

DISPLAY-BOX.

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To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Joseph S. Auerbach, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the city, county, and State of New York, 5 have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Display-Boxes, of which the following is a description.

My invention relates to boxes which contain articles of merchandise-such, for in-10 stance, as candies—and has for its object to produce a simple compact box with a folding stand secured to the inside of the cover, whereby a stand is provided for the box, so that the latter will rest at an angle and its 15 contents may be more readily exhibited.

The details of my improvement will be more fully explained in the description and

drawings hereinafter.

In the drawings forming part of this speci-20 fication, Figure 1 is a perspective view of my improved receptacle when used for displaying the contents. Fig. 2 is a plan view of Fig. 1. Fig. 3 is a section on the line 3 3 of Fig. 2. Fig. 4 is a cross-section through the 25 box when the same is closed, and Fig. 5 is an enlarged section longitudinally of the cover.

My improvements have relation to the general form of receptacles for containing various articles of merchandise, and for that 30 purpose I have illustrated a simple box 1, having suitable sides 2 and ends 3, together with a bottom 4, all of which may be constructed in any desired way. For the box I provide a cover 5, having a top 6 and depend-35 ing sides and ends 7, also of any desired form. Within the cover I secure by any suitable means, such as a linen strip 8, a sheet of stiff material 9, which may be of the same mate-

rial as the box-cover and is adapted to fold in against the cover.

At one edge of the piece 9 is secured another piece 10 by means of a suitable piece of material 11, the part 10 being narrower than the piece 9 and is adapted to fold under the latter. As shown in Fig. 4, the receptacle is 45 closed ready for receiving the contents and for shipping in the usual manner.

When it is desired to display the contents of the box, the easel portions 9 and 10 are unfolded and placed in the position shown in 50 Figs. 1, 2, and 3. The body of the box is then placed on the piece 9, when it will rest at the same angle as the latter and readily display the contents of the box.

This forms a very simple, compact, and 55 efficient display-stand, which at all times accompanies the package, and its cost is very little over and above the cost of the package

alone.

Having described my invention, what I so claim is-

The combination of a box comprising a body, and a cover therefor, a hinged member 9, secured to the inside face of the top of the cover, near one side thereof, and a second 65 member 10 hinged to the member 9 but free from the box-body whereby when the cover is inverted, the two parts 9 and 10 may be made to form an inclined stand for the body, and whereby the edge of the cover will form a 70 stop for the said member 10.
