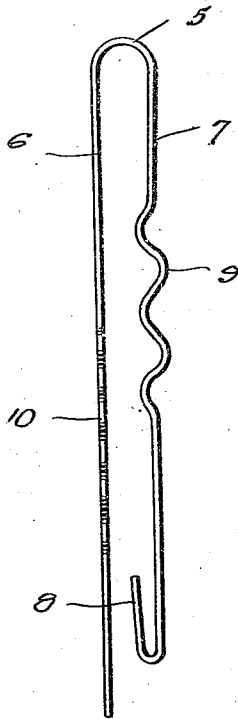
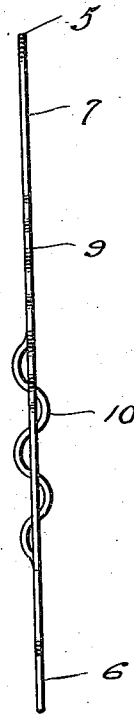

HAIRPIN.

Application filed February 17, 1927. Serial No. 169,065.

The present invention relates to a hair pin and has for its object to provide a simple structure of this nature which is particularly useful with bobbed hair and also useful as a barret pin.

An important object of the invention lies in a pin of this nature which will maintain the hair in the desired position more efficiently than the ordinary hair pin and which, because of certain peculiar features of construction, will be prevented from easily falling out of the hair.

With the above and numerous other objects in view, as will appear as the description proceeds, the invention resides in certain novel details of construction and in the combination and arrangement of parts as will be hereinafter more fully described and claimed.

In the drawing:—

Figure 1 is a side elevation of the pin embodying the features of my invention,

Figure 2 is an edge elevation thereof.

Referring to the drawing in detail, it will be seen that the pin is formed from a single strand of wire bent intermediate its ends to provide a bight 5 and legs 6 and 7. The end of the leg 7 is bent back over upon itself between the legs 6 and 7 to form a hook-like portion 8. The intermediate portion of the leg 7 is bent in a sinuous manner as is indicated at 9. An intermediate portion of the leg 3 below the portion 7 is bent in a sinuous

manner as indicated at 10. The portion 9 is disposed in the same plane with the hook portion 8 and in a plane at right angles to the plane of the portion 10.

The construction of this pin should now be clearly understood without a more detailed description thereof. It will be seen that the pin may be manufactured at a comparatively low cost and will prove efficient for carrying out the purposes specified. It is apparent that changes in the details of construction, in the sizes and material may be resorted to without departing from the spirit or scope of the invention as hereinafter claimed or sacrificing any of its advantages.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim as new is:—

A hair pin of the class described formed from a single strand of wire bent intermediate its ends to a substantial U-shaped formation to provide a bight and a pair of legs, the terminal of one leg being bent over upon itself between the two legs to form a hook portion, the intermediate portion of said one leg being bent in a sinuous manner to be disposed in the same plane with the hook portion, the intermediate portion of the other leg being bent in a sinuous manner to be disposed in a plane at right angles to the first mentioned sinuous portion.
