(54) Title: SYSTEM AND METHOD FOR MULTI-FACTOR MOBILE USER AUTHENTICATION

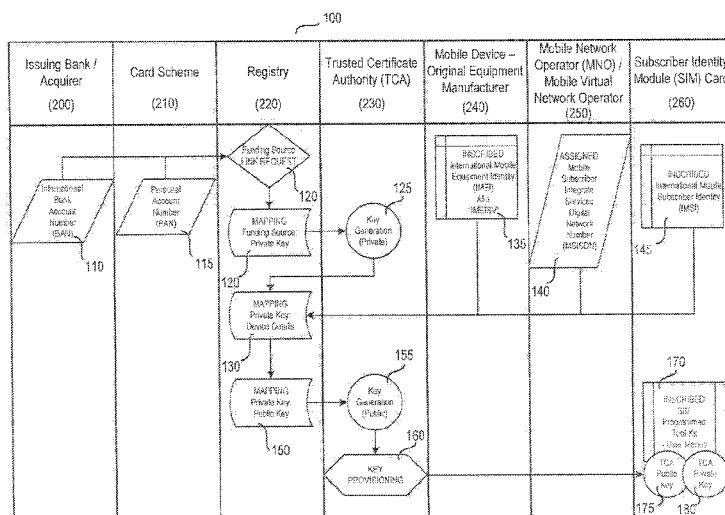

(57) Abstract: A system and method are disclosed herein leveraging financial networks standards with mobile device data and SIM card chip knowledge to authenticate a device. For instance, a party to a transaction may utilize these elements of information, not traditionally associated with wireless transactions, to achieve a lower probability of fraud and/or a higher confidence associated with the transaction.

SYSTEM AND METHOD FOR MULTI-FACTOR MOBILE USER AUTHENTICATION

FIELD OF INVENTION

5 This disclosure generally relates to security associated with financial transactions.

BACKGROUND OF THE INVENTION

Historically, in a typical credit card transaction, the process begins with a credit card holder providing his credit card to an attendant located at a point-of-sale device (e.g., cash register) within a merchant setting. In response, the attendant typically "swipes", "dips" or "waves" the card depending on the card reader that is coupled to the point-of-sale device. Thus, cardholder information (including the name of the cardholder and the credit card number) is transferred from the storage medium on the card to the point-of-sale device.

Traditional card payments via merchant Point of Sale terminals are an accepted mode of transferring value. These are generally considered to be secure by the payment processors. Also, traditional card payments via merchant Point of Sale terminals enable a merchant to shift some liability for the transaction to the transaction processor. Other payment methods (outside of a user physically interacting with a point of sale system) change the paradigm from an authorization, fraud and/or security standpoint. Oftentimes, higher premiums are leveraged on merchants accepting payments through these non-traditional payment methods as there is a higher risk associated with the transaction from the account issuer point of view.

It would be beneficial to have a system where non-traditional payment systems and methods may be employed and still maintain a low fraud risk associated with the transaction.

SUMMARY OF THE INVENTION

The present disclosure relates to security associated with transactions that addresses, among other things, the aforementioned deficiencies in prior systems. Described herein is a system and method for reducing fraud risk.

According to various embodiments, a unique mobile device hardware identifier of a mobile device may be provided to a registry and/or a registry host. A unique SIM card hardware identifier of a SIM card associated with the mobile device may also be provided to

the registry and/or registry host. The registry host may associate a mobile device user identifier with transaction account information of a mobile device user, the unique SIM card hardware identifier of the SIM card of the mobile device, and the mobile device hardware identifier in an electronic registry.

5 According to various embodiments, a transaction request may be transmitted from/via the mobile device over a mobile network to a trusted certificate authority for verification of a public key associated with the mobile transaction request. The trusted certificate authority may be hosted by the MNO, Registry, Transaction Processor and/or Issuer/Acquirer of the transaction accounts. The device hardware identifier information of
10 the mobile device transmitting the mobile transaction request may be captured and/or intercepted by the MNO. The SIM card hardware identifier information of the SIM card associated with the mobile device transmitting the mobile transaction request may be captured and/or intercepted by the MNO.

 According to various embodiments, the intercepted device hardware identifier
15 information and the SIM card hardware identifier may be provided to the registry host for verification. The registry host may associate the mobile device hardware identifier information intercepted with the transmitted transaction request message and determine if the results are associated with the expected mobile device hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry associated with the mobile device. Similarly, the intercepted
20 device hardware identifier information and the SIM card hardware identifier may be provided to the registry host for verification. For instance, the registry host may associate the mobile device hardware identifier information intercepted with the transmitted transaction request message and determine if the expected mobile device hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry associated with the mobile device and the SIM
25 card hardware identifier information intercepted with the transmitted transaction request message are associated with expected SIM card hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry associated with the mobile device.

