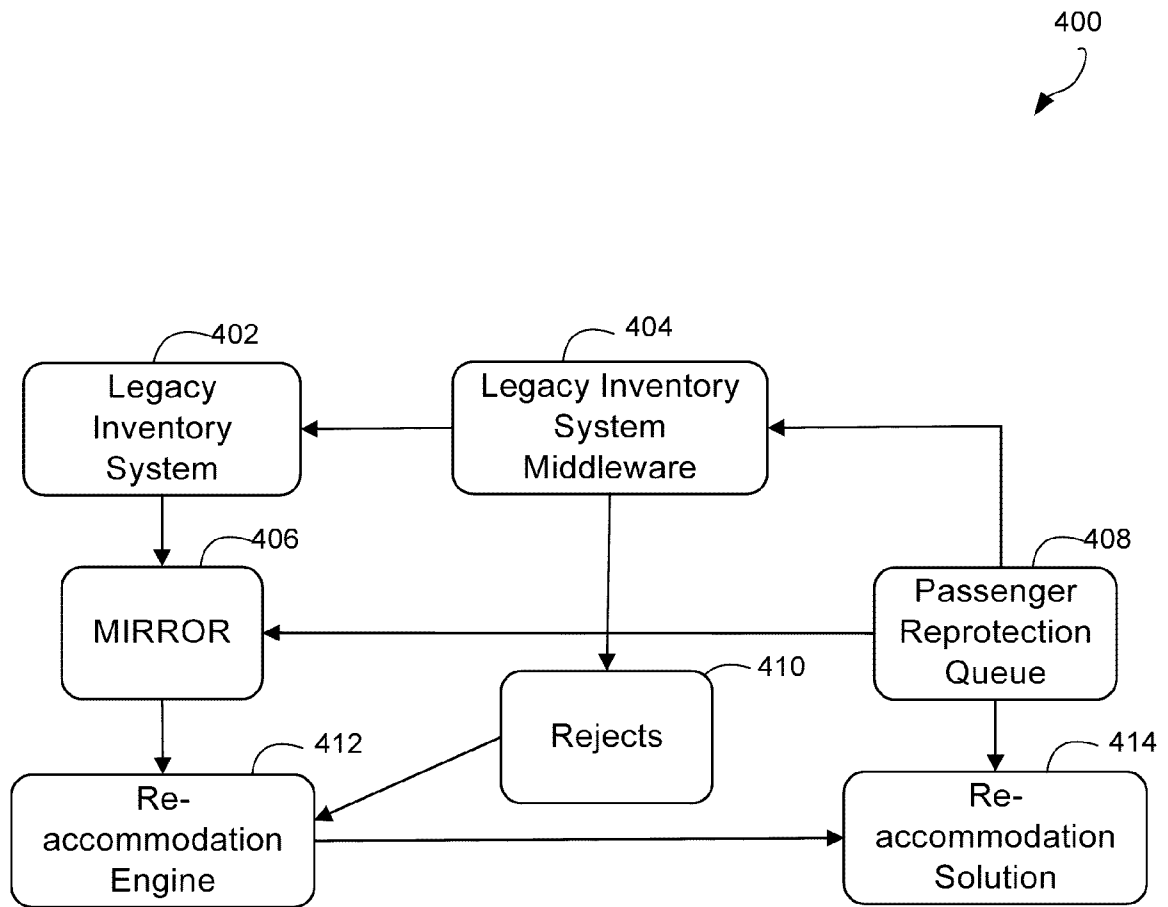

