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(54) Title: CHROMOSOME CONFORMATION CAPTURE METHOD INCLUDING SELECTION AND ENRICHMENT STEPS

(57) Abstract: The invention relates to a method for identifying nucleic acid segments which interact with a target nucleic acid segment by use of an isolating nucleic acid molecule, and to kits for use in said method. The invention also relates to a method of identifying one or more interacting nucleic acid segments that are indicative of a particular disease state.



CHROMOSOME CONFORMATION CAPTURE METHOD INCLUDING SELECTION AND ENRICHMENT STEPS

FIELD OF THE INVENTION

5 The present invention relates to a method for identifying a nucleic acid segment which interacts with a target nucleic acid segment, in particular a method for identifying nucleic acid segments which interact with a sub-group of target nucleic acid segments, as well as kits for performing said method. The invention also relates to a method of identifying one or more interacting nucleic acid
10 segments that are indicative of a particular disease state.

BACKGROUND OF THE INVENTION

Regulatory elements play a central role in an organism's genetic control and have been shown to contribute to health and disease (e.g. in cancer and auto-
15 immune disorders). Identification of these regulatory elements can also have potential applications in molecular biology, for example, in expression systems and genetic modification techniques. However, while thousands of regulatory elements have been mapped in the mouse and human genomes, determining which target genes they regulate represents a major challenge. It has been
20 demonstrated that regulatory DNA sequences (for example, enhancers) can bridge considerable genomic distances to interact with their target genes. The chromosomal contacts between genes and their regulatory regions can be captured, but the methodology to link genes to their regulatory sequences on a genome-wide scale is currently missing.

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One of the first methods developed to identify interactions between genomic loci was Chromosome Conformation Capture (3C) technology (Dekker *et al. Science* (2002) 295:1306-1311). This involved creating a 3C library by: crosslinking a nuclear composition so that genomic loci that are in close spatial proximity
30 become linked; removing the intervening DNA loop between the crosslink by digestion; and ligating and reverse crosslinking the interacting regions to generate a 3C library. The library can then be used to calculate the frequency of interaction between known sequences. However, this method has a requirement

of previous knowledge of the interaction in order to detect the interacting regions of interest.

Since then, the technology has been further developed to try and overcome limitations with the 3C method. For example, the 4C method uses inverse PCR to identify interactions of a bait sequence where the specific interactions are not known (Simonis *et al. Nat. Genet.* (2006) 38:1341-1347; and Zhao *et al. Nat. Genet.* (2006) 38:1348-1354). However, this method is costly on both time and resource, is designed to detect interactions with only one bait genomic locus, and is only semi-quantitative.

The Hi-C method uses junction markers to isolate all of the ligated interacting sequences in the cell (see WO 2010/036323 and Lieberman-Aiden *et al., Science* (2009) 326:289-93). Although this provides information on all the interactions occurring within the nuclear composition at a particular time point, there are around 800,000 ligatable fragments per cell (for example, if a restriction enzyme with a 6 base pair recognition site, such as HindIII or BglII has been used for the Hi-C library generation) which makes the libraries overly-complex and prohibits the interrogation of interactions between specific individual regions.

There is therefore a need to provide an improved method for identifying nucleic acid interactions which overcomes the limitations of the currently available methodologies.

SUMMARY OF THE INVENTION

According to a first aspect of the invention, there is provided a method for identifying nucleic acid segments which interact with a sub-group of target nucleic acid segments, said method comprising the steps of:

- (a) obtaining a nucleic acid composition comprising the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments;
- (b) crosslinking the nucleic acid composition;
- (c) fragmenting the crosslinked nuclear composition by sonication;
- (d) ligating the fragmented nucleic acid segments obtained from step (c) to produce ligated fragments;

(e) addition of isolating nucleic acid molecules which bind to the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments, wherein said isolating nucleic acid molecules are labelled with a first half of a binding pair;

5 (f) isolating ligated fragments which contain the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments bound to the isolating nucleic acid molecules by using the second half of the binding pair; and

(g) sequencing the isolated ligated fragments from step (f) to identify the nucleic acid segments which interact with the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments.

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According to a further aspect of the invention, there is provided a method of identifying one or more interacting nucleic acid segments that are indicative of a particular disease state comprising:

15 a) performing the method defined herein on a nucleic acid composition obtained from an individual with a particular disease state;

b) quantifying a frequency of interaction between a nucleic acid segment and a target nucleic acid segment;

20 c) comparing the frequency of interaction in the nucleic acid composition from the individual with said disease state with the frequency of interaction in a normal control nucleic acid composition from a healthy subject, such that a difference in the frequency of interaction in the nucleic acid composition is indicative of a particular disease state.

25 According to a further aspect of the invention, there is provided a kit for identifying nucleic acid segments which interact with a sub-group of target nucleic acid segments, which comprises buffers and reagents capable of performing the methods defined herein.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE FIGURES

30 **FIGURE 1:** A schematic overview of an embodiment of the invention described herein.

FIGURE 2: Results obtained using the method described herein. Figure 2(A) displays the genomic region surrounding the MYC gene and the chromosomal

interaction profile of the MYC gene in CD34+ cells. Figure 2(B) shows an example of a DNA FISH of a CD34+ cell nucleus. Figure 2(C) shows validation of the interaction between the MYC promoter and the region at 1.8 Mb downstream of the gene using the 3C method.

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DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF THE INVENTION

According to a first aspect of the invention, there is provided a method for identifying nucleic acid segments which interact with a sub-group of target nucleic acid segments, said method comprising the steps of:

- 10 (a) obtaining a nucleic acid composition comprising the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments;
- (b) crosslinking the nucleic acid composition;
- (c) fragmenting the crosslinked nucleic acid composition by sonication;
- (d) ligating the fragmented nucleic acid segments obtained from step (c)
- 15 to produce ligated fragments;
- (e) addition of isolating nucleic acid molecules which bind to the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments, wherein said isolating nucleic acid molecules are labelled with a first half of a binding pair;
- (f) isolating ligated fragments which contain the sub-group of target
- 20 nucleic acid segments bound to the isolating nucleic acid molecules by using the second half of the binding pair; and
- (g) sequencing the isolated ligated fragments from step (f) to identify the nucleic acid segments which interact with the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments.

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According to a second aspect of the invention which may be mentioned, there is provided a method for identifying a nucleic acid segment which interacts with a target nucleic acid segment, said method comprising the steps of:

- 30 (a) obtaining a nucleic acid composition comprising the target nucleic acid segment;
- (b) crosslinking the nucleic acid composition;
- (c) fragmenting the crosslinked nuclear composition;
- (d) ligating the fragmented nucleic acid segments obtained from step (c) to produce ligated fragments;

(e) addition of an isolating nucleic acid molecule configured to bind to the target nucleic acid segment, wherein said isolating nucleic acid molecule is labelled with a first half of a binding pair;

5 (f) isolating ligated fragments which contain the target nucleic acid segment bound to the isolating nucleic acid molecule by using the second half of the binding pair; and

(g) sequencing the isolated ligated fragments from step (f) to identify the nucleic acid segment which interacts with the target nucleic acid segment.

10 The method of the present invention provides a means for identifying interacting sequences by using an isolating nucleic acid molecule to isolate a target nucleic acid segment, in particular isolating nucleic acid molecules which isolate a sub-group of target nucleic acid segments. This helps to focus the data on particular interactions within enormously complex libraries and can be used to organize the
15 information into various subsets depending on the type of isolating nucleic acid molecules used (*e.g.* promoters to identify promoter interactions). Detailed information on the chromosomal interactions within a particular subset can then be obtained.

20 Whereas previous techniques, such as 4C, allow the capture of genome-wide interactions of one or a few promoters, the method described herein can capture over 22,000 promoters and their interacting genomic loci in a single experiment. Moreover, the present method yields a significantly more quantitative readout.

25 The Genome-Wide Association Studies (GWAS) have identified thousands of single-nucleotide polymorphisms (SNPs) that are linked to disease. However, many of these SNPs are located at great distances from genes, making it very challenging to predict on which genes they act. Therefore the present method provides a way of identifying interacting nucleic acid segments, even if they are
30 located far away from each other within the genome.

References to "nucleic acid segments" as used herein, are equivalent to references to "nucleic acid sequences", and refer to any polymer of nucleotides (*i.e.*, for example, adenine (A), thymidine (T), cytosine (C), guanosine (G),

and/or uracil (U)). This polymer may or may not result in a functional genomic fragment or gene. A combination of nucleic acid sequences may ultimately comprise a chromosome. A nucleic acid sequence comprising deoxyribonucleosides is referred to as deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA). A nucleic acid sequence comprising ribonucleosides is referred to as ribonucleic acid (RNA). RNA can be further characterized into several types, such as protein-coding RNA, messenger RNA (mRNA), transfer RNA (tRNA), long non-coding RNA (lncRNA), long intergenic non-coding RNA (lincRNA), antisense RNA (asRNA), micro RNA (miRNA), short interfering RNA (siRNA), small nuclear (snRNA) and small nucleolar RNA (snoRNA).

"Single nucleotide polymorphisms" or "SNPs" are single nucleotide variations (*i.e.* A, C, G or T) within a genome that differ between members of a biological species or between paired chromosomes.

It will be understood that the "target nucleic acid segment" refers to the sequence of interest which is known to the user. Isolating only the ligated fragments which contain the target nucleic acid segment helps to focus the data to identify specific interactions with a particular gene of interest.

References herein to the term "interacts" or "interacting", refer to an association between two elements, for example in the present method, a genomic interaction between a nucleic acid segment and a target nucleic acid segment. The interaction usually causes one interacting element to have an effect upon the other, for example, silencing or activating the element it binds to. The interaction may occur between two nucleic acid segments that are located close together or far apart on the linear genome sequence.

References herein to the term "nucleic acid composition", refers to any composition comprising nucleic acids and protein. The nucleic acids within the nucleic acid composition may be organized into chromosomes, wherein the proteins (*i.e.*, for example, histones) may become associated with the chromosomes having a regulatory function. In one embodiment, the nucleic acid

composition comprises a nuclear composition. Such a nuclear composition may typically include a nuclear genome organisation or chromatin.

References to "crosslinking" or "crosslink" as used herein, refers to any stable
5 chemical association between two compounds, such that they may be further
processed as a unit. Such stability may be based upon covalent and/or non-
covalent bonding (*e.g.* ionic). For example, nucleic acids and/or proteins may be
crosslinked by chemical agents (*i.e.*, for example, a fixative), heat, pressure,
change in pH, or radiation, such that they maintain their spatial relationships
10 during routine laboratory procedures (*i.e.*, for example, extracting, washing,
centrifugation *etc.*). Crosslinking as used herein is equivalent to the terms
"fixing" or "fixation", which applies to any method or process that immobilizes
any and all cellular processes. A crosslinked/fixed cell, therefore, accurately
maintains the spatial relationships between components within the nucleic acid
15 composition at the time of fixation. Many chemicals are capable of providing
fixation, including but not limited to, formaldehyde, formalin, or glutaraldehyde.

