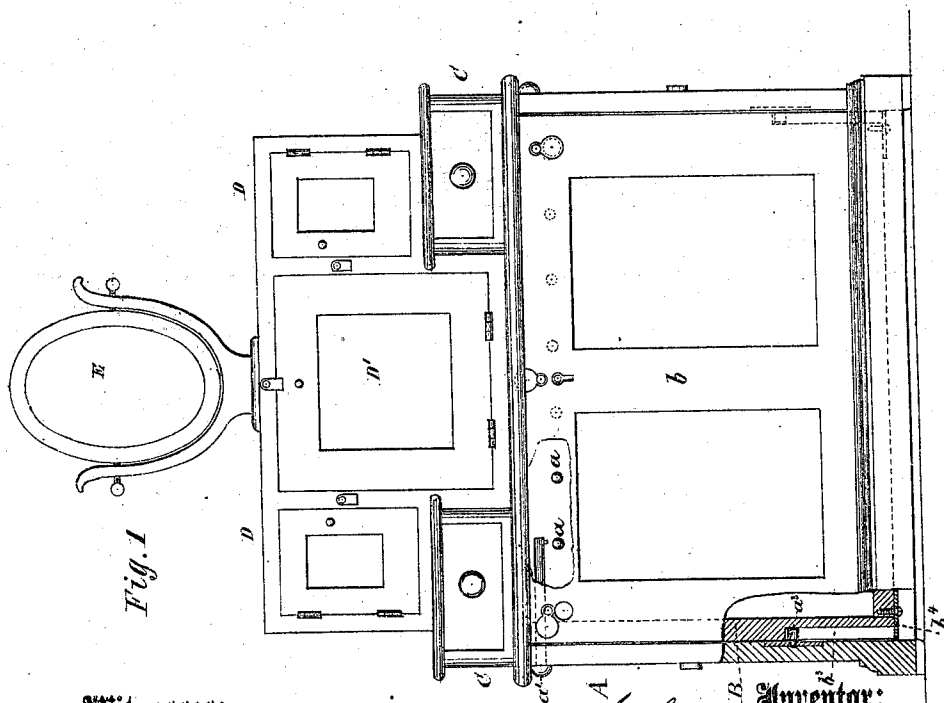
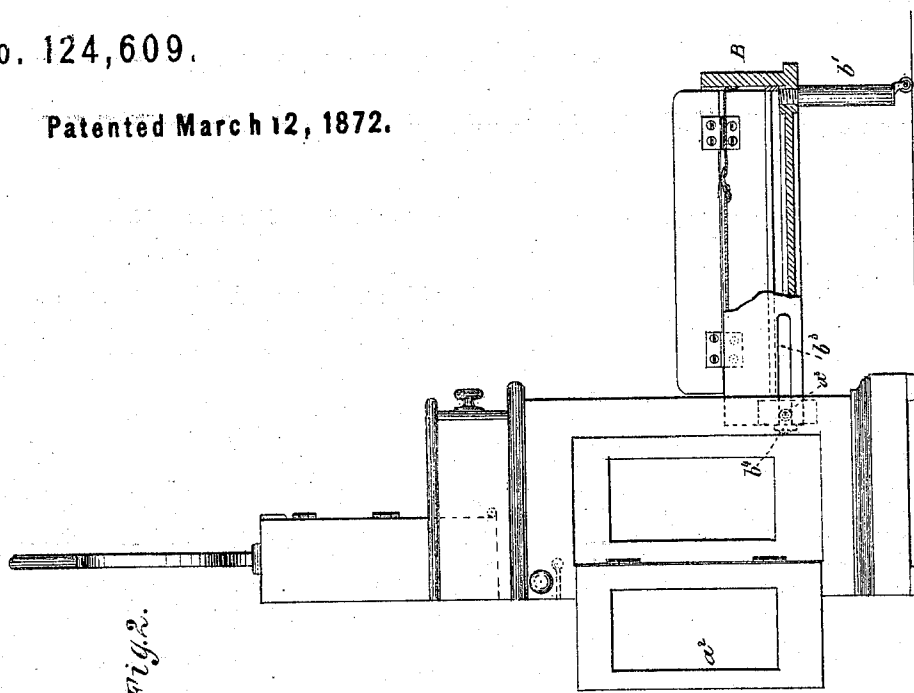

IMPROVEMENT IN COMBINED BEDSTEADS AND WARDROBES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 124,609, dated March 12, 1872.

Specification describing a Combined Bedstead and Wardrobe, invented by JOHN A. MORGAN, of Bloomfield, in the county of Davis and State of Iowa.

The invention will first be fully described and then clearly pointed out in the claim.

Figure 1 of drawing is a front elevation of the wardrobe without the bedstead. Fig. 2 is a side elevation with the bedstead drawn out and with the ventilating-doors open.

In the drawing, A represents the wardrobe, and B the bedstead. The wardrobe A is provided on the inside with the usual hooks or pegs a , and with the sliding coat-rack a^1 and ventilating-doors a^2 a^2 . The bedstead B is provided with part b , which serves both as the bottom of bedstead and front of wardrobe. It also has detachable legs b^1 , which are threaded on end, and screw into the upper portion of piece b . When the bed is, within the bureau these feet are unscrewed and the apertures from which they come covered by buttons b^2 b^2 . The head and front of bedstead B have slots b^3 b^3 , by which it is enabled to slide horizontally on friction-roll studs a^3 a^3 . b^4 b^4 are buttons that cover the open end of slots b^3 , and allow the bedstead to be readily removed. After the bedstead is turned vertically on the friction-rolls it fits snugly into the wardrobe. During the day the doors a^2 a^2 may be left open to air the bed, and may also be used to gain access to the greater portion of the pegs at any time.

It will thus be perceived that, as an article of furniture for offices, stores, parlors, or sitting-rooms, it possesses many advantages in its compactness and readiness of adaptation to the two purposes specified.

C C represent receptacles with drawers, in which may be kept the key of the wardrobe and legs of the bedstead. D is a writing-desk, whose middle, D' , fits closely between the receptacles C C, and has the usual pigeon-holes and other appurtenances of a desk. E is a looking-glass. These may be all, or more or less of them may be, fitted by pins or in any other suitable manner upon the wardrobe or upon one another. The wardrobe and bedstead are, however, complete in themselves, and may be advantageously employed without either of them.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

1. The combination of the folding bedstead B with detachable legs b^1 , wardrobe A, folding-doors a^2 a^2 , receptacles C C with drawers, and looking-glass E, all as and for the purpose set forth.

2. In combination with the foregoing, the writing-desk D D', as specified.
