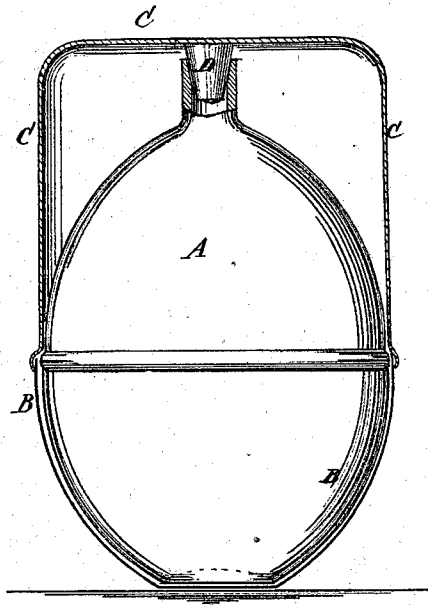

IMPROVEMENT IN POCKET-FLASKS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 124,733, dated March 19, 1872.

Specification describing a new and useful Improvement in Pocket-Flask, invented by ROGERS GEORGE, of the city of New York, in the county and State of New York.

The figure is a side view of my improved flask, partly in section, through the upper cup, and part of the neck being broken away to show the construction.

My invention has for its object to furnish an improved pocket-flask, which shall be so constructed that the operation of putting on the cup or cap will cork the flask, and the operation of taking off the cup or cap will uncork the flask; and it consists in the cork or stopper, permanently attached to the cap or cup of the flask, as hereinafter more fully described.

A is the flask, which is made of glass, and may be of any desired or convenient size or form. B is the bottom cup, which may be used or not, as may be desired. C is the top cup or cap, which is placed upon the upper part of the flask A. D is a stopper, made of cork, rubber, or other suitable material. The stopper D is

permanently attached to the cap or cup C. This may be done by securing a small screw to said cup, upon which a cork or stopper is placed and secured by a nut. The cork or stopper D may be attached to the cup or cap C in any other substantial and convenient manner. The shape of the cups is immaterial. It is preferred that the cups should conform somewhat to the form of the glass flask, and their bottoms should be flat, so that they may stand steadily upon a table or other support when required.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

The cork or stopper D, permanently attached to the top cup or cap C of a pocket-flask, A, whether the bottom or second cup be used or not, substantially as herein shown and described, and for the purpose set forth.