References to the term "fragments" as used herein, refers to any nucleic acid
sequence that is shorter than the sequence from which it is derived. Fragments
20 can be of any size, ranging from several megabases and/or kilobases to only a
few nucleotides long. Fragments are suitably greater than 5 nucleotide bases in
length, for example 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 40, 50, 100, 250, 500, 750, 1000, 2000,
5000 or 10000 nucleotide bases in length. Fragments may be even longer, for
example 1, 5, 10, 20, 25, 50, 75, 100, 200, 300, 400 or 500 nucleotide
25 kilobases in length. Methods such as restriction enzyme digestion, sonication,
acid incubation, base incubation, microfluidization *etc.*, can all be used to
fragment a nucleic acid composition in the second aspect of the invention.

References herein to the term "ligated", refers to any linkage of two nucleic acid
30 segments usually comprising a phosphodiester bond. The linkage is normally
facilitated by the presence of a catalytic enzyme (*i.e.*, for example, a ligase such
as T4 DNA ligase) in the presence of co-factor reagents and an energy source
(*i.e.*, for example, adenosine triphosphate (ATP)). In the method described

herein, the fragments of two nucleic acid segments that have been crosslinked are ligated together in order to produce a single ligated fragment.

References herein to an "isolating nucleic acid molecule" refer to a molecule
5 formed of nucleic acids which binds to the target nucleic acid segment. For
example, the isolating nucleic acid molecule may contain the complementary
sequence to the target nucleic acid segment which will then form interactions
with the nucleotide bases of the target nucleic acid segment (*i.e.* to form base
pairs (bp)). It will be understood that the isolating nucleic acid molecule, for
10 example biotinylated RNA, does not need to contain the entire complementary
sequence of the target nucleic acid segment in order to form complementary
interactions and isolate it from the nucleic acid composition. The isolating nucleic
acid molecule may be at least 10 nucleotide bases long, for example, at least 20,
30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90, 100, 130, 150, 170, 200, 300, 400, 500, 750, 1000,
15 2000, 3000, 4000 or 5000 nucleotide bases long.

References herein to a "binding pair" refer to at least two moieties (*i.e.* a first
half and a second half) that specifically recognize each other in order to form an
attachment. Suitable binding pairs include, for example, biotin and avidin or
20 biotin and derivatives of avidin such as streptavidin and neutravidin.

References herein to "labelling" or "labelled" refer to the process of
distinguishing a target by attaching a marker, wherein the marker comprises a
specific moiety having a unique affinity for a ligand (*i.e.* an affinity tag). For
25 example, the label may serve to selectively purify the isolating nucleic acid
sequence (*i.e.*, for example, by affinity chromatography). Such a label may
include, but is not limited to, a biotin label, a histidine label (*i.e.* 6His), or a FLAG
label.

30 In one embodiment, the target nucleic acid molecule, *i.e.* the sub-group of
target nucleic acid molecules, are selected from a promoter, enhancer, silencer
or insulator. In a further embodiment, the target nucleic acid molecule is a
promoter. In a further alternative embodiment, the target nucleic acid molecule
is an insulator.

References herein to the term "promoter" refer to a nucleic acid sequence which facilitates the initiation of transcription of an operably linked coding region. Promoters are sometimes referred to as "transcription initiation regions".
5 Regulatory elements often interact with promoters in order to activate or inhibit transcription.

The present inventors have used the method of the invention to identify thousands of promoter interactions, with ten to twenty interactions occurring per
10 promoter. The method described herein has identified some interactions to be cell specific, or to be associated with different disease states. A wide range of separation distances between interacting nucleic acid segments has also been identified – most interactions are within 100 kilobases, but some can extend to 2 megabases and beyond. Interestingly, the method has also been used to show
15 that both active and inactive genes form interactions.

Nucleic acid segments that are identified to interact with promoters are candidates to be regulatory elements that are required for proper genetic control. Their disruption may alter transcriptional output and contribute to
20 disease, therefore linking these elements to their target genes could provide potential new drug targets for new therapies.

Identifying which regulatory elements interact with promoters is crucial to understanding genetic interactions. The present method also provides a
25 snapshot look at the interactions within the nucleic acid composition at a particular point in time, therefore it is envisaged that the method could be performed over a series of time points or developmental states or experimental conditions to build a picture of the changes of interactions within the nucleic acid composition of a cell.

30

It will be understood that in one embodiment the target nucleic acid segment interacts with a nucleic acid segment which comprises a regulatory element. In a further embodiment, the regulatory element comprises an enhancer, silencer or insulator.

The term "regulatory gene" as used herein, refers to any nucleic acid sequence encoding a protein, wherein the protein binds to the same or a different nucleic acid sequence thereby modulating the transcription rate or otherwise affecting the expression level of the same or a different nucleic acid sequence. The term "regulatory element" as used herein, refers to any nucleic acid sequence that affects the activity status of another genomic element. For example, various regulatory elements may include, but are not limited to, enhancers, activators, repressors, insulators, promoters or silencers.

In one embodiment, the target nucleic acid molecule is a genomic site identified through chromatin immunoprecipitation (ChIP) sequencing. ChIP sequencing experiments analyse protein-DNA interactions by crosslinking protein-DNA complexes within a nucleic acid composition. The protein-DNA complex is then isolated (by immunoprecipitation) prior to sequencing the genomic region to which the protein is bound.

It will be envisaged that in some embodiments, the nucleic acid segment is located on the same chromosome as the target nucleic acid segment. Alternatively, the nucleic acid segment is located on a different chromosome to the target nucleic acid segment.

The method may be used to identify a long range interaction, a short range interaction or a close neighbour interaction. The term "long range interaction" as used herein, refers to the detection of interacting nucleic acid segments that are far apart within the linear genome sequence. This type of interaction may identify two genomic regions that are, for instance, located on different arms of the same chromosome, or located on different chromosomes. The term "short range interaction" as used herein, refers to the detection of interacting nucleic acid segments that are located relatively close to each other within the genome. The term "close neighbour interaction" as used herein, refers to the detection of interacting nucleic acid segments that are very close to each other in the linear genome and, for instance, part of the same gene.

SNPs have been shown by the present inventors to be positioned more often in an interacting nucleic acid segment than would be expected by chance, therefore the method of the present invention can be used to identify which SNPs interact, and are therefore likely to regulate, specific genes.

5

In one embodiment, the isolating nucleic acid molecules are obtained from bacterial artificial chromosomes (BACs), fosmids or cosmids. In a further embodiment, the isolating nucleic acid molecules are obtained from bacterial artificial chromosomes (BACs).

10

In one embodiment, the isolating nucleic acid molecules are DNA, cDNA or RNA. In a further embodiment, the isolating nucleic acid molecules are RNA.

The isolating nucleic acid molecule may be employed in a suitable method, such as solution hybridization selection (see WO2009/099602). In this method a set of 'bait' sequences is generated to form a hybridization mixture that can be used to isolate a sub group of target nucleic acids from a sample (*i.e.* 'pond').

In one embodiment, the first half of the binding pair comprises biotin and the second half of the binding pair comprises streptavidin.

In one embodiment, fragmentation (*i.e.* step (c) of the second aspect of the invention) is performed using a restriction enzyme or sonication. In a further embodiment, step (c) of the second aspect of the invention is performed using a restriction enzyme. For the avoidance of doubt, it will be appreciated that step (c) of the first aspect of the invention is performed using sonication.

The term "restriction enzyme" as used herein, refers to any protein that cleaves nucleic acid at a specific base pair sequence. Cleavage can result in a blunt or sticky end, depending on the type of restriction enzyme chosen. Examples of restriction enzymes include, but are not limited to, EcoRI, EcoRII, BamHI, HindIII, DpnII, BglII, NcoI, TaqI, NotI, HinfI, Sau3A, PvuII, SmaI, HaeIII, HgaI, AluI, EcoRV, KpnI, PstI, SacI, SalI, ScaI, SpeI, SphI, StuI, XbaI. In one embodiment, the restriction enzyme is HindIII.

In one embodiment, the method additionally comprises incorporating a junction marker into the ligated fragments during step (d).

- 5 The term "junction marker" as used herein, refers to any compound or chemical moiety that is capable of being incorporated within a nucleic acid and can provide a basis for selective purification. For example, a junction marker may include, but not be limited to, a labeled nucleotide linker (*e.g.* biotin), a labeled and/or modified nucleotide, nick translation, primer linkers, or tagged linkers.

10

The junction marker allows ligated fragments to be purified prior to isolation step (f), therefore this ensures that only ligated sequences are bound by the isolating nucleic acid molecule, rather than non-ligated (*i.e.* non-interacting) fragments.

- 15 In one embodiment, the junction marker comprises a labeled nucleotide linker (*i.e.*, for example, biotin). In a further embodiment, the junction marker comprises biotin. In one embodiment, the junction marker comprises a modified nucleotide. In one embodiment, the junction marker comprises a primer linker.

- 20 In one embodiment, the nucleic acid fragments are prevented from ligating to each other in step (d), without the addition of a junction marker, *i.e.* the junction marker will contain a linker sequence.

- In one embodiment, the method additionally comprises reversing the cross-linking prior to step (e). It will be understood that there are several ways known in the art to reverse crosslinks and it will depend upon the way in which the crosslinks are originally formed. For example, crosslinks may be reversed by subjecting the crosslinked nucleic acid composition to high heat, such as above 50°C, 55°C, 60°C, 65°C, 70°C, 75°C, 80°C, 85 °C, or greater. Furthermore, 25 the crosslinked nucleic acid composition may need to be subjected to high heat for longer than 1 hour, for example, at least 5 hours, 6 hours, 7 hours, 8 hours, 9 hours, 10 hours or 12 hours or longer. In one embodiment, reversing the cross-linking prior to step (e) comprises incubating the crosslinked nucleic acid 30

composition at 65°C for at least 8 hours (*i.e.* overnight) in the presence of Proteinase K.

In one embodiment, the method additionally comprises purifying the nucleic acid composition to remove any fragments which do not contain the junction marker prior to step (e).

References herein to "purifying", may refer to a nucleic acid composition that has been subjected to treatment (*i.e.*, for example, fractionation) to remove various other components, and which composition substantially retains its expressed biological activity. Where the term "substantially purified" is used, this designation will refer to a composition in which the nucleic acid forms the major component of the composition, such as constituting about 50%, about 60%, about 70%, about 80%, about 90%, about 95% or more of the composition (*i.e.*, for example, weight/weight and/or weight/volume).

In one embodiment, the method additionally comprises ligating paired end adapter sequences to the ends of the isolated target ligated fragments prior to step (g).

The term "paired end adapters" as used herein, refers to any primer pair set that allows automated high throughput sequencing to read from both ends simultaneously. For example, such high throughput sequencing devices that are compatible with these adaptors include, but are not limited to Solexa (Illumina), the 454 System, and/or the ABI SOLiD. For example, the method may include using universal primers in conjunction with poly-A tails.

