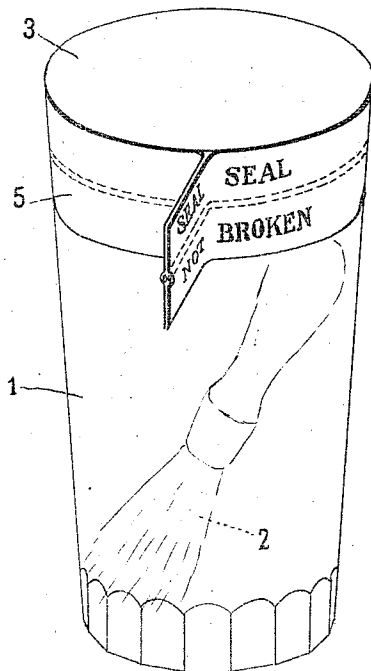

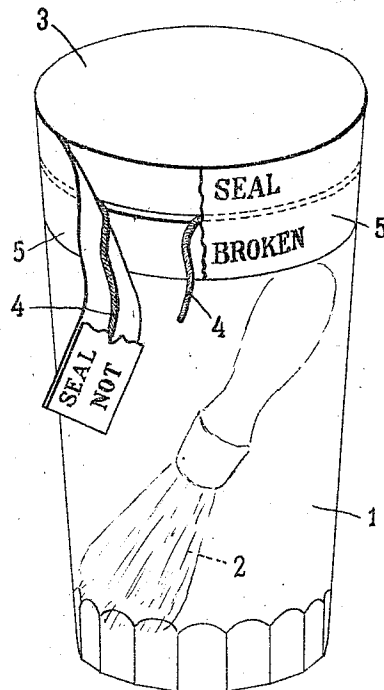
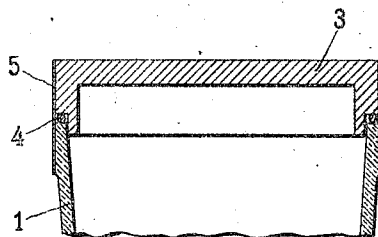

INDICATING SEALED SHAVING-CUP.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM HERTZBERG, a citizen of the United States, and resident of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Indicating Sealed Shaving-Cups, of which the following is a specification.

This invention relates to a barber's anti-septic utensil or shaving cup provided with an indicating seal which insures the use of the same only by the owner.

The invention as illustrated consists of a cup in which the brush and soap may be placed and a cover for the cup which is secured thereto by a seal of peculiar construction which will be described more fully hereinafter.

In the drawings like parts in the several views have been given the same reference numerals.

Figure 1 is a perspective view of a shaving cup embodying the invention, showing the cover sealed in place. Fig. 2 is a view similar to Fig. 1, showing the seal broken and partially removed. Fig. 3 is a sectional side elevation of the top portion of the cup and cover.

The shaving cup 1 may be of glass or other suitable material and contain the brush 2 and soap. A cover 3, which may be of suitable material so as to not be easily broken, is positioned on top of the cup 1. Between the cover 3 and the cup 1 a cord 4 is positioned around the upper edge of the cup, as shown. This cord provides a packing to insure the closing of the cup by the cover and also provides a convenient means for breaking or removing the seal. The seal may be of paper or other suitable material and is in the form of a band, as shown at 5, inclosing the circumference of the cover and upper portion of the cup. This seal is held in place by an adhesive material and the two ends of the cord 4 are held between the projecting ends of the seal.

When it is desired to open the cup the projecting ends of the seal are grasped and torn away in the manner shown in Fig. 2, allow-

ing one end of the cord 4 to become disengaged therefrom while the other end of the cord is held and the same is removed from the cup with the seal.

It will be noted that the word "Seal" and the words "Not broken" are placed upon the seal so that when the projecting end is torn away the words indicate that the seal has been broken, as shown in Fig. 2.

As many changes could be made in the above construction and many apparently widely different embodiments of my invention designed without departing from the scope of the appended claims, I intend that all matter contained in the above description or shown in the accompanying drawing shall be interpreted as illustrative merely or an operative embodiment of my invention and not in a limiting sense.

What I claim is:

1. A shaving cup comprising a brush and soap receptacle, a cover for said receptacle, a sealing strip positioned around the circumference of said cover and securing it to said receptacle, and a packing strip positioned between the upper edge of said receptacle and said cover and adapted to be removed with said sealing strip.

A shaving cup comprising a brush and soap receptacle, a cover for said receptacle, a sealing strip having extending ends positioned around the circumference of said cover and securing it to said receptacle, and a packing strip positioned between the upper edge of said receptacle and said cover and having extending ends held between the extending ends of said sealing strip and removable therewith.

A shaving cup comprising a brush and soap receptacle, a cover for said receptacle, a sealing strip having extending ends positioned around the circumference of said cover and securing it to said receptacle, and a cord positioned between the upper edge of said receptacle and said cover attached to and having extending ends held between the extending ends of said sealing strip and removable therewith.

4. A shaving cup comprising a brush and

soap receptacle, a cover for said receptacle, and a sealing strip positioned around the circumference of said cover and securing it to said receptacle, said strip having both ends extending outwardly together adapted to be grasped by the hand, whereby one of said ends is torn away, breaking the strip when the same is removed.
