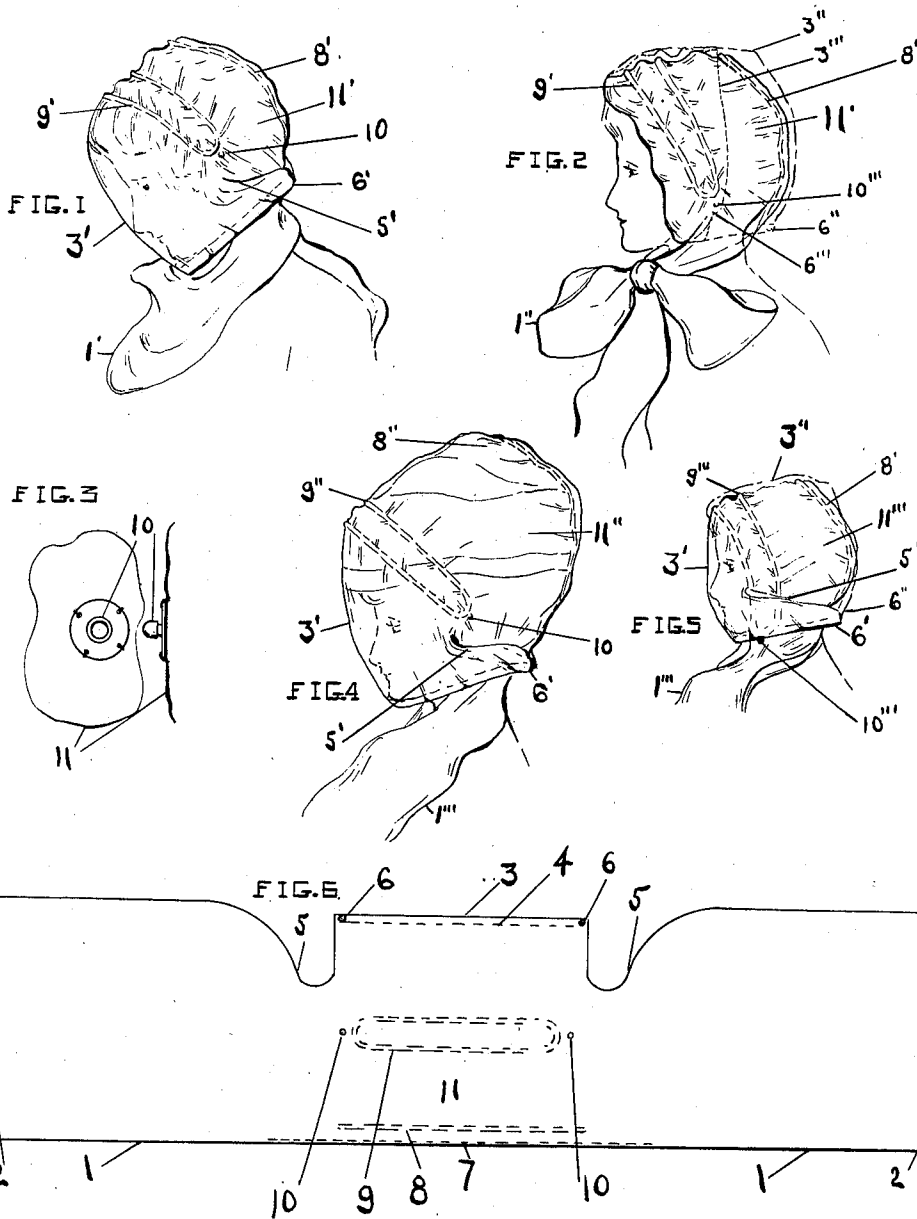

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To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ANNA McDERMOTT, a subject of the King of Great Britain and Ireland, residing at Toledo, Lucas county, Ohio, have invented new and useful Headwear, of which the following is a specification.

This invention relates to headwear.

This invention has utility when embodied in a device for variously shielding portions of the head or neck of the wearer and being particularly adapted for use as an automobile veil, a yachting hood, or an opera scarf.

Among the objects of this invention is the provision for headwear service of a device of attractive appearance, readily adaptable to varied conditions of use.