In one embodiment, the method additionally comprises amplifying the isolated target ligated fragments prior to step (g). In a further embodiment, the amplifying is performed by polymerase chain reaction (PCR).

In one embodiment, the nucleic acid composition is derived from a mammalian cell nucleus. In a further embodiment, the mammalian cell nucleus may be a human cell nucleus. Many human cells are available in the art for use in the

method described herein, for example GM12878 (a human lymphoblastoid cell line) or CD34+ (human *ex vivo* haematopoietic progenitors).

It will be appreciated that the method described herein finds utility in a range of organisms, not just humans. For example, the present method may also be used to identify genomic interactions in plants and animals.

Therefore, in an alternative embodiment, the nucleic acid composition is derived from a non-human cell nucleus. In one embodiment, the non-human cell is selected from the group including, but not limited to, plants, yeast, mice, cows, pigs, horses, dogs, cats, goats, or sheep. In one embodiment, the non-human cell nucleus is a mouse cell nucleus or a plant cell nucleus.

According to a further aspect of the invention, there is provided a method of identifying one or more interacting nucleic acid segments that are indicative of a particular disease state comprising:

a) performing the method defined herein on a nucleic acid composition obtained from an individual with a particular disease state;

b) quantifying a frequency of interaction between a nucleic acid segment and a target nucleic acid segment;

c) comparing the frequency of interaction in the nucleic acid composition from the individual with said disease state with the frequency of interaction in a normal control nucleic acid composition from a healthy subject, such that a difference in the frequency of interaction in the nucleic acid composition is indicative of a particular disease state.

References to "frequency of interaction" or "interaction frequency" as used herein, refers to the number of times a specific interaction occurs within a nucleic acid composition (*i.e.* sample). In some instances, a lower frequency of interaction in the nucleic acid composition, compared to a normal control nucleic acid composition from a healthy subject, is indicative of a particular disease state (*i.e.* because the nucleic acid segments are interacting less frequently). Alternatively, a higher frequency of interaction in the nucleic acid composition, compared to a normal control nucleic acid composition from a healthy subject, is

indicative of a particular disease state (*i.e.* because the nucleic acid segments are interacting more frequently). In some instances, the difference will be represented by at least a 0.5-fold difference, such as a 1-fold, 1.5-fold, 2-fold, 2.5-fold, 3-fold, 4-fold, 5-fold, 7-fold or 10-fold difference.

5

In one aspect of the invention, the frequency of interaction may be used to determine the spatial proximity of two different nucleic acid segments. As the interaction frequency increases, the probability increases that the two genomic regions are physically proximal to one another in 3D nuclear space. Conversely,
10 as the interaction frequency decreases, the probability decreases that the two genomic regions are physically proximal to one another in 3D nuclear space.

Quantifying can be performed by any method suitable to calculate the frequency of interaction in a nucleic acid composition from a patient or a purification or
15 extract of a nucleic acid composition sample or a dilution thereof. For example, high throughput sequencing results can also enable examination of the frequency of a particular interaction. In methods of the invention, quantifying may be performed by measuring the concentration of the target nucleic acid segment or ligation products in the sample or samples. The nucleic acid
20 composition may be obtained from cells in biological samples that may include cerebrospinal fluid (CSF), whole blood, blood serum, plasma, or an extract or purification therefrom, or dilution thereof. In one embodiment, the biological sample may be cerebrospinal fluid (CSF), whole blood, blood serum or plasma. Biological samples also include tissue homogenates, tissue sections and biopsy
25 specimens from a live subject, or taken post-mortem. The samples can be prepared, for example where appropriate diluted or concentrated, and stored in the usual manner.

In one embodiment, the disease state is selected from: cancer, autoimmune
30 disease, a developmental disorder, a genetic disorder, diabetes, cardiovascular disease, kidney disease, lung disease, liver disease, neurological disease, viral infection or bacterial infection. In a further embodiment, the disease state is cancer or autoimmune disease. In a yet further embodiment, the disease state is cancer, for example breast, bowel, bladder, bone, brain, cervical, colon,

endometrial, esophageal, kidney, liver, lung, ovarian, pancreatic, prostate, skin, stomach, testicular, thyroid or uterine cancer, leukemia, lymphoma, myeloma or melanoma.

- 5 References herein to an "autoimmune disease" include conditions which arise from an immune response targeted against a person's own body, for example Acute disseminated encephalomyelitis (ADEM), Ankylosing Spondylitis, Behçet's disease, Celiac disease, Crohn's disease, Diabetes mellitus type 1, Graves' disease, Guillain-Barré syndrome (GBS), Psoriasis, Rheumatoid arthritis, 10 Rheumatic fever, Sjögren's syndrome, Ulcerative colitis and Vasculitis.

- References herein to a "developmental disorder" include conditions, usually originating from childhood, such as learning disabilities, communication disorders, Autism, Attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and 15 Developmental coordination disorder.

- References herein to a "genetic disorder" include conditions which result from one or more abnormalities in the genome, such as Angelman syndrome, Canavan disease, Charcot-Marie-Tooth disease, Color blindness, Cri du chat 20 syndrome, Cystic fibrosis, Down syndrome, Duchenne muscular dystrophy, Haemochromatosis, Haemophilia, Klinefelter syndrome, Neurofibromatosis, Phenylketonuria, Polycystic kidney disease, Prader-Willi syndrome, Sickle-cell disease, Tay-Sachs disease and Turner syndrome.

- 25 According to a further aspect of the invention, there is provided a kit for identifying nucleic acid segments which interact with a sub-group of target nucleic acid segments, which comprises buffers and reagents capable of performing the methods defined herein.

- 30 According to a further aspect of the invention which may be mentioned, there is provided a kit for identifying a nucleic acid segment which interacts with a target nucleic acid segment, which comprises buffers and reagents capable of performing the methods defined herein.

The kit may include one or more articles and/or reagents for performance of the method. For example, an oligonucleotide probe and/or pair of amplification primers for use in the methods described herein may be provided in isolated form and may be part of a kit, *e.g.* in a suitable container such as a vial in which the contents are protected from the external environment. The kit may include instructions for use according to the protocol of the method described herein. A kit wherein the nucleic acid is intended for use in PCR may include one or more other reagents required for the reaction, such as polymerase, nucleotides, buffer solution etc.

It will be understood that examples of the types of buffers and reagents to be included in the kit can be seen in the Examples described herein.

EXAMPLE 1: Promoter Capture Hi-C protocol5 Day 1: Fixation of cells, HindIII digestion

1. Start with 3×10^7 to 4×10^7 cells. Make up to 37 ml with room temperature DMEM/10% FBS.
2. Add formaldehyde to a final concentration of 2% and fix for exactly 10
10 minutes at room temperature while mixing on a rocker.
3. Quench reaction by adding 6 ml cold 1M glycine (0.125 M final).
4. Incubate for 5 minutes at room temperature, followed by 15 minutes on ice.
15
5. Centrifuge at 1500rpm (400xg) for 10 minutes at 4°C.
6. Discard supernatant, re-suspend pellet carefully in cold 1xPBS, add cold
20 1xPBS to a final volume of 50ml.
7. Centrifuge at 1500rpm (400xg) for 10 minutes at 4°C, then discard
supernatant. The cells can be flash frozen in liquid nitrogen and stored cells at -
80°C.
- 25 8. Resuspend cells in 50ml ice-cold lysis buffer (10 mM Tris-HCl pH 8, 10 mM
NaCl, 0.2% Igepal CA-630, add one tablet protease inhibitor cocktail (Roche
complete, EDTA-free, 11873580001). Make fresh just before use.
9. Optional, but recommended for some cell types: dounce homogenize the
30 cells (2 x 10 strokes, with a 5 minute break in between, while cells are kept on
ice) during the 30 minutes incubation (see step 10 below).
10. Incubate on ice for 30 minutes with occasional mixing.

11. Spin the chromatin at 1800 rpm for 5 minutes at 4°C, discard supernatant.

12. Carefully layer approximately 500µl 1.25x NEBuffer 2 on top of the cell pellet, but do not resuspend. This step is to remove any remaining lysis buffer.

5 Discard the supernatant.

13. Resuspend the pellet in 250µl of 1.25x NEBuffer 2 per 5 to 6 Mio cells.

For example: when starting with 30 Mio cells, resuspend pellet in 1.5ml 1.25x NEBuffer 2.

10

14. Split into 250µl aliquots corresponding to 5 to 6 Mio cells each (starting).

For example: when starting with 30 Mio cells, divide in 6 aliquots with 250µl each.

15 15. To each of the aliquots, add 108 µl 1.25x NEBuffer 2 (final volume 358 µl).

16. Add 11 µl 10% SDS per tube, mix carefully, and incubate at 37°C for 60 minutes, rotating at 950 rpm.

20 This step removes proteins that were not directly cross-linked to the DNA.

17. Quench the SDS by adding 75µl 10% Triton X-100 per tube, and incubate at 37°C for 60 minutes, rotating at 950 rpm.

25 18. Digest the chromatin by adding 1500 units of HindIII (NEB R0104T) per tube and incubate at 37°C overnight while rotating (950 rpm).

Day 2: Biotinylation of DNA ends, ligation

Note: start this day by preparing ligation buffer mix (see Day 2, step 5), but add

30 10x ligation buffer only just before use.

1. Place tubes on ice. Perform biotinylation step with Hi-C samples as described below.

2. To fill in the restriction fragment overhangs and mark the DNA ends with biotin, add 6µl 10x NEB2, 2µl H₂O, 1.5µl 10mM dCTP, 1.5µl 10mM dGTP, 1.5µl 10mM dTTP, 37.5µl 0.4mM biotin-14-dATP (Life Technologies 19524-016), and 10µl 5U/µl Klenow (DNA polymerase I large fragment, NEB M0210L). Mix
5 carefully and incubate for 60 minutes at 37°C. Do not rotate but pipette up and down carefully (approximately every 10 minutes) to mix, avoiding bubbles.

3. Place tubes on ice. To inactivate the enzymes, add 86µl 10% SDS (final concentration 1.47%) to all tubes.

10

4. Incubate enzymes at 65°C for exactly 30 minutes at 950 rpm and place tubes on ice immediately afterwards.

5. During the incubation (Day 2, step 4), prepare one 15 ml falcon tube per
15 sample with each 7.61 ml ligation mix (745µl 10% Triton X-100, 820µl 10x ligation buffer (NEB B0202S), 82µl 10mg/ml BSA (NEB B9001S), and 5.965 ml water). Transfer each digested chromatin mixture (Day 2, step 4) to the corresponding 15 ml tube.

20 6. Incubate at 37°C for 60 minutes, with occasional mixing

7. Add 50µl 1U/µl T4 DNA ligase (Invitrogen 15224-025) to each tube. Mix by inverting the tubes and incubate for 4 hours at 16°C.

25 8. Incubate a further 30 minutes at room temperature.

