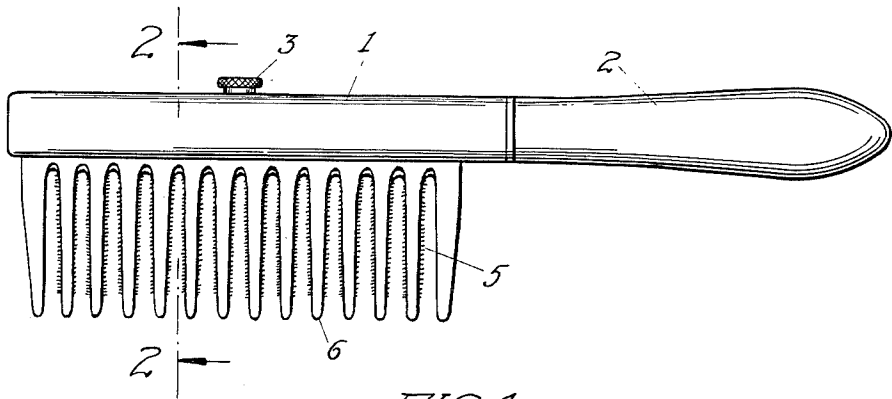

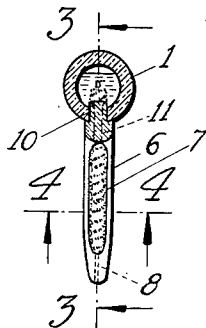

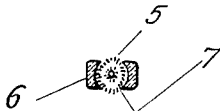

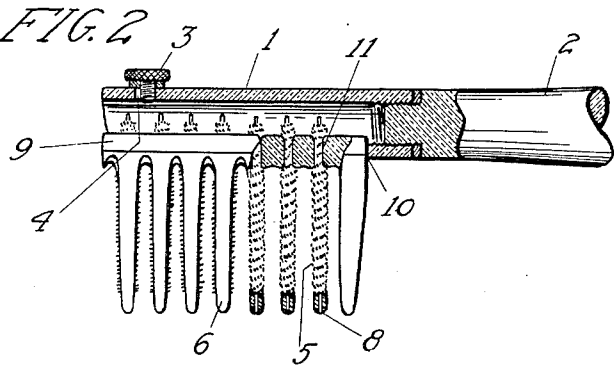

FOUNTAIN COMB.

Application filed January 23, 1925. Serial No. 5,244.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, GEORGE C. LILLIE, a citizen of the United States, residing at Chicago, in the county of Cook and State of Illinois, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Fountain Combs, of which the following is a specification.

This invention relates to improvements in fountain combs adapted especially for the hygienic treatment of the scalp and hair, for administering hair dyes, hair tonics, water and for treatments of the hair and scalp generally. Simplicity in construction, efficiency in operation and cheapness of manufacture are objects attained.

With the foregoing and other objects in view the invention consists in the combination and arrangement of parts to be hereinafter fully described, pointed out in the appended claims and illustrated in the accompanying drawing which forms a part of this application and in which—

Fig. 1 is a view of my improved fountain comb in side elevation.

Fig. 2 is a cross section taken on line 2—2 of Fig. 1.

Fig. 3 is a section taken on line 3—3 of Fig. 2.

Fig. 4 is a cross section taken on line 4—4 of Fig. 2.

Like reference characters denote corresponding parts throughout the several views.

The reference numeral 1 denotes the hollow body of the comb to which the handle 2 is releasably secured and which is provided with a filling orifice normally closed by the cap 3, an air vent 4 contiguous to said filling orifice being provided to permit the liquid contents of the body 1 to flow out, or seep out, through the wicks 5 carried in the

hollow teeth 6 and extending into the said body 1.

The wicks 5 protrude slightly through lateral perforations 7 formed in the teeth, the free ends of the teeth being formed with longitudinal ports 8 beyond the ends of the wicks through which ports the liquid carried by the wicks may seep out. The teeth 6 are integral with the bar 9 that is removably secured in a slotted portion 10 of the body 1 and the wicks 5 extend through the contracted perforations 11 in said bar and in the upper ends of the teeth whereby the wicks are securely retained in operative position.

When the hollow body 1 is provided with sufficient liquid the same is absorbed by the wicks 5 and as the hair or scalp is combed the wicks pass the liquid out over the hair, a certain amount of the liquid passing out through the ports 8 also.

What is claimed is:—

1. In a fountain comb, a hollow body, a handle therefor, hollow teeth removably carried by said comb, and wicks carried by said teeth and extending into the said hollow body.

In a fountain comb, a hollow body, a handle therefor, a tooth bar removably carried by said body and formed with a plurality of perforations, hollow teeth integral with said tooth bar and formed with contracted longitudinal ports at their free ends and with lateral slots, and wicks carried in the hollow portions of said teeth and extending through the perforations in said tooth bar into said body.
