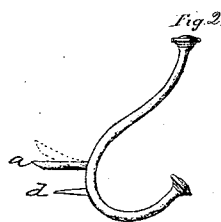
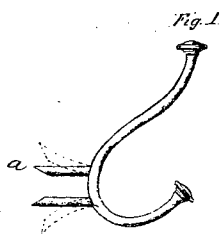

IMPROVEMENT IN WARDROBE-HOOKS.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, J. B. SARGENT, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven, and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Improvement in Wardrobe-Hooks; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent in—

Figure 1, a side view of a coat and hat-hook with two nails.

Figure 2, a side view of the same with one nail and spike.

This invention relates to an improvement in wardrobe-hooks, the object being to dispense with the screws usually employed for securing such hooks to the wall; and

The invention consists in forming or attaching to the base of the hook two or more nails, either or all of which are annealed, the end of the annealed nail or nails beveled in one direction only, so that in driving, the said nail is by the beveled end caused to turn out of a direct path, and by such turning the nail clinches, as it were, into the wall.

By preference I form the nails from annealed wire, but may be from any other suitable material.

The points of such nails are beveled only in one direction, as seen at *a*, so that when the nail is driven the beveled point inclines the point, and causes it to turn in the wall, as shown in broken lines in the several figures.

In some cases a spike, *d*, may be used, as in fig. 2, in combination with the beveled pointed nail.

This invention is applicable alike to the various kinds of hooks and knobs which come within the general name of wardrobe-hooks or knobs.

By this construction no other security is necessary for the hook or knob, and as they are secured by driving the nail, they are put up much more rapidly than hooks of common construction.

I claim as my invention—

Wardrobe-hooks constructed with two driving-points, one or both of which are beveled, as shown and described.