9. Crosslinks are reversed and protein is degraded by adding 60µl 10mg/ml proteinase K (Roche 03115879001) per tube and incubating the tubes overnight at 65°C.

30

Day 3: DNA purification part I

1. After the overnight incubation, add an additional 60µl 10 mg/ml proteinase K per tube and continue the incubation at 65°C for another 2 hours.

2. Cool the reaction mixtures to room temperature. Add 12.5µl of 10mg/ml RNase A (Roche 10109142001) and incubate at 37°C for 60 minutes.

3. Purify the DNA in these tubes by performing a phenol extraction. Transfer the reaction mixtures to 50ml falcon tubes, and add 8ml phenol pH8.0 (Sigma P4557). Vortex for 1 minute, and spin the tubes for 10 minutes at 3500 rpm, then carefully transfer as much of the aqueous phase as possible to a new 50 ml falcon tube.

4. 'Back-extraction': transfer 2.5ml of 1xTE (10mM Tris-HCl pH8, 1mM EDTA) to the tubes containing the lower phase from the Day 3, step 3. Vortex for 1 minute, and spin the tubes for 10 minutes at 3500 rpm, then carefully transfer as much of the aqueous upper phase as possible to the supernatant in the corresponding tube from Day 3, step 3.

5. Repeat the extraction using 10ml phenol pH8.0:chloroform (Sigma P3803), following the steps described on Day 3, step 3.

6. To precipitate the DNA, add 1000µl 3M sodium acetate pH5.2, and 25 ml of ice cold 100 % ethanol to each tube. Incubate overnight at -20°C.

Day 4: DNA purification part II

1. Spin at 3500 rpm at 4°C for 30 minutes.

2. Discard the supernatant and resuspend each pellet in 400µl 1xTE. The DNA can be stored at -20°C at this step if necessary.

3. Another round of purification is performed by doing 2 phenol:chloroform extractions. Add 450µl phenol pH 8.0:chloroform (1:1) and vortex for 1 minute. Centrifuge the tubes for 10 minutes at 14,000 rpm and transfer the aqueous phase to a new tube. After the second extraction, precipitate the DNA by adding 0.1x volume of 3M sodium acetate pH 5.2 and 2.5x volume of 100% ethanol, and incubate overnight at -20 °C.

Day 5: DNA purification part III

1. After spinning down the precipitated DNA (14,000 rpm at 4°C for 30 minutes), wash each DNA pellet three times with 70% ethanol and re-suspend each DNA pellet in 25µl 1x TE.

5

2. Pool the contents of all Hi-C tubes.

3. Use the Quant-iT PicoGreen (Life Technologies P7589) assay to determine the DNA yields. Make 1:200, 1:500 and 1:1000 dilutions for each of the Hi-C libraries.

10

Day 6 + 7: Hi-C ligation efficiency and quality controls

1. To check the quality and quantity of the libraries, run 2µl and 6µl aliquots of 1:10 dilutions from the Hi-C libraries on a 0.8% agarose gel. The libraries should run as a rather tight band over 10 kb.

15

2. Hi-C marking and Hi-C ligation efficiency is verified by a PCR digest assay. Successful fill-in and ligation of a HindIII site (AAGCTT) creates a site for the restriction enzyme NheI (GCTAGC).

20

Set up five (identical) 25µl PCR reactions to amplify a short-range ligation product (formed from two nearby restriction fragments), for example the Fraser lab *Calr* control. Use 200 ng of each Hi-C library as template. The PCR products are then pooled, purified (Qiagen PCR purification kit), and the concentration is determined (Nanodrop). Subsequently, split into four samples (undigested, digest with HindIII, digest with NheI, and digest with both HindIII and NheI). Aim for 500 to 600 ng of PCR product per digest. After running the digested samples on a 1.5% gel, the relative number of 3C and Hi-C ligation events can be estimated by quantifying the intensity of the cut and uncut bands.

25

3. Check for known long-range interactions, such as between *Hbb* and *Eraf* in mouse erythroid cells, in the Hi-C libraries.

30

Day 8: Removal of biotin from non-ligated DNA ends

1. Biotin-14-dATP at non-ligated DNA ends is removed with the exonuclease activity of T4 DNA polymerase. For each reaction (set up at least 8 reactions in total per Hi-C library, corresponding to 40µg total), mix 5µg of Hi-C library with 0.5µl 10 mg/ml BSA, 5µl 10x NEBuffer 2, 2µl 2.5mM dATP, and 5µl T4 DNA polymerase (NEB M0203L) in a total volume of 50µl. Incubate at 20°C for 4 hours.

2. Stop the reaction by adding 2ml 0.5 M EDTA pH 8.0 to each tube.

3. Pool 2 reactions each from Day 8, step 1 (total amount of DNA now approximately 10µg per sample).

To purify the DNA, phenol:chloroform extract, followed by ethanol precipitation as described on Day 4, step 3. Incubate for several hours to overnight at -20°C.

4. Spin samples for 30 minutes at 14,000 rpm at 4°C. Discard supernatant and wash once with 70% ethanol. Discard supernatant, air-dry DNA pellets and resuspend in 130µl H₂O per sample (each sample should contain around 10mg of DNA at this stage).

Day 9: DNA shearing and end repair

1. Use Covaris E220 for sonication. Settings for DNA shearing to obtain fragments with a peak around 400 bp:

Duty Factor 10%

Peak Incident Power (w): 140

Cycles per burst: 200

Time: 55 seconds

2. After sonication, transfer the entire volume of each sample (130µl) into a fresh Eppendorf tube. Add the following:

18µl 10x ligation buffer (NEB B0202S)

18µl 2.5mM dNTP mix

6.5µl T4 DNA polymerase (NEB M0203L)

6.5µl T4 DNA Polynucleotide kinase (NEB M0201L)

1.3µl Klenow (NEB M0210L)

Incubate at room temperature for 30 minutes.

3. Split each sample into two (each containing around 5µg DNA, which is the maximal capacity for the columns used below).

Purify DNA with MinElute columns (Qiagen 28004) according to the manufacturer's instructions. Elute each column with 15µl TLE (10mM Tris pH8.0, 0.1mM EDTA), and repeat the elution with another 15µl TLE.

10 Day 10: Addition of dATP, SPRI bead size selection

1. To the sheared and end repaired DNA from Day 9, step 3 (30µl), add the following:

5µl of NEBuffer 2 10x

11.5µl dATP 1mM

- 15 3.5µl Klenow exo- (NEB M0212L)

Incubate at 37°C for 30 minutes.

2. To inactivate the enzyme, incubate at 65°C for 20 minutes, put on ice immediately afterwards.

20

3. Size select fragments between 200 and 650 base pairs by double-sided SPRI bead size selection (0.6x followed by 0.9x). Mix SPRI beads (Beckman Coulter Ampure XP beads A63881) well by vortexing, keep at room temperature for at least 30 minutes.

25

- a) Pool two A-tailed samples from Day 10, step 1 (total volume now 100µl) into a fresh tube (A).

- b) For each sample, prepare one tube (B) with 180µl SPRI bead solution.

30

- c) Add 60µl of SPRI bead solution out of tube (B) into tube (A) with the 100µl of DNA solution (0.6x). Mix thoroughly, incubate for 10 minutes at room temperature, and place on magnetic separator and recover the unbound

supernatant containing the DNA in the desired size range into a fresh tube (tube C). Discard tube (A) containing the beads.

d) Concentrate the SPRI beads: Place tube (B) (containing 120µl of SPRI beads in solution) on the magnet, and remove all but 30µl of the supernatant (*i.e.* discard around 90µl of the supernatant). Take tube (B) off the magnet and resuspend the beads in the remaining 30µl volume.

e) Add 30µl of concentrated beads (see above) from tube (B) into tube (C) (0.9x SPRI bead, *i.e.* ratio of DNA to SPRI beads in solution is now 1:0.9). Mix well, incubate at least 10 minutes at room temperature, place on magnet, and discard supernatant. Wash twice with freshly prepared 70% ethanol. Discard tube (B).

4. Resuspend bead-bound DNA in tube (C) in 50µl TLE (Tris low-EDTA; 10mM Tris, 0.1mM EDTA), incubate at room temperature for 5 minutes, place on magnet and transfer supernatant (containing your size-selected DNA) into a fresh tube (D). Discard tube (C) containing the beads.

5. Pool all Hi-C library samples.

Day 11: Biotin-streptavidin pulldown and adapter ligation

1. Use the Quant-iT PicoGreen (Life Technologies P7589) assay to determine the DNA yields. Prepare 1:20 and 1:50 dilutions for your sample(s). The expected yield from 40µg starting material is about 10µg.

To avoid overloading the beads (see Day 11, step 4), it is recommended to not use more than a maximum of 2.5µg of DNA per 150µl of streptavidin beads.

2. Generate PE adapters by annealing PE adapter primers 1 and 2:

5'-P-GATCGGAAGAGCGGTTCAGCAGGAATGCCGAG-3' (SEQ ID NO: 1)

5'-ACACTCTTTCCCTACACGACGCTCTTCCGATCT-3' (SEQ ID NO: 2)

Mix 15µl of each PE adapter primer with 70µl H₂O (total volume 100µl). In a PCR machine, run the following program: 95°C for 5 minutes, then decrease in temperature by 1°C per minute, until 4°C is reached.

Make PE adapter aliquots (15 μ M) of 10 to 20 μ l, store at -20°C, and thaw aliquot just before use.

3. Prepare buffers:

5 a) TB (Tween buffer): 5mM Tris, 0.5mM EDTA, 1M NaCl, 0.05% Tween
Prepare 1600 μ l per sample

b) NTB (No Tween buffer): 5mM Tris, 0.5mM EDTA, 1M NaCl
Prepare 600 μ l per sample

10 c) NTB 2x: 10mM Tris, 1mM EDTA, 2M NaCl
Prepare 300 μ l per sample

d) Ligation buffer (10x ligation buffer NEB B0202S): 1x
Prepare 150 μ l per sample

e) NEBuffer 2: 1x
Prepare 300 μ l per sample

15

4. Transfer 150 μ l of Dynabeads MyOne Streptavidin C1 beads (Life Technologies 650.01) suspension into a lowbind 1.5ml Eppendorf tube.

Set up one reaction per 2 μ g to 2.5 μ g of DNA as determined on Day 11, step 1.

20

5. Wash beads twice with 400 μ l TB. Wash steps are always:

a) Place sample on magnetic separator and reclaim beads

b) Discard supernatant

c) Add new buffer, mix thoroughly, and transfer sample to a new tube

25 d) Rotate sample for 3 minutes at room temperature

e) see a)

6. Resuspend beads in 300 μ l of NTB 2x. Make up volume of Hi-C DNA (see Day 11, step 1) to 300 μ l with TLE.

30

In case the amount of Hi-C library DNA exceeds 2.5 μ g (see Day 11, steps 1 and 4), prepare the adequate number of Hi-C samples, each containing a maximum of 2.5 μ g of DNA in a total volume of 300 μ l TLE.