Referring to the drawings: Figure 1 shows an embodiment of the invention with the flap held in position as a veil over the face of the wearer and with the ends of the article thrown about the neck; Fig. 2 shows in full lines the article with the flap folded underneath the hood portion thereof to expose the face, and with the ends of the article tied in a bow in front; Fig. 3 shows a pair of the fasteners adapted to hold the flap as well as coact with the hood portion or with the flap; Fig. 4 shows the hood portion of the article distended over a hat and with the flap in face shielding position and held thus by the fasteners, while the ends are left flowing in front; Fig. 5 shows the hood drawn and fastened under the chin with the veil portion or flap in face shielding position, while the ends of the article are left flowing in front; and Fig. 6 is a view on a reduced scale of the article before the gatherings and back seam are assembled.

The article is shown as comprising a single strip of material having the flowing end portions 1 shown as finished in a decorative way as by hemstitching 2. Medially of the length of the material and from one side thereof is the flap or veil portion 3 which may also be provided with a finished portion say by hemstitching 4.

Upon each side of the flap 3 are shown incuts or reentrant portions 5 giving the flap an independent freedom of movement relatively to the streamer sections 1. Opposite the flap 3 and medially of the length of the material is a stitched portion 7 medially closed upon itself to form the back of the hood section. Adjacent this stitched portion

is the gathering 8 which is yieldable by having disposed therein an elastic cord. Between this back gathering 8 and the flap 3 is a second gathering 9 shown as of loop form and also containing a yieldable cord or elastic string therein.

Adjacent the terminals of this gathering 9 are fastener means 10. These gatherings 8, 9, with the material closed in the back by stitching 7 produce the yieldable hood section 11 which may conform the article readily to the various modes of hairdressing as well as even distend to encompass an article or articles of headwear.

As shown in Fig. 1, the flap 3' is in position to shield the face with the reentrant portions 5' permitting the fasteners 6' to clasp at the back of the head and thus hold the face shielding portion 3' over the wearer. The yieldable gatherings 8' and 9' permit the hood portion 11' to properly shape to the head of the wearer, while the end portions of the article 1 are thrown loosely back over the shoulders of the wearer.

Fig. 2 shows in full lines the article worn as a hood and with the flap turned back underneath the hood 11' with the ends of the article tied beneath the wearer's chin to form the bow 1''. In this view (full lines) the face shielding portion of the veil or article is folded within the hood, while in the dash line 3'' is shown this veil portion or flap thrown back over the outside of the hood and so held by fasteners 6'' as indicated in the dotted line showing, and the flap 3''' may have its fasteners 6''' coact with the hood fasteners 10''' to hold the flap in a medial position over the hood section 11'.

In Fig. 4 the hood section 11'' is shown as distended over a hat, while in Fig. 5 the hood section 11''' is shown with its gathering 9''' distended to permit the fasteners 10''' to coact beneath the chin of the wearer with the flap or veil portion 3''' in full lines over the face. In Figs. 4 and 5, the ends 1''' of the article are shown as freely falling in front of the wearer.

It is accordingly seen there is produced an assembled article from one piece of material which may be readily adapted to a variety of uses in covering or shielding the neck and head of the wearer.

What is claimed and it is desired to secure by Letters Patent is:

1. An article of headwear comprising a

hood section provided with an extension flap from the forward portion thereof and movable to shield the face of the wearer, and fastening means for the flap in shielding or
5 unshielding position.

2. An article of headwear comprising a strip of material having a pair of notches therein to form on one side thereof a flap, and fastening means on portions of the flap
10 remote from the hood for holding the flap in face shielding or unshielding position.

3. An article of headwear comprising a hood section provided with an extension flap from the forward portion thereof and movable to shield the face of the wearer, and
15 gathering means on the hood section thereof

opposite the flap to form the neck of the hood.

4. An article of headwear comprising a strip of material having a pair of notches
20 therein to form on one side thereof a flap movable into face shielding or unshielding position, and a loop gathering near the base of said flap to form the head portion of the hood, and a second gathering opposite the
25 flap to form the neck of the hood.
