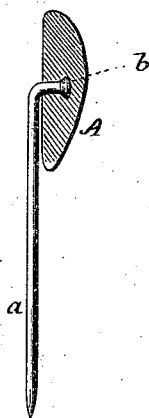

IMPROVEMENT IN BADGES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **174,162**, dated February 29, 1876; application filed January 17, 1876.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HENRY H. SNOW, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Improvement in Confectionery Badges; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent, in—

Figure 1, perspective view; Fig. 2, vertical central section.

This invention relates to an improvement in articles of confectionery, the object being to form a badge of confectionery combined with a pin, by which it may be attached to the garment; and it consists in a pin with the badge or article formed from confectionery, cast upon and around the said head, as hereinafter described.

a is a pin, the head end *b* preferably turned

at nearly right angles to the body, and onto and around this the sugar is molded to form the badge A, the head serving as a means for securing the parts together.

The badge here represented is a heart; but it will be understood that this may be of any predetermined character, it only being required to make the mold accordingly, in substantially the usual manner for making the same article without the pin. This in no way destroys the confectionery, and may be disposed of in the usual manner for confectionery.

I claim—

As a new article of manufacture, a badge made of molded sugar, having combined therewith the pin *a*, secured to the same in the process of molding, or otherwise, substantially as described.