Combine the beads with the Hi-C DNA (total volume 600 μ l). Rotate slowly for 30 minutes at room temperature.

7. Place sample on magnetic separator, reclaim beads with bound Hi-C DNA, discard supernatant and wash once with 400µl NTB, followed by another wash with 200µl of 1x ligation buffer.

5

8. Resuspend in 50µl 1x ligation buffer and transfer to a fresh tube. Add 4µl of annealed 15µM PE adapter (see Day 11, step 2), and 4µl of T4 DNA ligase (NEB M0202S). Rotate slowly at room temperature for 2 hours.

10 9. Place sample on magnetic separator, reclaim Hi-C bound beads, and wash twice with 400µl TB each.

10. Wash with 200µl 1xNTB, then wash with 200µl 1xNEBuffer 2.

15 11. Wash with 60µl 1xNEBuffer 2, then resuspend beads in 40µl 1xNEBuffer 2 and transfer into a fresh tube. If more than one streptavidin-biotin pulldown per Hi-C library was performed (*i.e.* if the starting amount of Hi-C library exceeded 2.5µg DNA, see Day 11, steps 1 and 4), pool all reactions. Store at 4°C.

20 Day 12: Test PCRs to determine conditions for Hi-C library amplification

1. To determine the optimal number of PCR cycles for Hi-C library, set up test PCRs with 6, 9, 12, and 15 amplification cycles. Set up 4 reactions, each with:

2. Run 4 different PCRs with following conditions for n cycles:

3. Check the amount of amplified DNA by running the entire reaction (25µl)
20 on a 1.5% agarose gel. Usually, a smear in the range of 300 to 600 bp should be
just about visible at 9 (in some cases 6) cycles of amplification and increase in
intensity with increasing number of PCR cycles.

Day 13: Final PCR amplification of Hi-C library

25 1. Set up x PCR reactions (remaining volume of HiC library divided by factor
2.5) with 25µl each, as described on Day 12, step 1, with one PCR condition (*i.e.*
number of cycles). The number of the PCR cycles will depend on the available
amount of Hi-C library, and the test PCRs (Day 12), but typically 6 to 7 cycles
should be sufficient to obtain approximately 500 ng of Hi-C library required for
30 capture Hi-C (see below).

2. Pool all individual PCR reactions from Day 13, step 1. Place on a magnetic
separator, and transfer the supernatant into a fresh 1.5ml lowbind Eppendorf
tube. Resuspend the streptavidin beads in the original amount of 1xNEBuffer 2

(see Day 11, step 11) and keep as a backup. Determine the volume of the supernatant containing the amplified Hi-C library, and purify by adding 1.8x volume of SPRI beads (Beckman Coulter Ampure XP beads A63881), following the manufacturer's instructions. Resuspend in 100µl of TLE.

5

3. Repeat SPRI bead purification (as described on Day 13, step 2), by adding 180µl of SPRI beads to 100µl of Hi-C library from Day 13, step 2. Resuspend in a final volume of 20µl TLE.

10

4. Check the quality and quantity of the Hi-C library by Bioanalyzer (Agilent). Keep 50ng to 100ng of the Hi-C library back for next generation sequencing.

Day 14: Hybridization of Hi-C library with biotin-RNA

1. Prepare Hi-C library (pond): transfer volume equivalent to 500ng of Hi-C library into a 1.5 ml Eppendorf tube and concentrate using a SpeedVac. Keep 50ng to 100ng Hi-C library back for next generation sequencing. After evaporation of all liquid, resuspend the Hi-C DNA pellet in 3.4µl of H₂O. Add the following components:

- 2.5µl custom blocker 1 (Agilent Technologies)
2.5µl custom blocker 2 (Agilent Technologies)
0.6µl custom blocker 3 (Agilent Technologies)

25

Resuspend thoroughly, transfer into PCR strip (Agilent 410022), close with a PCR strip tube lid (Agilent optical cap 8x strip 401425) and keep on ice.

2. Prepare hybridization buffer (49µl per Capture Hi-C sample) by mixing the following components:

- 25µl SureSelect Hybridization solution 1 (Agilent Technologies)
1µl SureSelect Hybridization solution 2 (Agilent Technologies)
10µl SureSelect Hybridization solution 3 (Agilent Technologies)
13µl SureSelect Hybridization solution 4 (Agilent Technologies)

Mix thoroughly, heat to 65°C for 5 minutes, transfer into PCR strip (Agilent 410022), close with a PCR strip tube lid (Agilent optical cap 8x strip 401425) and keep at room temperature.

- 5 3. Prepare biotin-RNA (bait): transfer 5µl biotinylated RNA (100ng/µl, custom made, Agilent Technologies) into a 1.5ml lowbind Eppendorf tube.

Use nuclease-free water to prepare a 1:4 dilution of SureSelect RNase Block (Agilent Technologies), and add 2µl of the RNase Block dilution to the biotinylated RNA. Mix well, transfer into a PCR strip (Agilent 410022), close with
10 a PCR strip tube lid (Agilent optical cap 8x strip 401425) and keep on ice.

4. Hybridization reaction: Set the PCR machine (PTC-200, MJ Research) to the following program:

1. 95°C for 5 minutes
15 2. 65°C forever

The PCR machine lid has to be heated. Throughout the procedure, work quickly and try to keep the PCR machine lid open for the minimum time possible. Evaporation of the sample will results in suboptimal hybridization conditions.

- 20 Transfer the PCR strip with the pond Hi-C library (DNA; Day 14, step 1) to the PCR machine, in the position marked in black below, and start the PCR program.

- After just over 5 minutes (once the temperature has reached 65°C) transfer the
25 PCR strip with the hybridization buffer (from Day 14, step 2) to the PCR machine, in the position marked in grey below. Incubate for 5 minutes.

Day 15: Streptavidin-biotin pulldown and washes

1. Prepare buffers:

Binding buffer (BB, Agilent Technologies) at room temperature

Wash buffer I (WB I, Agilent Technologies) at room temperature

5 Wash buffer II (WB II Agilent Technologies) at 65°C

NEB2 1x (NEB B7002S) at room temperature.

2. Wash magnetic beads: Mix Dynabeads MyOne Streptavidin T1 (Life Technologies 65601) thoroughly before adding 60µl per Capture Hi-C sample
10 into a 1.5 ml lowbind Eppendorf tube. Wash the beads as follows (same procedures for all subsequent wash steps):

a) Add 200µl BB

b) Mix on vortex (at low to medium setting) for 5 seconds.

c) Place tube on Dynal magnetic separator (Life Technologies)

15 d) Reclaim beads, discard supernatant

Repeat steps a) to d) for a total of 3 washes.

3. Biotin-Streptavidin pulldown: With the streptavidin beads in 200µl BB in a fresh low bind Eppendorf tube, open the lid of the PCR machine (while the PCR
20 machine is running) and pipette the entire hybridization reaction into the tube containing the streptavidin beads.

Incubate on a rotating wheel for 30 minutes at room temperature.

4. Washes: After 30 minutes, place the sample on the magnetic separator,
25 discard supernatant, resuspend beads in 500µl WB I, and transfer to a fresh tube. Incubate at room temperature for 15 minutes. Vortex every 2 to 3 minutes for 5 seconds each.

Separate the beads and buffer on a magnetic separator and remove the supernatant. Resuspend in 500µl WB II (prewarmed to 65°C) and transfer to a
30 fresh tube.

Incubate at 65°C for 10 minutes, and vortex (at low to medium setting) for 5 seconds every 2 to 3 minutes. Repeat for a total of 3 washes in WB II, all at 65°C.

5. After removing the supernatant, resuspend in 200µl 1xNEB2 and transfer immediately to a new tube. Put straight back onto the magnetic separator and remove supernatant.

- 5 6. Resuspend in 30µl 1xNEB2 and transfer to a fresh tube. The RNA/DNA mixture hybrid 'catch' on beads is now ready for PCR amplification.

3. Check the amount of amplified DNA by running the entire reaction (25µl) on a 1.5% agarose gel. Typically, a smear in the range of 300 to 600 bp should be just about visible at 6 to 7 cycles of amplification.

10 Day 17: Final PCR amplification of Capture Hi-C library

1. Set up x PCR reactions (remaining volume of Capture HiC library divided by factor 2.5) with 25µl each, as described on Day 16, step 1, with one PCR condition (*i.e.* chose number of PCR cycles). Typically, 4 PCR cycles should be sufficient to obtain Capture Hi-C library quantities suitable for Illumina
 15 sequencing.

2. Pool all individual PCR reactions from Day 17, step 1. Place on a magnetic separator, and transfer the supernatant into a fresh 1.5ml lowbind Eppendorf tube. Resuspend the streptavidin beads in the original amount of 1xNEBuffer 2
 20 (see Day 15, step 6) and keep as a backup. Determine the volume of the Capture Hi-C library, and purify by adding 1.8x volume of SPRI beads (Beckman Coulter Ampure XP beads A63881), following the manufacturer's instructions. Resuspend in 100µl of TLE.

25 3. Repeat SPRI bead purification (as described on Day 17, step 2), by adding 180µl of SPRI beads to 100µl of Hi-C library from Day 17, step 2. Resuspend in a final volume of 20µl TLE.

30 4. Before sequencing, check the quality and quantity of the Capture Hi-C library by Bioanalyzer (Agilent) and quantitative PCR.

EXAMPLE 2: Sequence Capture of Regions Interacting with Bait Loci (SCRiBL) Hi-C protocol

The present study describes the following three variants of SCRiBL Hi-C, two of which (b and c below) allow for barcoding and multiplexing of samples:

- a) Conventional SCRiBL Hi-C (no barcoding)
- b) Pre-capture barcoding SCRiBL Hi-C
- 5 c) Post-capture barcoding SCRiBL Hi-C

Follow Days 1 to 10 from the protocol in Example 1, then continue with the following steps:

10 **a) Conventional SCRiBL Hi-C:**

Follow Days 11 to 13 from the protocol in Example 1, then continue with Step 14 below.

b) Pre-capture barcoding SCRiBL Hi-C:

15 Day 11: Biotin-streptavidin pulldown and adapter ligation

1. Use the Quant-iT PicoGreen (Life Technologies P7589) assay to determine the DNA yields. Prepare 1:20 and 1:50 dilutions for the sample(s). The expected yield from 40µg starting material is about 10µg.

To avoid overloading the beads (see Day 11, step 4), it is recommended
20 to not use more than a maximum of 2.5µg of DNA per 150µl of streptavidin beads.

2. Generate TruSeq adapters by annealing TruSeq universal adapter primer and TruSeq indexed adapter primer:

Make TruSeq adapter aliquots (15µM) of 10 to 20µl, store at -20°C, and thaw aliquot just before use.