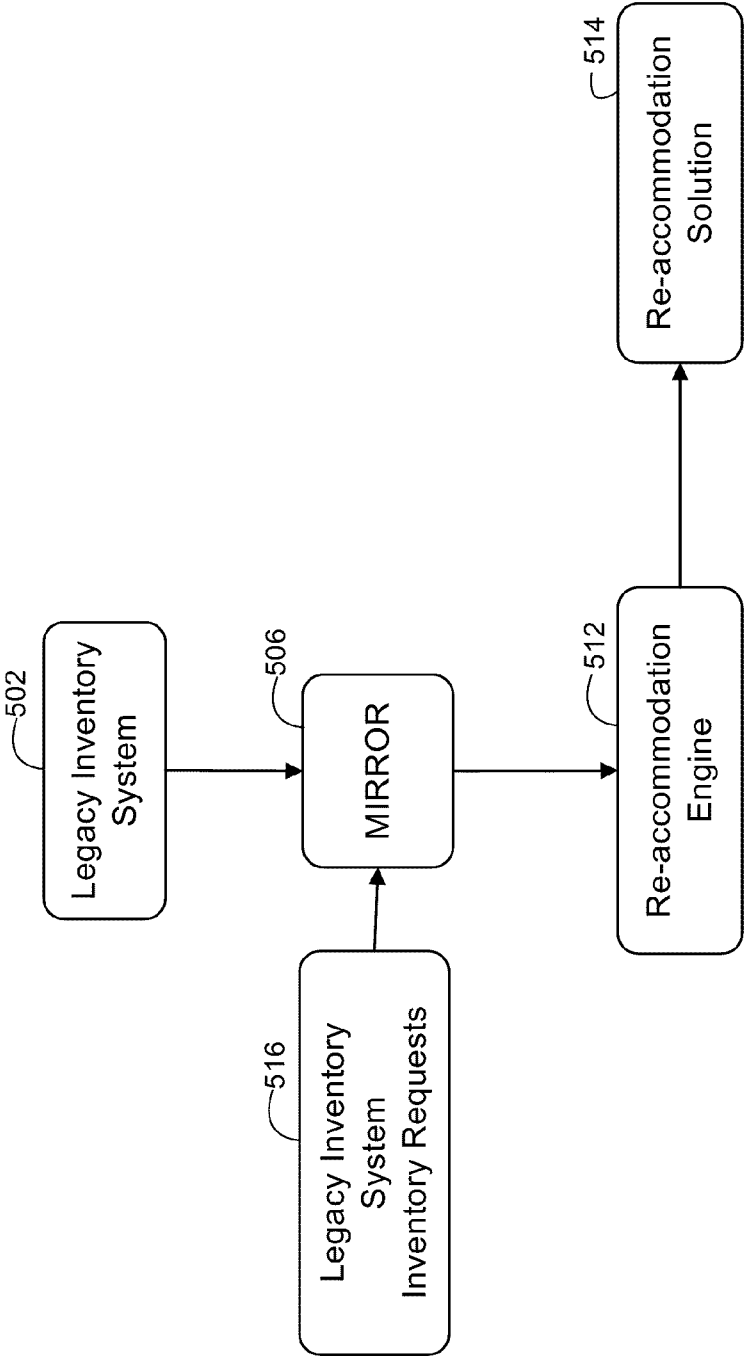

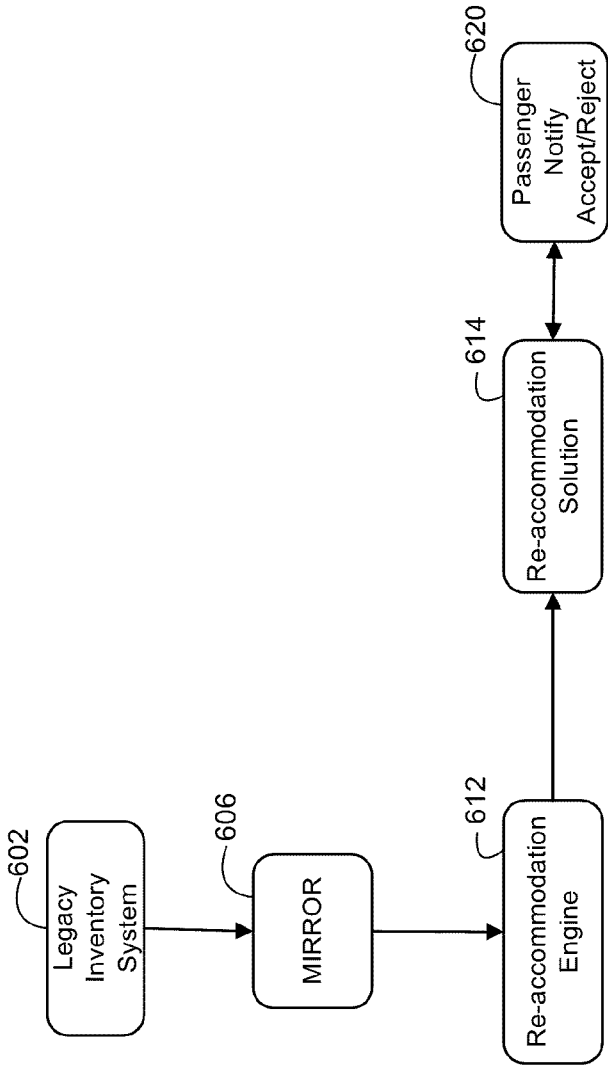

