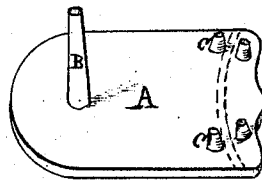
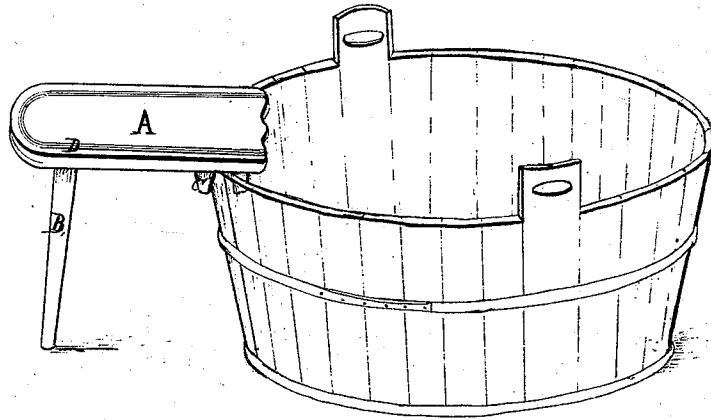

IMPROVED PORTABLE BATH-SEAT.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same

I, ALLEN P. YOUNG, of Providence, in the county of Providence and State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Portable Bath-Seat, of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to a movable seat, which may be conveniently attached to a bath-tub, and readily removed, when not required for use.

It may serve to encourage personal cleanliness, in places destitute of bath-rooms, by facilitating the act of bathing, where it has, hitherto been quite inconvenient.

Figure 1 is a perspective view of the seat attached to a tub, and

Figure 2, an under view of the same detached.

A is the seat, of wood, or any other suitable material. Its dimensions, for medium sizes, are about fourteen by sixteen inches, with sufficient thickness for the necessary strength.

It is arranged to slope slightly toward the tub, to carry back thereto any water which may drip on it, when in use.

This object is further aided by a groove, D, around three sides of the seat, near the edge.

When the seat is of cast or stamped metal, these three edges may be slightly turned up, to prevent wetting the floor.

B is a supporting-leg, of suitable length, driven or

screwed into the under side of the seat, or hinged to it, as may be desired.

It may be made adjustable, for tubs of various heights, in any convenient manner. Two legs may be used, if preferred.

C C are projections from beneath the seat, to keep it in place, where it rests on the edge of the tub, the position of which is indicated by the dotted curved lines in fig. 2.

The form, number, or position of these projections may vary, provided they accomplish their purpose.

An adjustable clamp may also be used, or a groove in the under side of the seat, to receive the edge of the tub.

The practical use of this apparatus is too apparent to require description.

Small sizes, adapted for children, may be made for use with a water-pail.

I claim as my invention—

The seat A, constructed substantially as described, and provided with the leg or legs B and projections C, or their equivalents, as and for the purposes specified.
