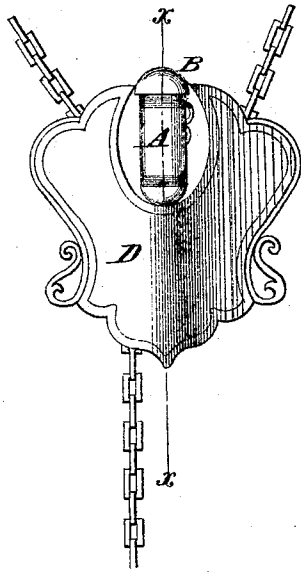
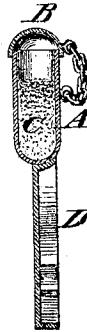

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IMPROVEMENT IN PERFUMING OPERA-CHAINS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **130,421**, dated August 13, 1872.

Specification describing Improvements in Perfuming Articles of Jewelry, invented by SOLOMON FREDRICK, of the city, county, and State of New York.

The invention consists in a new attachment for opera-chains, as hereinafter fully described and subsequently pointed out in the claim.

Figure 1 is a plan view of my article, and Fig. 2 a vertical section of Fig. 1, taken on the line *x x*.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts.

A is the reservoir, which consists of a vessel or tube, closed at one end, and with a perforated stopper or cover, B, at the other end. C represents a piece of sponge, which is saturated with the perfume, and placed in the

reservoir. These are attached to the piece of jewelry. D is the piece of jewelry.

A reservoir may be made in a piece of jewelry by boring a hole therein, and fitting a stopper or cap thereto.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to protect by Letters Patent, is—

As an article of manufacture, an attachment for opera-chains, consisting of a reservoir, A, perforated cover B, and sponge C, arranged together as described.