3. Prepare buffers:

5 a) TB (Tween buffer): 5mM Tris, 0.5mM EDTA, 1M NaCl, 0.05% Tween
Prepare 1600µl per sample

b) NTB (No Tween buffer): 5mM Tris, 0.5mM EDTA, 1M NaCl

4. Transfer 150µl of Dynabeads MyOne Streptavidin C1 beads (Life Technologies 650.01) suspension into a lowbind 1.5ml Eppendorf tube.

Set up one reaction per 2µg to 2.5µg of DNA as determined on Day 11, step 1.

5. Wash beads twice with 400µl TB. Wash steps are always:

a) Place sample on magnetic separator and reclaim beads

b) Discard supernatant

c) Add new buffer, mix thoroughly, and transfer sample to a new tube

6. Resuspend beads in 300µl of NTB 2x. Make up volume of Hi-C DNA (see Day 11, step 1) to 300µl with TLE.

In case the amount of Hi-C library DNA exceeds 2.5µg (see Day 11, steps 1 and 4), prepare the adequate number of Hi-C samples, each containing a maximum of 2.5µg of DNA in a total volume of 300µl TLE.

Combine the beads with the Hi-C DNA (total volume 600µl). Rotate slowly for 30 minutes at room temperature.

7. Place sample on magnetic separator, reclaim beads with bound Hi-C DNA, discard supernatant and wash once with 400µl NTB, followed by another wash with 200µl of 1x ligation buffer.

8. Resuspend in 50µl 1x ligation buffer and transfer to a fresh tube. Add 4µl of annealed 15µM TruSeq adapter (see Day 11, step 2), and 4µl of T4 DNA ligase (NEB M0202S). Rotate slowly at room temperature for 2 hours.

Day 13: Final PCR amplification of Hi-C library

Set up one reaction per 2µg to 2.5µg of DNA as determined on Day 11, step 1.

a) Place sample on magnetic separator and reclaim beads

b) Discard supernatant

c) Add new buffer, mix thoroughly, and transfer sample to a new tube

6. Resuspend beads in 300µl of NTB 2x. Make up volume of Hi-C DNA (see Day 11, step 1) to 300µl with TLE.

25 In case the amount of Hi-C library DNA exceeds 2.5µg (see Day 11, steps 1 and 4), prepare the adequate number of Hi-C samples, each containing a maximum of 2.5µg of DNA in a total volume of 300µl TLE.

Combine the beads with the Hi-C DNA (total volume 600µl). Rotate slowly for 30 minutes at room temperature.

30 7. Place sample on magnetic separator, reclaim beads with bound Hi-C DNA, discard supernatant and wash once with 400µl NTB, followed by another wash with 200µl of 1x ligation buffer.

8. Resuspend in 50µl 1x ligation buffer and transfer to a fresh tube. Add 4µl of annealed 15µM SCRiBL adapter (see Day 11, step 2), and 4µl of T4 DNA ligase (NEB M0202S). Rotate slowly at room temperature for 2 hours.

5 9. Place sample on magnetic separator, reclaim Hi-C bound beads, and wash twice with 400µl TB each.

10. Wash with 200µl 1xNTB, then wash with 200µl 1xNEBuffer 2.

10 11. Wash with 60µl 1xNEBuffer 2, then resuspend beads in 40µl 1xNEBuffer 2 and transfer into a fresh tube. If more than one streptavidin-biotin pulldown per Hi-C library was performed (*i.e.* if the starting amount of Hi-C library exceeded 2.5µg DNA, see Day 11, steps 1 and 4), pool all reactions. Store at 4°C.

3. Check the amount of amplified DNA by running the entire reaction (25µl) on a 1.5% agarose gel. Usually, a smear in the range of 300 to 600 bp should be just about visible at 9 (in some cases 6) cycles of amplification and increase in intensity with increasing number of PCR cycles.

Day 13: Final PCR amplification of Hi-C library

Determine the volume of the supernatant containing the amplified Hi-C library, and purify by adding 1.8x volume of SPRI beads (Beckman Coulter Ampure XP beads A63881), following the manufacturer's instructions. Resuspend in 100µl of TLE.

3. Repeat SPRI bead purification (as described on Day 13, step 2), by adding 180µl of SPRI beads to 100µl of Hi-C library from Day 13, step 2. Resuspend in a final volume of 20µl TLE.

- 5 4. Check the quality and quantity of the Hi-C library by Bioanalyzer (Agilent). Keep 50ng to 100ng of the Hi-C library back for next generation sequencing.

Proceed to Day 14

- 10 ***Generation of biotinylated RNA for target enrichment*** (for Conventional SCRiBL Hi-C, Pre-capture barcoding SCRiBL Hi-C, and Post-capture barcoding SCRiBL Hi-C)

Day 14: Digestion of bacterial artificial chromosomes (BACs)

- 15 1. Chose and order bacterial artificial chromosomes (BACs) covering genomic regions of interest. Prepare BAC DNA using the Macherey Nagel NucleoBond BAC 100 kit (REF 740579), following the manufacturer's instructions.
- 20 2. Digest equimolar amounts of BAC DNA (20 to 25µg in total) with 400U HindIII in NEB buffer 2 (1x final) at 37°C overnight, in a total volume of 200 to 250µl.

Note: the restriction enzyme used has to be the same as in Days 1 to 13 of Example 1 Hi-C library generation

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Day 15: Ligation of T7 promoter adapters to digested BAC DNA

1. Perform phenol chloroform extraction, followed by chloroform extraction. Precipitate with 0.1 volumes 3M Sodiumacetate and 2.5 volumes 100% ethanol for a minimum of two hours at -20°C (or overnight at -20°C).
- 30 2. Spin 14,000rpm for 20 minutes at 4°C. Wash with 800µl 70% ethanol, respin, remove ethanol and allow pellets to air dry.

3. Resuspend in 25µl 10mM Tris, pH7.5. Determine concentration by Nanodrop. The yield should be between 15 and 20µg DNA.

4. To prepare the T7 promoter adapter, mix 20µl each of both 'Luo T7 HindIII' and 'Luo T7 HindIII rc' primers (100µM) with 60µl oligo annealing buffer (10mM Tris, pH8.0; 50mM NaCl; 1mM EDTA), so that the final adapter concentration is 20µM.

Use HPLC purified primers. Primer sequences can be found at the end of this part of the protocol.

5. Anneal adapters in a PCR machine: 95°C for 5 minutes, then decrease temperature at a rate of 1°C per minute, until 4°C is reached. The annealed adapters should be frozen in aliquots. Thaw on ice before the experiment and use immediately.

6. Add 15-fold molar excess of adapters (6.2µl assuming for 20µg of BAC DNA, approximately 4kb fragments) to DNA in 1X T4 DNA ligase buffer (NEB B0202S), 12µl (400U/µl) T4 DNA Ligase (NEB M0202S) in a final volume of 150µl. Incubate at 16°C overnight.

Day 16: Sonication of digested T7 promoter-DNA

1. Inactivate T4 DNA ligase by heating at 65°C for 10 minutes, cool on ice.

2. The DNA (BAC HindIII fragments ligated to T7 promoter) will now be in 150µl. Add 120µl H₂O to make 270µl. Remove 10µl to run on gel (pre-sonication sample) and split the remaining volume into two samples of 130µl each (the volume required for the sonication by Covaris E220).

3. Pipette into metal-lidded covaris naked DNA tubes through septum, avoid generating bubbles that may interfere with sonication.

4. Use the following Covaris E220 conditions to generate fragments with a peak at 200 base pairs:

10% duty factor

175W peak incident power
200 cycles per burst
180 seconds treatment time
7°C

5. After sonication, transfer the sample from the covaris tubes into a fresh Eppendorf tube.

6. Optional: Run pre- and post-sonication aliquots on a 2% agarose gel to assess fragmentation.

Day 17: End repair and SPRI bead size selection

1. The recovered volume of sonicated DNA should be 130µl per sample. Add 17µl 2.5mM mixed dNTPs, 9.5µl 10X NEB Ligase buffer (NEB B0202S) making final concentration 1x, 6µl T4 DNA Polymerase (NEB M0203L), 6µl Polynucleotide Kinase (NEB M0201L), 1.5µl Klenow (NEB M0210L), to a final volume of 170µl per reaction. Incubate at room temperature for 30 minutes.

20

2. Separate each of the two 170µl reactions in two Eppendorf tubes containing 85µl each (to avoid overloading the Qiagen purification columns in the subsequent steps). Purify the DNA in all four tubes using the Qiagen PCR purification kit (Qiagen 28104), elute with 50µl each, and then combine two samples each after the final elution (total volume at the end should be 100µl for two samples in total).

25

3. Perform a double-sided SPRI bead (Agencourt AMPure XP beads A63881) size selection (0.7x, followed by 1.0x) to isolate BAC-T7 promoter DNA in the size range of 180 to 300 bp. The recovered volume of sonicated and repaired DNA should be 100µl now (tube A). Mix SPRI beads well by vortexing, and transfer 180µl of SPRI beads into a fresh Eppendorf tube (tube B). Add 70µl of these 180µl of SPRI beads to the 100µl of DNA in tube (A) (0.7X), mix thoroughly, incubate for 10 minutes at room temperature, and place on magnetic separator and recover the unbound supernatant containing the DNA in

30

the desired size range into a fresh tube (tube C). Discard tube (A) containing the beads.

4. This step is to concentrate the beads. Place tube (B) (containing 110µl of SPRI beads) on the magnet, and remove all but 30µl of the supernatant (*i.e.* discard around 80µl of the supernatant). Take tube (B) off the magnet and resuspend the beads in the remaining 30µl volume.

5. Add 30µl of concentrated beads from tube (B) into tube (C) (1.0x SPRI bead, *i.e.* ratio of DNA in solution to SPRI beads in solution is now 1:1). Mix well, incubate 10 minutes at room temperature, place on magnet, and discard supernatant. Discard tube (B).

6. Resuspend bead-bound DNA in tube (C) in 25µl TLE (Tris low-EDTA: 10mM Tris, 0.1mM EDTA), incubate at room temperature for 5 minutes, place on magnet and transfer supernatant (containing your size-selected DNA) into a fresh tube (D). Discard tube (C) containing the beads.

7. Determine the concentration of the size-selected DNA.

Day 18: *In vitro* transcription with biotin-UTP

1. Use the T7 MegaScript kit (Ambion; AM1333) with either Biotin RNA labeling mix (Roche; Cat. No. 11 685 597 910), or (cheaper option) with biotin-UTP (Roche; Cat. No. 11 388 908 910) and mix with standard rNTPs. Set up the following reaction:

2µl 10X buffer

5.5µl DNA template (typically between 100 and 500 ng)

5µl biotin-UTP (Roche 11 388 908 910 stock is 10 mM)

1µl unlabelled rUTP (100 mM stock)

1.5µl rATP (100 mM stock)

1.5µl rCTP (100 mM stock)

1.5µl rGTP (100 mM stock)

2µl enzyme mix

Note: This results in a final nucleotide concentration of 7.5 mM for each nucleotide, with a ratio of labelled to unlabelled UTP of 1:2.

