


IMPROVEMENT IN CLOTHES-DRIERS.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern;

Be it known that I, ASAHEL H. PATCH, of Hamilton, in the county of Essex and State of Massachusetts, have invented a new and improved Hanger for Clothes-Driers; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, which will enable others skilled in the art to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawing forming part of this specification.

This invention relates to an improved hanger for clothes, and consists in the construction and arrangement of parts, as hereinafter set forth.

Figure 1 is a side view of the metal frame for re-

ceiving the horizontal rods, and

Figure 2, of the hanger complete. To form the support of the horizontal rods of the hanger I employ a light cast-metal frame, having in general outline nearly the form of a triangle, of which the bars A represent the two sides, and B, the base.

The vertex, which is extended to some extent vertically, is provided with an eye, C, for the suspending cord, and the sides A, which project below the base, support the rings D, for receiving the horizontal bars, and terminate in hooks E. on which clothes may also be hung:

The base B has a cluster of hooks, F, pendent from its center, and above this center is arranged another ring, G, in which another rod may be suspended between those in the rings D.

It is intended to arrange the bars, rings, and hooks in any approved way or form for ornamentation, and it is designed to make the said hangers with any preferred number of rings and hooks, as the invention, which is considered to lie in the metallic hanger, arrauged for suspending it by a cord, and with one or more rings for the rods and hooks for extending the capacity of the drier, is not dependent on any particular form or number of hooks and rings.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent-

The improved hanger for clothes hereinbefore described, composed of the metallic frames A B and rods or bars connecting the same, substantially as specified.