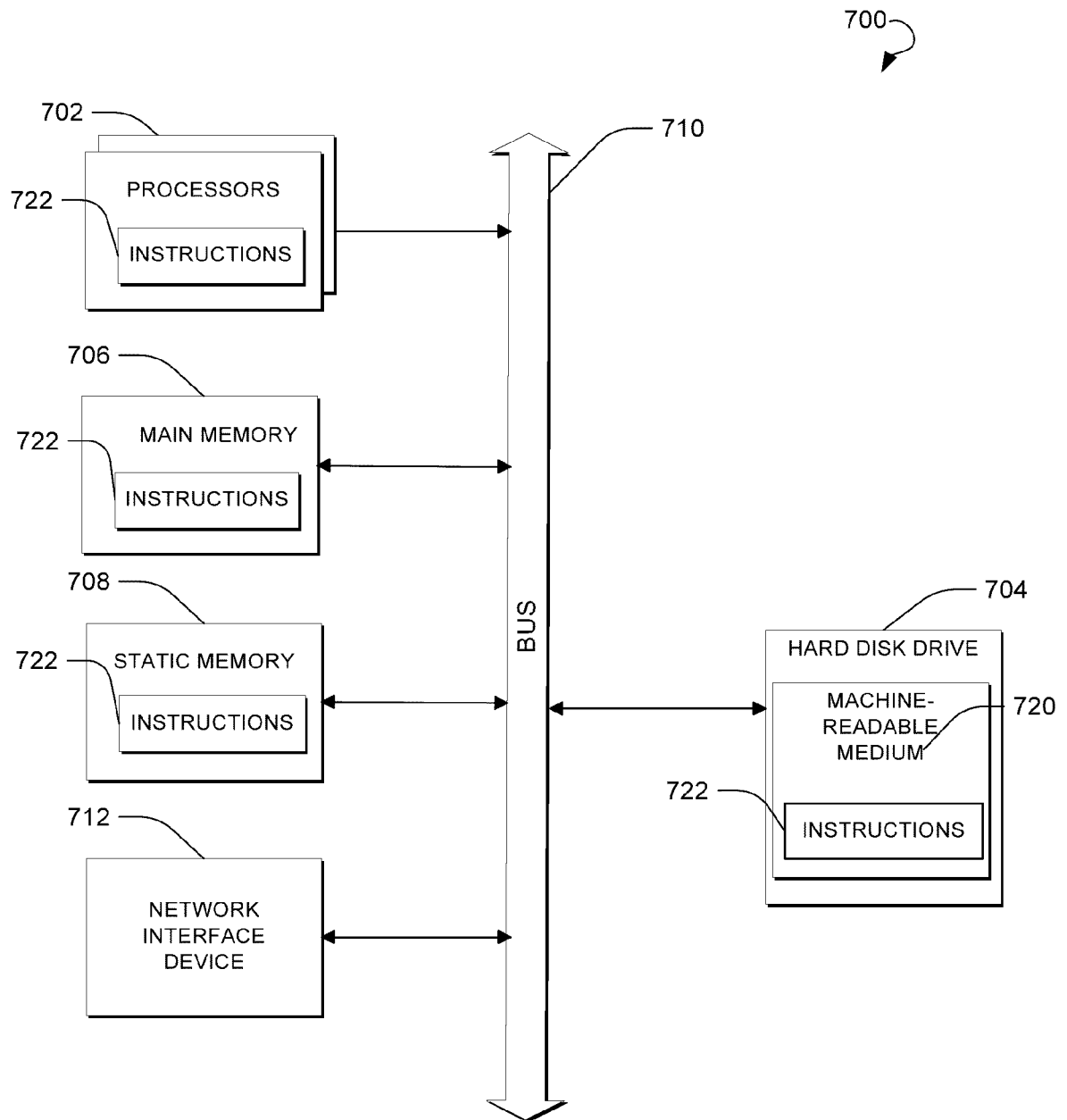
