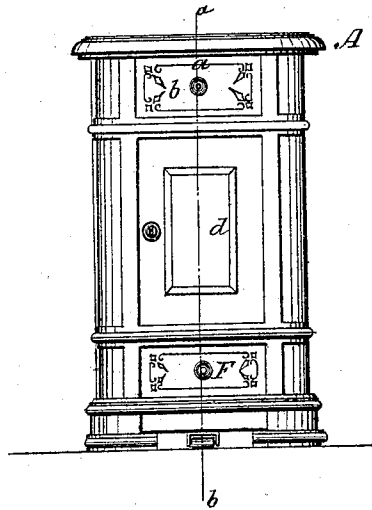
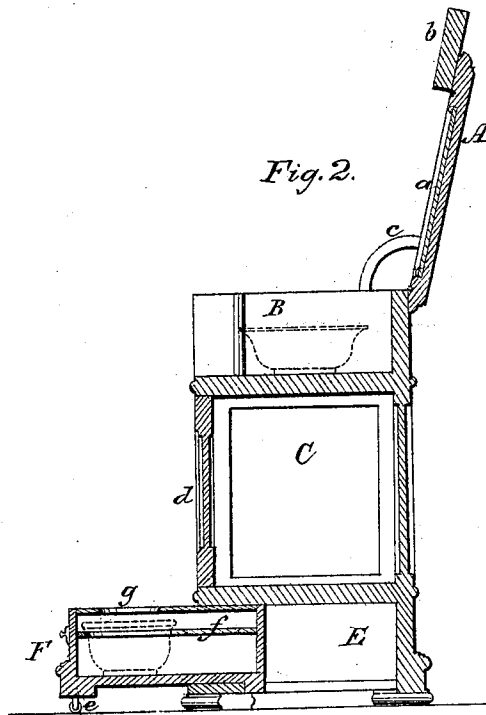

IMPROVED WASH-STAND.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, GEORGE SEELIG, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and improved Wash and Night or Cabinet-Stand; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, making a part of this specification; in which like parts are indicated by like letters in the several figures.

The nature of my invention consists in combining a wash and night-stand, making one piece of furniture take the place of two.

To enable others skilled in the art to make and use my invention, I will proceed to describe its construction and operation.

In the drawings—

Figure 1 is an elevation of the front of my cabinet.

Figure 2 is a vertical section through the middle, on line *a-b*, fig. 1.

A is the lid of the stand, to which is hinged the front piece *b* of the compartment B, and is provided with a looking-glass, *a*, shown in blue lines, the inclination of the lid and glass being regulated by means of the curve *c*.

The compartment B contains a wash-bowl, shown in dotted lines.

When the lid A is shut down, it closes the said compartment, the front piece *b* being then in the position shown in fig. 1.

There is another compartment, C, below compart-

ment B, which may be used as a closet, for keeping pitchers and other articles, and is provided with a door, *d*.

So far, my stand or cabinet does not differ materially from the ordinary stands now in use.

Underneath this second compartment is a drawer or box, E, with a perforation or opening at *g*, containing a chamber or urinal, shown in dotted lines, and which is held in place by the partition *f*, the said drawer being represented as drawn out, ready for use, in fig. 2.

This drawer is capable of sliding in and out of the bottom part of the stand, or third compartment, E, and is provided with a roller, *e*, in front, which sustains the weight of the drawer when it is drawn out.

On the partition *f*, which maintains the urinal in position, disinfectant-substances may be placed, if necessary.

Having thus described my invention,

What I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent of the United States, is—

A wash and night or cabinet-stand, having a lid, A, mirror *a*, compartments B, C, and E, and urinal-drawer F, arranged, constructed, and operating in the manner substantially as shown and described, and for the purpose set forth.
