


ARTICLE OF MANUFACTURE

Application filed November 20, 1922. Serial No. 602,011.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Howard R. Moore, a citizen of the United States, residing at Norwalk, in the county of Fairfield and State of 5 Connecticut, have invented a certain new and useful Improvement in Articles of Manufacture, of which the following is a specification.

10 for its object to produce a woolen having an absolutely unique appearance, in which I attach a strand of worsted to the face of the wool in such a manner that the attaching means will be practically invisible and to 15 provide means whereby woolens having a very wide variation in designs may be produced at a minimum of expense, producing the same in as small a quantity as the manufacturer desires, whereas heretofore by 20 weaving the wool with different color schemes and combinations a relatively large amount would have to be produced. Then too the design can be brought out in lines

and curves running in many directions with-25 in a small area that could not be produced by the loom, thereby enabling the manufac-turer to supply an extraordinary number of designs of cloth without having to carry an

enormous stock of piece goods. In addition to that feature, by the use of my invention, the manufacturer is placed in a position where he can furnish a variation in color schemes which by reason of expense would

otherwise be prohibitive.

A clear understanding of the means by which I accomplish the foregoing objects will be easily attained by referring to the accompanying drawings in connection with the specification to which the drawings are 40 annexed and made a part of.

Fig. 1 is an enlarged plan view of a fragment of woolen cloth constructed in accordance with my improvement.

Fig. 2 is a cross-sectional view of the 45 same.

As shown in the drawings 1 indicates a fragment of woolen cloth provided with a back 2 and a face 3. Upon the face of the cloth I place a strand or strands of woolen 50 worsted 4 which is then attached to the face of the cloth by stitching it longitudinally of the worsted with thread 5 preferably of the same color as the worsted 4. As the worsted 4 is very soft the thread 5 sinks into it (or is

counter-sunk therein) so that it is very diffi- 55 cult to determine how my new article of manufacture is produced until its method of manufacture is explained, for the cloth has the appearance of just having the worsted 4 loosely laid thereon, the strand 4 presenting 60

a fuzzy or hairy appearance.
It is, of course, obvious from the forego-My invention relates to woolens and has ing description of my invention that any or its object to produce a woolen having an number of strands may be used and in any variety of colors which may be desired and 65 it also follows that any design may be produced as my invention is not in any particular design or color scheme, but in producing an absolutely new article of manufacture which may be briefly described as wool on 70 wool.

> It will be apparent to persons skilled in the art that by the use of my invention the manufacturer will be required to carry but a few standard pieces of wool and that he 75 can send out samples of an innumerable number of designs and colors which he can supply on very short notice and at a very slight

> Having described my invention what I 80 ters Patent is:

> 1. As a new article of manufacture, a body fabric having a loosely formed strand of material attached thereto by means of 85 stitches extending longitudinally of said strand from the upper surface thereof, counter-sunk and substantially concealed therein.

> 2. As a new article of manufacture a body 90 fabric having a striping member, formed of a plurality of loosely formed strands of material twisted together, secured thereto by means of stitches extending longitudinally of said member from the upper surface 95 thereof, countersunk and substantially concealed therein.

3. As a new article of manufacture, a body fabric having a loosely formed woolen strand of material attached thereto by 100 means of stitches extending longitudinally of said strand from the upper surface thereof, counter-sunk and substantially concealed
