

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Edward P. O'Hara, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the city of New York, borough of Brooklyn, in the county of Kings and State of New York, have invented a new and Im-proved Bill-Folder, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description.

My invention relates to bill folders, and 10 the object thereof is to provide a simple, convenient and inexpensive folder which is characterized by the provision of a central slit on the outer surface thereof where-through bills are entered into the folder, 15 and a cut-out covered by a flap on the inner surface of the folder wherethrough bills can be extracted with great ease.

With the above and other objects in view, the nature of which will more fully appear 20 as the description proceeds, the invention consists in the novel construction, combination and arrangement of parts as herein fully described, illustrated and claimed.

In the accompanying drawings, forming part of the application, similar characters of reference indicate corresponding parts in

Figure 1 is a plan view of the bill folder unfolded and with the flap thrown open to show the cut-out on the inner surface of the folder wherethrough the bills are extracted; Fig. 2 is a plan view from the outer side of the bill folder unfolded, showing the central slit wherethrough the bills are placed into 35 the bill folder; Fig. 3 is a cross section on line 3—3, Fig. 2; Fig. 4 is a longitudinal section on line 4—4, Fig. 1; and Fig. 5 is a perspective view of the bill folder in its normal position.

Referring to the drawings, the outer side 6 of the bill folder is preferably made of two similar blanks 7, the adjacent edges of which blanks form a longitudinal opening or slit 8. If desired, the front can be formed 45 of a single blank and the slit 8 made therein in the center or to one side thereof. Co-operating with the blanks 7 is a blank 9 which has the width of the two blanks 7 and which is secured thereto at the edges by 50 stitching or in any other suitable way. The space between the blanks 7 and 9 forms the bill pocket into which the bills are introduced through the longitudinal slit 8. When the bill folder is folded into three or

I claim:

1. A bill folder ha side of which has a lo the other side, a cut-of and a flap for closing

2. A bill folder ha tending substantially length of the folder a of the pocket a longitudinal opening and at the other side a cut-out, said cut-out being slightly less than a fold of the bill folder; and a flap for closing the cut-out adapted to

5 overlap it.

3. A bill folder having a bill pocket extending through the entire length of the folder, said folder having a longitudinal opening on the outer side thereof and a cut-10 out at one end thereof on the inner side of the pocket, said cut-out being less than a fold of the folder; and a flap secured to the edge on the inner side of the folder adapted to close the cut-out.

4. A bill folder comprising a pair of blanks the adjacent longitudinal edges of which form an opening; and a blank secured at the edges with the pair of blanks and forming therewith a bill pocket, said blank 20 having a cut-out at one end thereof, the width of which is greater than the width of a bill, and a flap for closing the cut-out.

5. A bill folder having a pair of similar outer blanks the adjacent longitudinal edges 25 of which form an opening; an inner blank secured at the edges of the other blank, said inner blank having a cut-out adjacent one end thereof, said cut-out being less than the fold of the bill folder; a flap for closing the 30 cut-out secured to the edge of the folder;

and means for locking the flap to the inner blank.

6. A bill folder having a bill pocket, one side of which has a longitudinal opening and the other side a cut-out at one end 35 thereof, the width of which cut-out is greater than the width of a bill; and a flap for closing the cut-out, including means for

maintaining the cut-out closed.
7. A bill folder having a bill pocket ex- 40 tending substantially through the entire length of the folder, said folder having a slit on the outer side extending through the entire length of the pocket for admitting bills thereto, said folder having a cut-out 45 on the inner side disposed transversely of the pocket and adjacent one end of the folder whereby bills in the pocket can be inspected without extraction from the pocket, and a flap secured to the inner surface of 50 the folder at the transverse edge for closing said cut-out.
