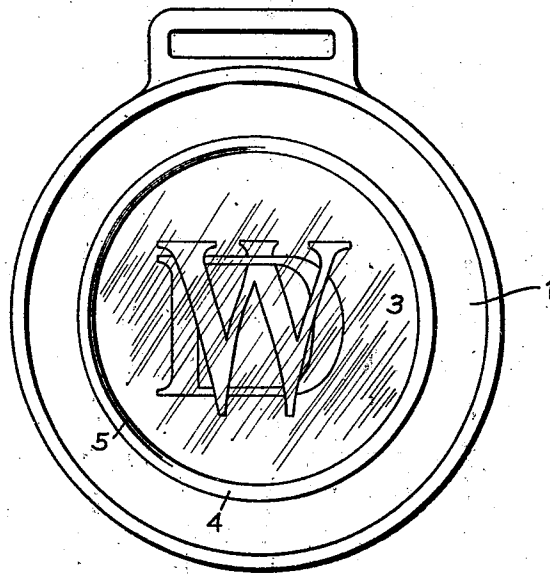
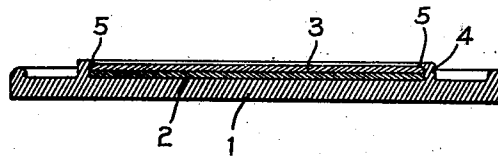

MEDALLION.

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To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM F. DURNAN, a citizen of the United States, and resident of Rochester, in the county of Monroe and State of New York, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Medallions, of which the following is a specification.

This invention relates to medallions, and has for its object a simple, cheap construction whereby a decorated panel with a superimposed transparent plate are framed and locked within it.

In the drawings:—Figure 1 is a front view of a medallion embodying the invention; and Fig. 2 is a central, cross-section.

1 shows a frame made of metal and recessed centrally to receive both the decorated panel 2 and a thin transparent celluloid plate 3. A flange 4 is formed around the decorated panel, and, by means of bur-

nishing, the metal of this flange is caused to flow inwardly till it overhangs the celluloid plate 3 in the form of a ledge 5, thus securing it in place.

I claim:—

A medallion comprising a substantially flat base, a flange formed integral with and projecting from the face of the base at a substantial distance within the edge thereof, so as to leave a wide, flat marginal portion surrounding the flange, a decorative panel lying within said flange and against the base, and a transparent plate covering said panel, the edge of the flange being bur-

nished inwardly over the transparent plate to retain the plate and the panel in place within the flange.
