THOMAS A. GALT AND GEORGE S. TRACY, OF STERLING, ILLINOIS.

DESIGN FOR A SCHOOL-DESK.

Specification forming part of Design No. 5,259, dated September 12, 1871.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, THOMAS A. GALT and GEORGE S. TRACY, of Sterling, in the county of Whiteside and State of Illinois, have invented and produced a new and original Design for a School-Desk; and we do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the construction of the same.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

A represents the frame-work, which is constructed in the form shown on the photograph. The material of which this frame is made is cast-iron, and so cast as to resemble branches of hickory wood. Any suitable inscription can be cast on the frame, as shown on the photographic

illustration. The top part of this frame, which supports the top of the desk, is usually cast with the frame, and between the horizontal bars *b*, the word "Eureka" is cast, the letters of the word forming the end of the desk. D represents the seat, which is secured to the frame by arms having the form as shown.

We claim as our invention—

The design for a school-desk frame, as shown.
