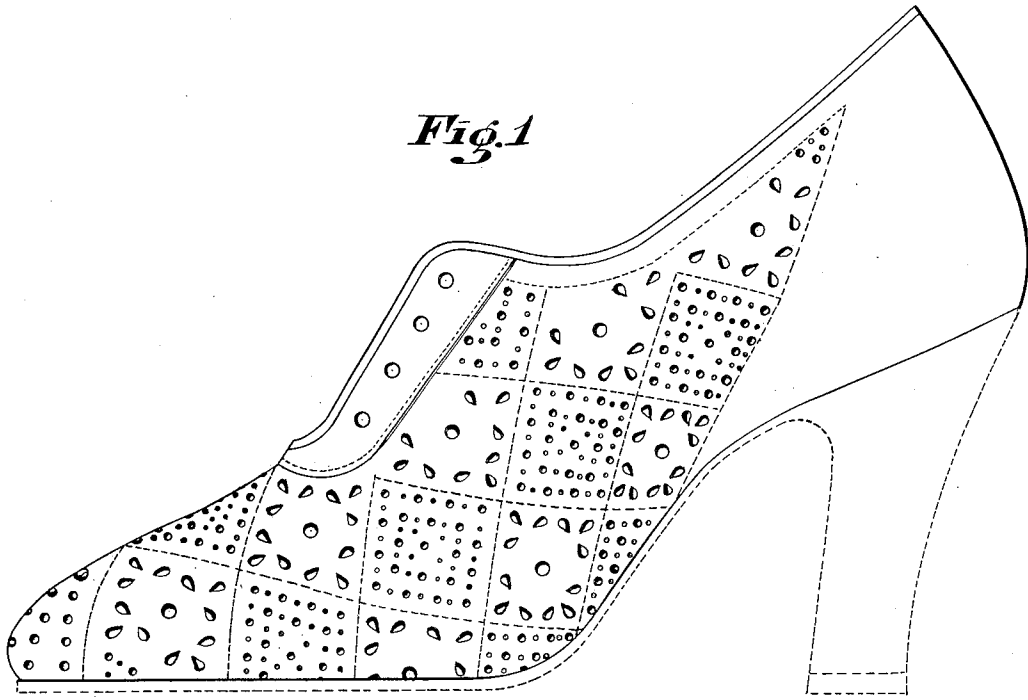
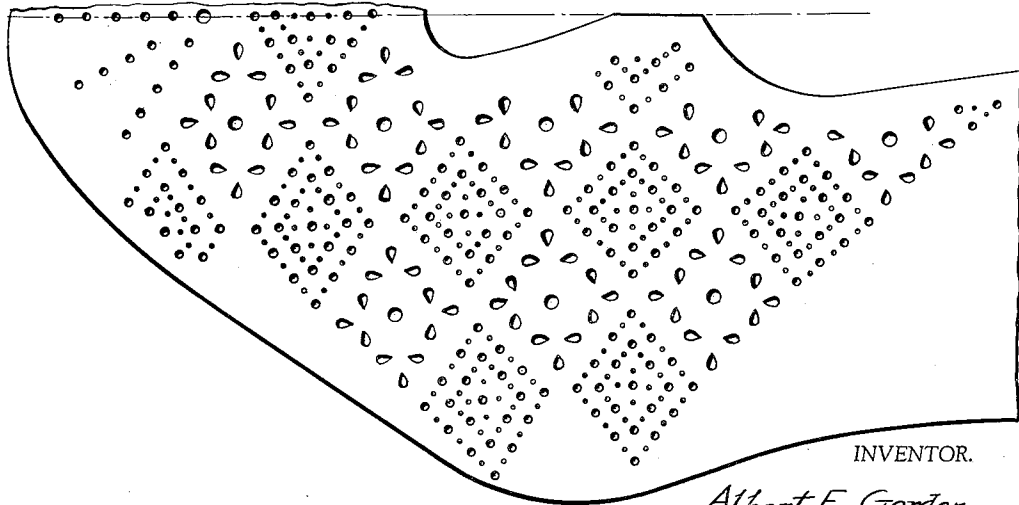

DESIGN FOR A SHOE OR ARTICLE OF ANALOGOUS NATURE

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Albert E. Gordon, a citizen of the United States, residing at Boston, in the county of Suffolk and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, have invented a new, original, and ornamental Design for a Shoe or Article of Analogous Nature, of which the following is a specification, reference being had to the accompanying drawing forming a part thereof.

In the accompanying drawing Figure 1 is a view, in side elevation, showing my design applied to a seamless-vamp shoe; and Fig. 2 is a fragmentary plan view of approximately one-half of the vamp of the shoe shown in Fig. 1, it being understood from the illustration that the orna-

mentation on the other one-half is a repetition of that shown.

The dominant feature of my design for a shoe resides in the vamp shown in full lines, the remainder of the shoe being conventional.

While my design is shown as embodied in a seamless-vamp shoe it is contemplated that the design, as described, may also be embodied in or applied to the vamps of oxfords, pumps and sandals without changing the design.

I claim:

The ornamental design for a shoe or article of analogous nature, substantially as shown and described.
