IMPROVEMENT IN DISGUIISING-SIRUPS FOR MEDICINES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **171,848**, dated January 4, 1876; application filed January 16, 1875.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ROBERT S. PEYTON, of Pinckneyville, in the county of Perry and State of Illinois, have invented a new and valuable Improvement in Disguising-Sirups; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the same.

The object of my invention is to obtain a sirup which will serve as a vehicle for disguising nauseous medicines—such, for instance, as castor-oil, cod-liver oil, quinine, cinchona sulphate, turpentine, and fluid and solid extracts.

The formula is as follows: Simple sirup, four ounces; glycerine, two ounces; oil of

winter-green, one dram. Instead of winter-green any of the flavoring-oils may be used.

What I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

A vehicle for disguising nauseous medicines, composed of simple sirup, glycerine, and oil of winter-green, mixed together in about the proportions described.