2. Incubate the reaction at 37°C overnight (12 to 16 hours).

Day 19: Purification of biotinylated RNA

1. To remove the template DNA, treat with 1µl Turbo DNase (Life Technologies AM2238) for 15 minutes at 37°C.

- 10 2. Purify the RNA using the Ambion MEGAclean kit (AM1908M) following the manufacturer's instructions. Elute in 50µl final volume. Make 5 to 10µl aliquots and freeze as quickly as possible. The expected yield will typically be between 20µg and 50µg RNA, as determined by Nanodrop. This amount is sufficient for 40 to 100 individual SCRiBL Hi-C reactions (using 500ng of biotinylated RNA bait per experiment).

3. Check the size and integrity of the obtained RNA by running 1 to 2µg of RNA on a 2% agarose gel (use formamide loading dye provided with Ambion MegaScript kit).

Solution hybrid capture of Hi-C library

- 30 Day 20: Hybridization of Hi-C library with biotin-RNA target bait

1. Prepare Hi-C library (pond): transfer volume equivalent to 500ng of Hi-C library (Day 13, step 4 of Example 1) into a 1.5ml lowbind Eppendorf tube and concentrate using a SpeedVac.

Keep 50ng to 100ng Hi-C library back for next generation sequencing.

After evaporation of all liquid, resuspend the Hi-C DNA pellet in 3.5µl of H₂O and transfer into a fresh 1.5 ml lowbind tube (per single SCRiBL reaction). Add the following components:

Add 1.5µl of SUPERase-In (Ambion AM2694, 20 units/µl). Transfer into a PCR strip (Agilent 410022), close with a PCR strip tube lid (Agilent optical cap 8x strip 401425) and keep on ice (volume should now be 7µl).

2. Wash magnetic beads: Mix Dynabeads MyOne Streptavidin T1 (Life Technologies 65601) thoroughly before adding 60µl per SCRiBL Hi-C sample into a 1.5 ml lowbind Eppendorf tube. Wash the beads as follows (same procedures for all subsequent wash steps):

a) Add 200µl BB

b) Mix on vortex (at low to medium setting) for 5 seconds.

c) Place tube on Dynal magnetic separator (Life Technologies)

d) Reclaim beads, discard supernatant

Repeat steps a) to d) for a total of 3 washes.

3. Biotin-Streptavidin pulldown: With the streptavidin beads in 200µl BB in a fresh low bind Eppendorf tube, open the lid of the PCR machine (while the PCR machine is still running), pipette the entire hybridization reaction into the tube containing the streptavidin beads and mix well.

Check the volume of the hybridization reaction at this point. A volume below 20µl means that excessive evaporation is likely to have resulted in suboptimal hybridization conditions.

Incubate on a rotating wheel for 30 minutes at room temperature.

4. Washes: After 30 minutes, place the sample on the magnetic separator, discard supernatant, resuspend beads in 500µl WB I, and transfer to a fresh tube. Incubate at room temperature for 15 minutes. Vortex every 2 to 3 minutes for 5 seconds each.

Separate the beads and buffer on a magnetic separator and remove the supernatant. Resuspend in 500µl WB II (pre-warmed to 65°C) and transfer to a fresh tube.

Incubate at 65°C for 10 minutes, and vortex (at low to medium setting) for 5 seconds every 2 to 3 minutes. Repeat for a total of 3 washes in WB II, all at 65°C.

5. After removing the supernatant, resuspend in 200µl 1xNEB2 and transfer immediately to a new tube. Put straight back onto the magnetic separator and

remove supernatant.

6. Resuspend in 30µl 1xNEB2 and transfer to a fresh tube. The RNA/DNA mixture hybrid 'catch' on beads is now ready for PCR amplification.

Day 23: Final PCR amplification of SCRiBL Hi-C library

- 15 1. Set up x PCR reactions (x equals the remaining volume of SCRiBL HiC library divided by factor 2.5) with 25µl each, as described above (see Day 22, step 1), with one PCR condition (*i.e.* chose number of PCR cycles). Typically, 6 PCR cycles should be sufficient to obtain SCRiBL Hi-C library quantities suitable for Illumina sequencing.

2. Pool all individual PCR reactions from Day 23, step 1. Place on a magnetic separator, and transfer the supernatant into a fresh 1.5ml lowbind Eppendorf tube. Resuspend the streptavidin beads in the original amount of 1xNEBuffer 2 (see Day 21, step 6) and keep as a backup. Determine the volume of the supernatant containing the SCRiBL Hi-C library, and purify by adding 1.8x volume of SPRI beads (Beckman Coulter Ampure XP beads A63881), following the manufacturer's instructions. Resuspend in 100µl of TLE.

3. Repeat SPRI bead purification (as described on Day 23, step 2), by adding 30 180µl of SPRI beads to 100µl of Hi-C library from Day 23, step 2. Resuspend in a final volume of 20µl TLE.

4. Before sequencing, check the quality and quantity of the SCRiBL Hi-C library by Bioanalyzer (Agilent) and quantitative PCR.

EXAMPLE 3: Investigation of MYC gene Promoter Interactions

The method described herein allows the capture of the chromosomal interactions for thousands of promoters simultaneously, which can subsequently be analyzed separately. As an example, the genomic interactions surrounding the MYC gene are shown herein. The results may be explained with reference to **Figure 2** as shown herein.

Figure 2(A) displays the genomic region surrounding the MYC gene. **Figure 2(A)** shows the locations of regions that interact with the MYC promoter in CD34+ haematopoietic progenitor cells, as identified by the method of the invention. The asterisk shows the position of an interacting region that is located 1.8 Mb downstream of the gene that was corroborated as described below.

Figure 2(B) shows an example of a DNA FISH of a CD34+ cell nucleus. In these experiments, fluorescently labelled DNA probes that are specific to regions in the MYC locus (locations shown as bars in **Figure 2(A)**) were hybridised to the genome in fixed CD34+ cell nuclei. The relative separation distances between these probes were measured for 935 loci. Quantitation of the distances is shown as a box and whiskers graph. Column 1 shows the separation distance between the MYC promoter and the distal interacting region. Its separation distance is significantly closer than the MYC promoter and an intervening region that did not show interactions in the method of the invention, or the intervening region and the distal interacting region, as shown by columns 2 and 3, respectively. P-value < 0.001.

Figure 2(C) shows validation of the interaction between the MYC promoter and the region at 1.8 Mb downstream of the gene using the known 3C method. Specific primers to the MYC promoter, the distal interacting element and the intervening region were used to amplify in three independently prepared 3C interaction libraries from CD34+ cells and GM12878 cells, in which the interaction was not detected in the method of the invention. The amplification products from a limited-cycle PCR were run on an agarose gel. L, DNA ladder marker; Co, control amplification product; GM, amplification from the three

GM12878 3C libraries; CD, amplification from the three CD34+ 3C libraries. The graph in Figure 2(C) shows the quantitation of the gels, normalised against the control amplification product, of the MYC promoter interaction with the intervening region (black bars) and the interacting region (grey bars) for
5 GM12878 cells (left) and CD34+ cells (right).

The data presented in Figure 2(B) and 2(C) thus serve as validation of the findings shown in Figure 2(A). Together, these results suggest that the region located 1.8 Mb downstream of the MYC gene interacts with the MYC promoter at
10 significantly higher frequencies than a region that is much closer on the linear genome sequence, as was predicted by the method of the invention.

CLAIMS

1. A method for identifying nucleic acid segments which interact with a sub-group of target nucleic acid segments, said method comprising the steps of:

5 (a) obtaining a nucleic acid composition comprising the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments;

(b) crosslinking the nucleic acid composition;

(c) fragmenting the crosslinked nucleic acid composition by sonication;

10 (d) ligating the fragmented nucleic acid segments obtained from step (c) to produce ligated fragments;

(e) addition of isolating nucleic acid molecules which bind to the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments, wherein said isolating nucleic acid molecules are labelled with a first half of a binding pair;

15 (f) isolating ligated fragments which contain the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments bound to the isolating nucleic acid molecules by using the second half of the binding pair; and

(g) sequencing the isolated ligated fragments from step (f) to identify the nucleic acid segments which interact with the sub-group of target nucleic acid segments.

20 2. The method of claim 1, wherein the sub-group of target nucleic acid molecules are selected from a promoter, silencer, enhancer or insulator, such as a promoter.

25 3. The method of claim 1 or claim 2, wherein the isolating nucleic acid molecules are obtained from bacterial artificial chromosomes (BACs), fosmids or cosmids.

30 4. The method of any one of claims 1 to 3, wherein the isolating nucleic acid molecules are RNA.

5. The method of any one of claims 1 to 4, wherein the first half of the binding pair comprises biotin and the second half of the binding pair comprises streptavidin.

6. The method of any one of claims 1 to 5, which additionally comprises incorporating a junction marker into the ligated fragments during step (d).

5 7. The method of claim 6, wherein the junction marker comprises biotin.

8. The method of any one of claims 1 to 7, which additionally comprises reversing the cross-linking prior to step (e).

10 9. The method of any one of claims 6 to 8, which additionally comprises purifying the nucleic acid composition to remove any fragments which do not contain the junction marker prior to step (e).

10. The method of any one of claims 1 to 9, which additionally comprises
15 ligating paired end adapter sequences to the ends of the isolated target ligated fragments prior to step (g).

11. The method of any one of claims 1 to 10, which additionally comprises amplifying the isolated target ligated fragments prior to step (g).

20

12. The method of claim 11, wherein the amplifying is performed by PCR.

13. The method of any one of claims 1 to 12, wherein said nucleic acid composition is derived from a mammalian cell nucleus, such as a human cell
25 nucleus.

14. The method of any one of claims 1 to 12, wherein said nucleic acid composition is derived from a non-human cell nucleus, such as a mouse cell nucleus or a plant cell nucleus.

30

15. A method of identifying one or more interacting nucleic acid segments that are indicative of a particular disease state comprising:

a) performing the method of any one of claims 1 to 14 on a nucleic acid composition obtained from an individual with a particular disease state;

b) quantifying a frequency of interaction between a nucleic acid segment and a target nucleic acid segment;

c) comparing the frequency of interaction in the nucleic acid composition from the individual with said disease state with the frequency of interaction in a normal control nuclear composition from a healthy subject, such that a difference in the frequency of interaction in the nucleic acid composition is indicative of a particular disease state.

16. The method of claim 15, wherein the disease state is selected from cancer, an autoimmune disease, a developmental disease or a genetic disorder.

17. A kit for identifying nucleic acid segments which interact with a sub-group of target nucleic acid segments, which comprises buffers and reagents capable of performing the method of any one of claims 1 to 14.

