## IMPROVEMENT IN PAPER DOLLS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 126,622, dated May 14, 1872.

Specification describing certain Improvements in Toy-Dolls, invented by JOHN T. BROWN, of Albion, in the county of Orleans and State of New York.

My invention relates to the combination of a boot or shoe (which is made of metal or other heavy material) with an ordinary paper doll, in such a manner that by means of the boot the doll may be made to stand in an upright position.

In the drawing, A is a boot made of metal or other material, which has sufficient weight to retain the doll in an upright position. *a* is a slot in the boot, into which the leg of the

doll is inserted. These slots are cut at different angles, so as to give the boot an easy, natural appearance when placed on the doll.

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The combination of the metallic boot A, or its equivalent, with an ordinary paper doll, substantially as and for the purpose hereinbefore set forth.
