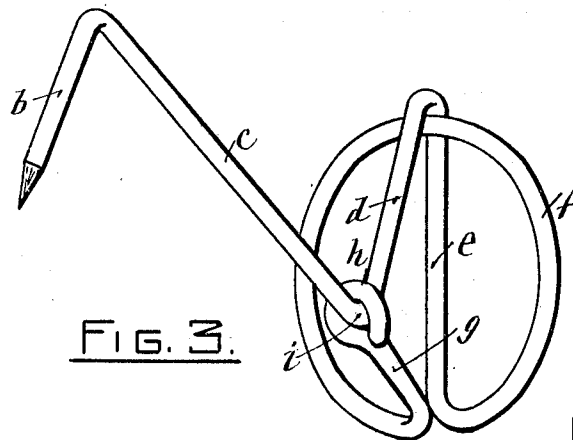
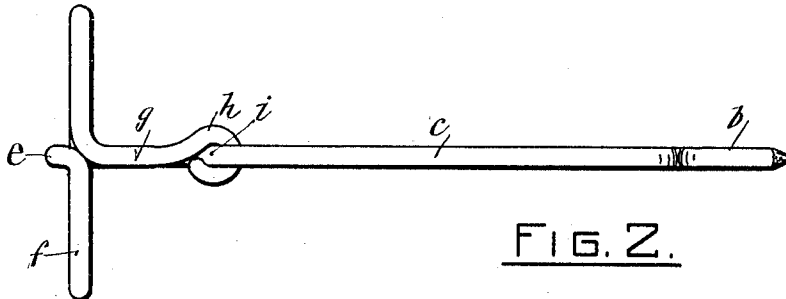
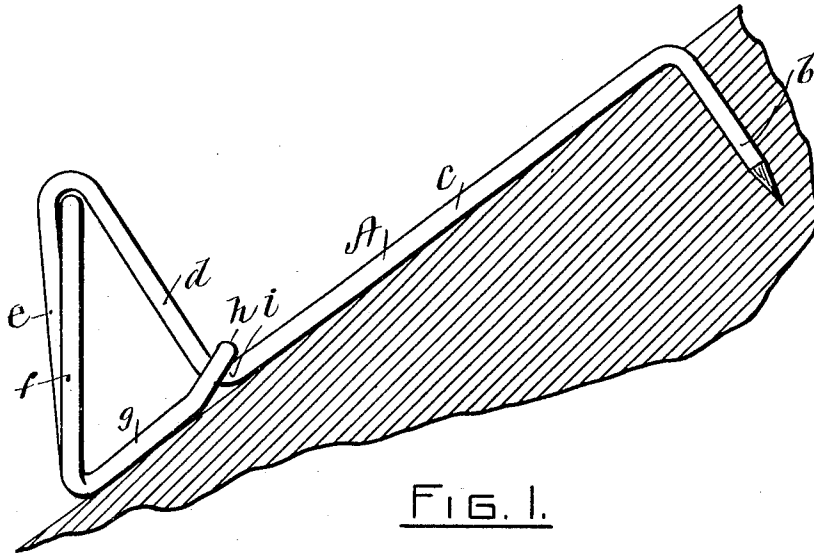

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ANDERS PETER ANDERSEN, a citizen of the United States, residing at Providence, in the State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Snow-Guards, of which the following is a specification.

The nature of my invention consists in the improved construction of the guard, whereby both strength and efficiency are secured, as hereinafter set forth.

In the accompanying drawings: Figure 1 represents a side view of the improved snow guard when in its position for use. Fig. 2 represents a top view of the same when in the said position. Fig. 3 represents a perspective view.

In the drawing, A represents the improved snow guard, formed of a piece of wire bent to form an attaching spur *b*, and having an extended straight portion *c*, an upturned portion *d*, a downwardly turned

portion *e*, a circularly bent portion *f*, and a backwardly turned portion *g*, having at its end an eye *h*, which tightly embraces the wire of the guard at the bend *i*, the said upwardly turned portion *d*, serving to impart strength in the construction of the guard.

I claim as my invention—

In a snow guard, the combination of the attaching spur, the succeeding straight portion, the upwardly turned portion, the downwardly turned portion, the circularly bent portion and the backwardly turned portion having an eye at its end, which embraces the wire of the guard at the upward bend, from the straight portion substantially as described.