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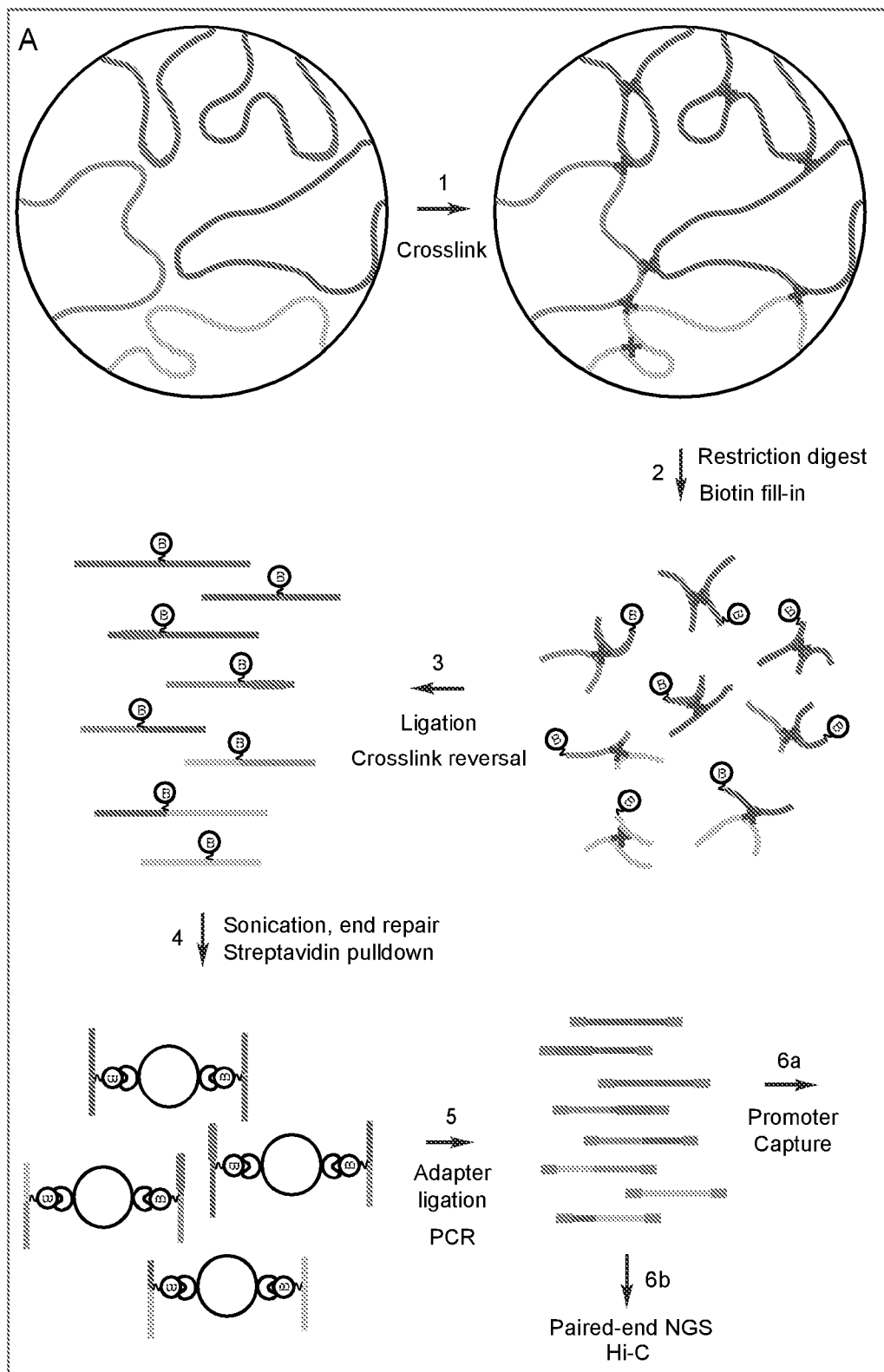

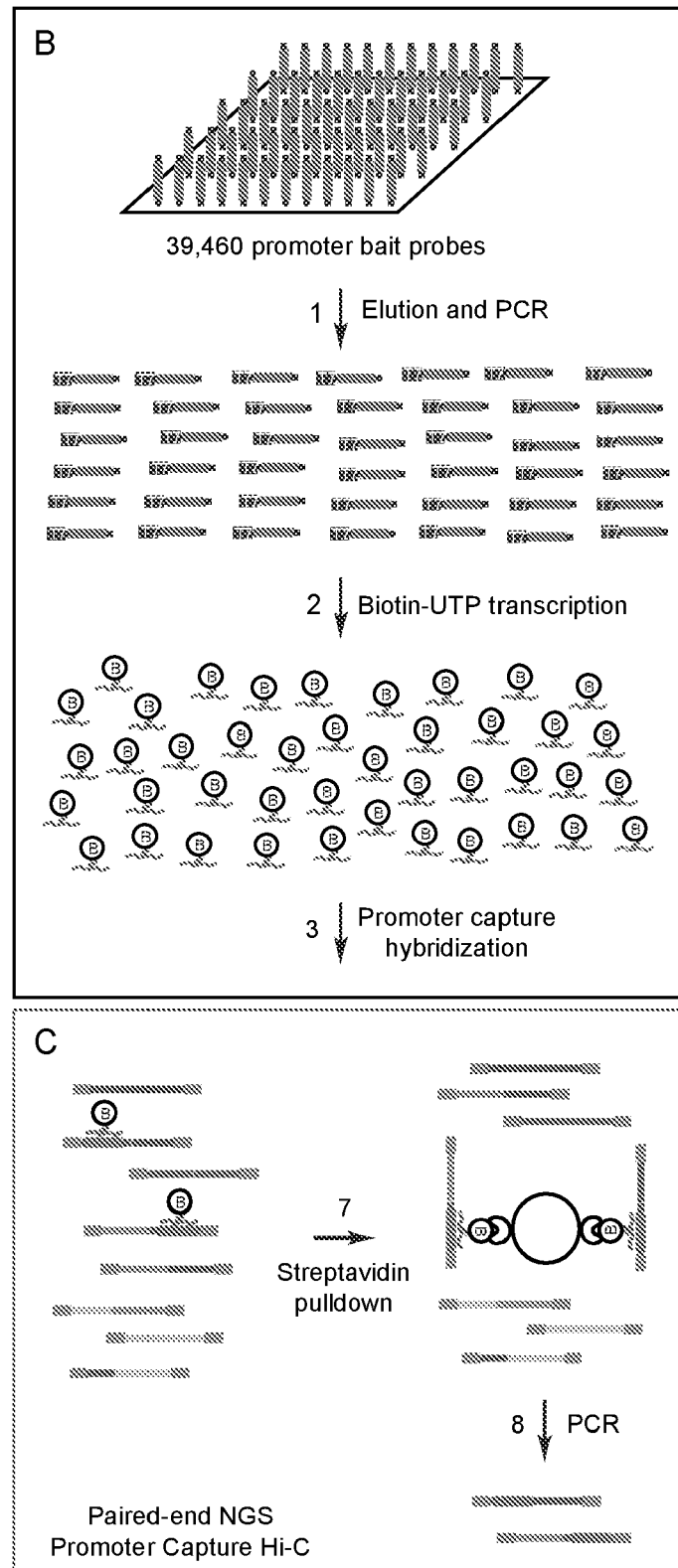
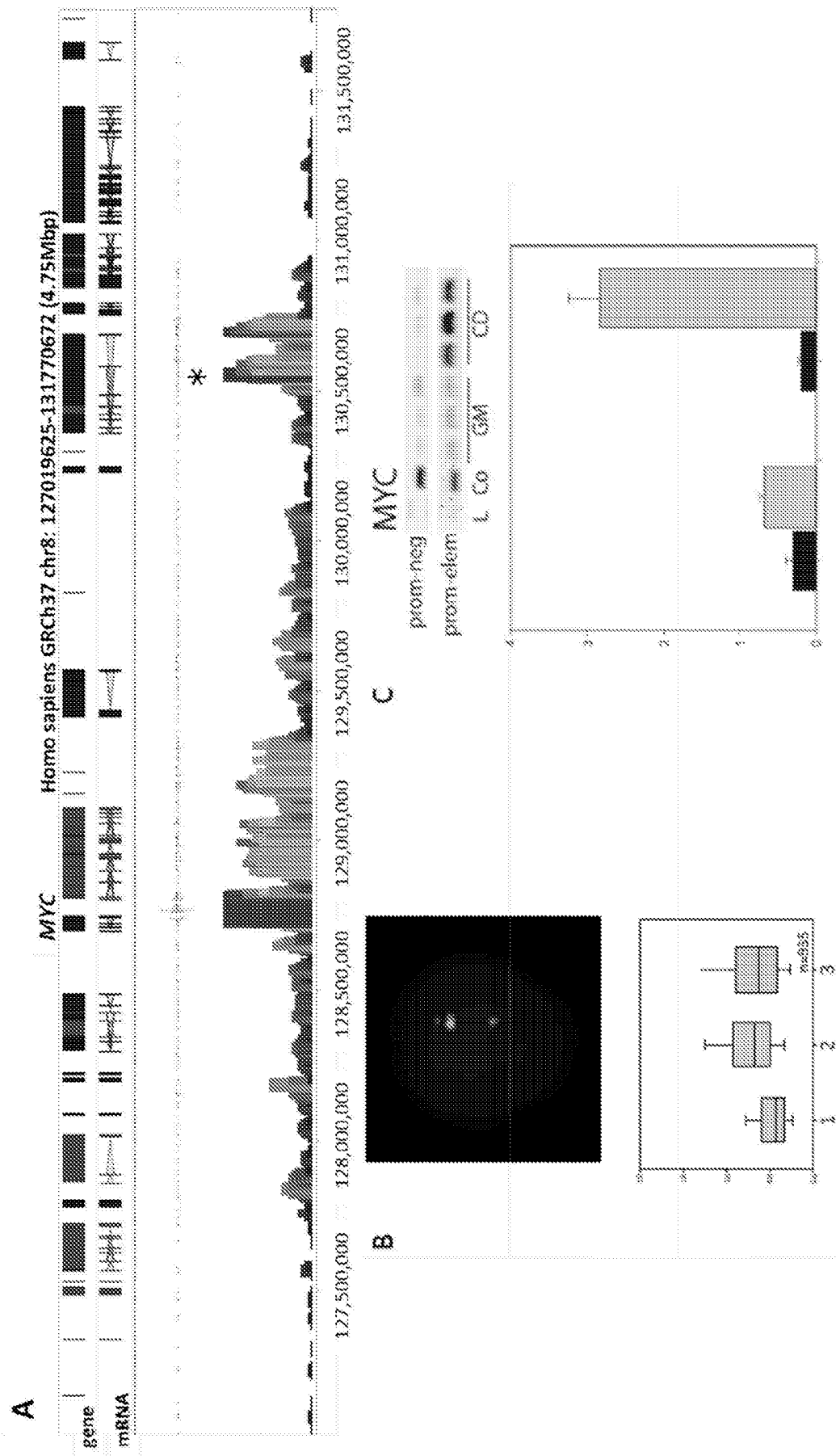


FIGURE 1 (ctd)



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
