HERMAN THEMEL, OF ESCONAWBA, MICHIGAN.

IMPROVEMENT IN MEDICAL COMPOUNDS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **136,680**, dated March 11, 1873.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HERMAN THEMEL, of Esconawba, in the county of Delta and State of Michigan, have invented a new and Improved Medical Compound or Blood-Purifier, of which the following is a specification:

This invention relates to a new medicine which is to be used to relieve the human system of matter that should be discharged, and is more particularly intended for use by ladies.

The medicine is composed of the following ingredients, in about the proportions set forth: To one-half gallon of the compound I use two ounces of Indian rhubarb, four ounces of gentian, two ounces of galangal root, two ounces of wormwood, and a small quantity—say a pinch—of saffron.

These ingredients are macerated in alcohol or alcoholic liquor.

The medicine is applied internally, about one table-spoonful being sufficient for one dose.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

A compound formed of the proportions specified, of the five ingredients named, macerated in alcohol, and applied as set forth.
