

TOY ANIMAL.

Application filed May 8, 1926. Serial No. 107,728.

This invention relates to stuffed toys, and has for one of its objects the provision of an article of this character which, while it may be made in simulation of various ani-5 mals, will in appearance possess all the characteristic features of a skye terrier and which may be manufactured and sold at a comparatively low cost.

The invention consists of the novel fea-10 tures of construction, combination and arrangement of parts hereinafter fully described and claimed, and illustrated in the

accompanying drawing, wherein:

Figure 1 is a perspective view of a toy animal constructed in accordance with my

Figure 2 is a perspective view of the toy

animal partly completed,

Figure 3 is a top plan view of the partly 20 completed toy animal, Figure 4 is a view in front elevation of

the partly completed animal,
Figure 5 is a plan view of the bottom

Corresponding and like parts are referred to in the following description, and designated in the several views of the accompany-35 ing drawing, by similar reference charac-

preferably made of gray flannelette and the ears in place. A strip of gray flannelette comprises similar side pieces 1 and 2. These 40 parts conform generally to the body, sides of the head and outer sides of the legs of the animal to be simulated, and have their top edges connected together between the points a and b and the points c and d by lines of stitching 3 and 4, respectively. The front edges of these pieces are connected together between the points e and f by a line of stitching 5. A top piece 6 conforming generally to the top of the head of the animal, is of elliptical contour extends from point b to point c, and is connected to the side pieces 1 and 2 by lines of stitching 7. A front elliptical contour, extends from point e to carrying the yarn strands 27, are sewed to point f and is connected to the side pieces the envelope in such manner that each strip elliptical contour, extends from point e to

1 and 2 by lines of stitching 9. Bottom pieces 10 conforming generally to the under side of the body and the inner sides of the legs of the animal, extending from point 60 f to point d and having substantially straight inner edges 11 and outer edges 12 similar in contour to the bottom edges of the side pieces 1 and 2, are connected together along their edges 11 by lines of stitching 65 13, and are connected along their edges 12 to the bottom edges of the side pieces by lines of stitching 14. The manner in which the inner edges 11 of the bottom pieces 10 are connected together provides an opening 70 15 in the bottom side of the envelope. This opening permits the envelope to be stuffed, and the material used for this purpose is preferably cotton. The bottom pieces 10 are provided alongside the opening 15 with 75 hems 16 in which are arranged and secured form maintaining wires 17. These parts extend longitudinally of the envelope and are located at opposite sides of the opening 15.
After the envelope has been stuffed the 80 opening is closed by stitching the side walls thereof together. The bottom pieces 10 are provided forwardly beyond the wires 17 with form maintaining wires 18 which are of arcuate formation and extend trans- 85 versely of the envelope.

The ears 19 are each made of two pieces of gray flannelette which are connected together by lines of stitching 20. Form maintaining wires 21 are encased in the ears 19 90 and are provided with eyes 22. Lines of stitching 23 engaging the side pieces 1 and 2, The toy comprises an envelope which is the ears 19 and the eyes 22 serve to secure is secured to the envelope and constitutes the 95 tail 25 of the animal. Eyes 26 which may be made of glass or other suitable material are secured to the envelope. Strands 27 of light and dark gray yarn are secured to the envelope, ears 19 and tail 25. The yarn strands 100 27 are sewed to strips 28 through the medium of which they are secured to the envelope. Two of the strips 28 and the yarn strands 27 carried thereby are sewed together as shown at 29 in Figure 7, and are 105 then sewed as at 30 to and along the back of the envelope. The yarn strands 27 of these strips are thence parted, as is also shown in piece 8 conforming generally to the front said figure, so as to hang down the sides of side of the nose of the animal, is also of the envelope. The remaining strips 28 110

yarn strands of another or other strips. The strips 28 that are sewed to and along the back of the envelope are hidden from 5 view by the yarn strands carried thereby.

In appearance the toy will possess—as will be apparent from an examination of Figure 1—all the characteristic features of a skye terrier. It is to be understood, however, that 10 the toy may be made to simulate other animals, and that various changes and modifications may be made in the invention without departing from the spirit and scope of the same.

What is claimed is:—

1. A toy animal comprising an envelope embodying side pieces conforming to the body, sides of the head and outer sides of the legs of the animal, said pieces having certain portions of the edges thereof connected together, a top piece conforming to the top of the head of the animal and connected to and between the side pieces, a front piece conforming to the front side of the

will be hidden from view by its own or the nose of the animal and connected to and be- 26 tween the side pieces, a bottom piece conforming to the under side of the body and inner sides of the legs of the animal and connected to and between the side pieces and provided with a central opening extending \*\* longitudinally of the body, form maintaining wires connected to the bottom piece at opposite sides of the opening and adapted to maintain the opening closed, form maintaining wires connected to the bottom piece in 35 advance of the first named wires, and a stuffing for the envelope.

2. A toy animal comprising a stuffed envelope having body, leg and head portions. yarn strands, and strips carrying the yarn 40 strands and secured to the envelope, two of said strips being secured together end to end along the upper side of the back portion of the envelope and having the strands carried thereby extending down along the sides of 45

said portion of the envelope.
