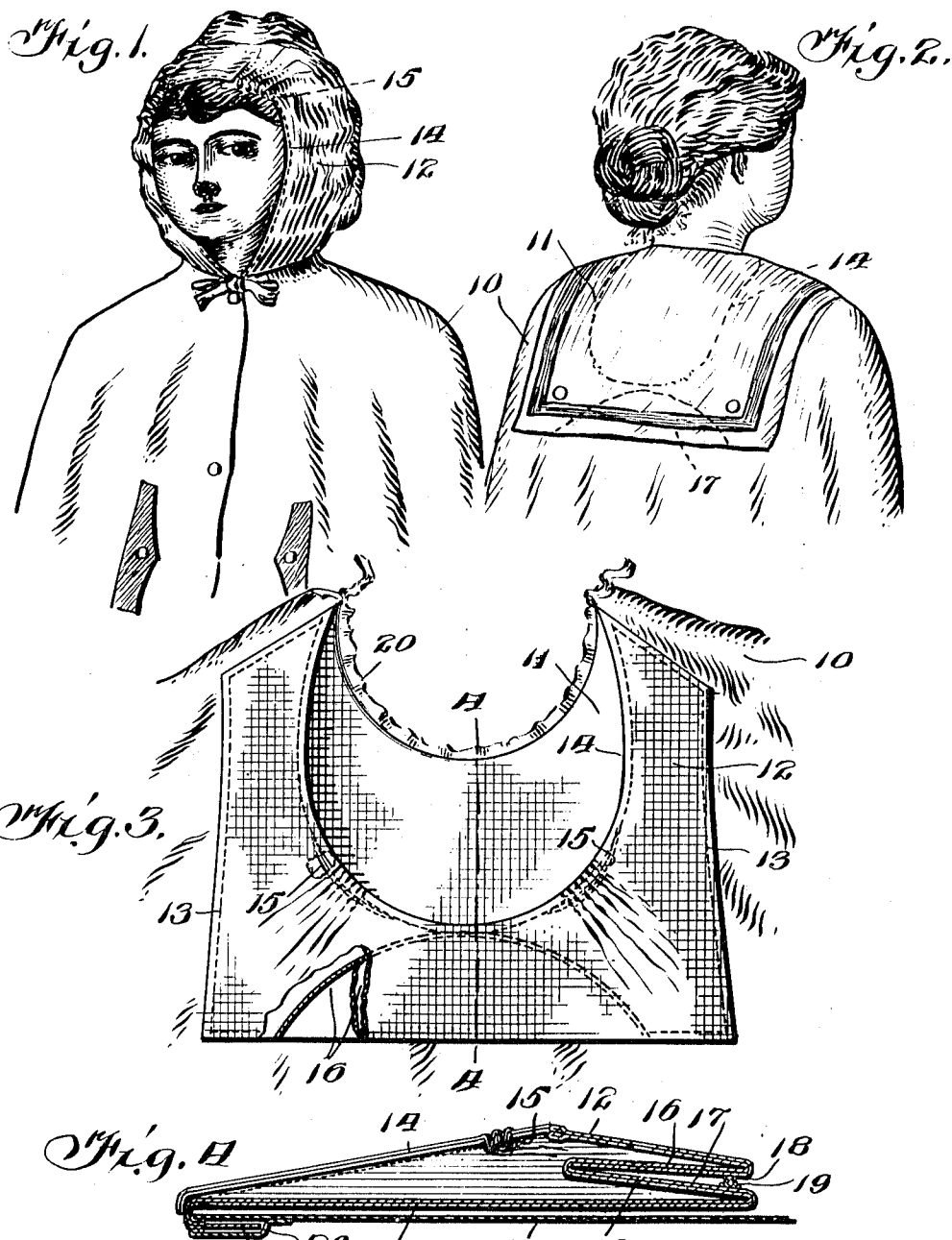

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COLLAR AND HOOD.

Specification of Letters Patent.

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To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ISRAEL N. LEVY, a citizen of the United States, residing at New York city, in the county of New York and State of New York, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Collars and Hoods; and I do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same.

My invention relates to wearing apparel and more particularly to collars and hoods and has more especially for its object to provide a collar having the appearance of an ordinary collar but which is convertible into a hood by turning the same inside out.

Another object of my invention is to provide a collar for a garment bearing resemblance to a sailor or other collar and which collar may be converted into a hood by turning the same inside out.

Further objects will be apparent from the following specification, appended claim and drawings thereof, in which:—

Figure 1 is a perspective view of the garment showing the collar converted into a hood. Fig. 2 is a similar view showing the same as a sailor collar. Fig. 3 is an elevation of my device, parts broken away for the sake of clearness. Fig. 4 is a sectional view as on the line 4—4 of Fig. 3.

Referring more specifically to the drawings, there is shown a garment 10 having a sailor collar attached thereto and said sailor collar is made up of the plies of fabric 11 and 12, which plies of fabric are stitched about the margin as shown in the drawing as at 13. The layer of fabric 11 is secured to the collar band of the garment while the fabric 12 is cut away as at 14 as shown in Fig. 3 of the drawings, and the marginal edge about said cut away portions is provided at intervals with elastic bands 15 and said fabric is gathered so as to permit the elastic bands 15 to provide sufficient play as to permit the edge 14 to be passed over

the head of the wearer. The free edges of the plies of fabric 11 and 12 have extensions 16 which when stitched together about their marginal edges form a pocket 17 which is intended to be folded between the plies of fabric 11 and 12 when the collar is worn as shown in Fig. 2 of the drawings, and to hold the collar in this position I provide the stud 18 and clasp 19 which are secured to the extension 16 in proximity to the folds of the plies of fabric 11 and 12 as shown in Fig. 4 of the drawings. The collar of the garment is provided with the band 20 to receive the strand of ribbon 21 to assist in causing the collar and hood to attain a snug fit.

From the foregoing it will be obvious that I have provided a collar which in rainy weather is convertible into a hood by turning the same inside out through the opening formed by the cutaway portion 14, so that the garment shows a collar conforming to the ordinary fashion when resting on the shoulders which collar serves as a hood when so desired.

It can be readily seen that this device is applicable to various shapes and designs of collars without departing from the spirit of my invention and though I have shown but one design of a collar in the drawings I do not wish to be limited to the particular form here shown as with slight alterations the collar can be made of any convenient design.

What I claim is:—

As a new article of manufacture, a garment forming a combined sailor collar and hood, said garment comprising a doubled quadrangular collar portion provided with an extensible portion folded inwardly along the lower edge thereof, and means for retaining the extensible portion in folded position.
