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
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

(57) Abstract

A system for combining electromagnetic position and orientation tracking with magnetic resonance scanner is provided. One embodiment includes a magnetic resonance scanner defining a reference coordinate system for scanning a target. Coupled to the magnetic resonance scanner is a magnetic field source which produces a magnetic field. The magnetic field is sensed by a magnetic field sensor which produces a signal proportional to the magnetic field. The magnetic field sensor has a location relative to the reference coordinate system. The location of the magnetic field sensor relative to the reference coordinate system of the magnetic resonance scanner is determined by a location tracking device using at least a line segment model of the magnetic field source and the signal from the magnetic field sensor.

Claims Nos.: 11-17,31-43,59-66

The first invention is defined in terms of 8 independent claims (7 apparatus claims + 1 method claim). Another 8 independent claims are used to define the remaining 5 inventions.

The large number of (independent) claims and also the wording of the claims presently on file render it difficult, if not impossible, to determine the matter for which protection is sought. Therefore, the present application fails to comply with the clarity and conciseness requirements of Article 6 PCT (see also Rule 6.1(a) PCT) to such an extent that a meaningful search is impossible. Consequently, the search has been carried out for those parts of the application which do appear to be clear and concise, namely claims 1-10 (= first set of apparatus claims) and claim 30 (= corresponding method claim). The remaining claims relating to the first invention, namely claims 11-17, 31-43 and 59-66, have not been searched.

The applicant's attention is drawn to the fact that claims, or parts of claims, relating to inventions in respect of which no international search report has been established need not be the subject of an international preliminary examination (Rule 66.1(e) PCT). The applicant is advised that the EPO policy when acting as an International Preliminary Examining Authority is normally not to carry out a preliminary examination on matter which has not been searched.