 According to various embodiments, a mobile device user identifier may be associated with transaction account information of the mobile device user, a unique SIM
30 card hardware identifier of a SIM card of a mobile device, and a unique mobile device hardware identifier in an electronic registry by a fraud prevention computer system. Public key data may be transmitted to a pre-provisioned memory location of the SIM card. The

public key data may be securely stored in the pre-provisioned memory location of the SIM card.

According to various embodiments, private key data may be transmitted to a memory location of the SIM card. The public key data may be securely stored to the memory location of the SIM card. A transaction request message may be transmitted over a mobile network via a transaction application stored to a memory associated with the mobile device. The private key data may be appended to the transaction request message to create a signed message. The public key data is appended to the signed message by the transaction application.

Aspects of the system may verify that the public key is correct. Aspects of the system may validate the mobile device hardware identifier captured with the transaction request message against expected mobile device hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry and associated with the received public key.

Aspects of the system may validate the SIM card hardware identifier information captured with the transaction request message against expected SIM card hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry and associated with the received public key. Aspects of the system may verify that the private key data is correct. If multiple factors are correct, transaction account information may be appended to and/or transmitted with the transaction request message. The appended transaction request may be transmitted to a processor for authorization.

These features and other advantages of the system and method, as well as the structure and operation of various exemplary embodiments of the system and method, are described below.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE DRAWINGS

The accompanying drawings, wherein like numerals depict like elements, illustrate exemplary embodiments of the present disclosure, and together with the description, serve to explain the principles of the invention. In the drawings:

FIG. 1 illustrates an exemplary registration and identification mapping process in accordance with various embodiments; and

FIG. 2 illustrates an exemplary multistep validation process in accordance with various embodiments.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION

The detailed description of exemplary embodiments of the disclosure described herein makes reference to the accompanying drawings, which show the exemplary embodiment by way of illustration and its best mode. While these exemplary embodiments are described in sufficient detail to enable those skilled in the art to practice the invention, it should be understood that other embodiments can be realized and that logical and mechanical changes can be made without departing from the spirit and scope of the disclosure. Thus, the detailed description herein is presented for purposes of illustration only and not of limitation. For example, the steps recited in any of the method or process descriptions can be executed in any order and are not limited to the order presented.

For the sake of brevity, conventional data networking, application development and other functional aspects of the systems (and components of the individual operating components of the systems) may not be described in detail herein. Furthermore, the connecting lines shown in the various figures contained herein are intended to represent exemplary functional relationships and/or physical couplings between the various elements. It should be noted that many alternative or additional functional relationships or physical connections are present in a practical system.

With the introduction of mobile payment systems using the Global System for Mobile Communication (GSM) band, distributed Internet and/or proximity radio frequency payment methods, the paradigm of defining whether a “transaction instrument,” such as a transaction card, or “authorized card holder” is present during a transaction is blurred. In these new authentication scenarios, in accordance with exemplary embodiments described herein, information associated with a SIM card 260 chip combined with a mobile device can be used as a payment authentication system and method. However, merchants adopting these new transaction solutions may be charged a pricing rate for a “Card Not Present” transaction based on the traditional risk model that payments taken over the internet have a higher potential fraud and the merchant is unable to use normal, Transaction instrument, signature, personal identification number (PIN) and/or in-person government issued identification presentment, cardholder verification methods. Although the chip used for Payment Cards (embedded within the transaction instrument) and SIM 260 cards are functionally the same and at times electronically indistinguishable, the mobile device is not classified as secure enough for normal PIN entry user authentication according to some standards, such as Payment Cards Industry (PCI) – Pin Transaction Security (PTS) Pin Entry

Device (PED) standards. Therefore, another non-tamper, method may be implemented to validate that the mobile device is authentic and verifiable for use. Various embodiments of that method are described herein.

5 According to various embodiments, the Integrated Circuit Card (ICC) of the SIM card 260 is made to the same ISO Standards for both a Financial Card security instrument and for Mobile Network SIM card 260 security device and may be configured to hold multiple credentials (depending on the Chip memory capacity).

10 Mobile networks may use the International Mobile Station Equipment Identity (IMEI) 135 to verify that the mobile handset in use is authentic. Also, in the case of stolen/lost handsets, the IMEI 135 may be used to prevent unauthorized future use, by restricting the IMEI 135 from further use until otherwise directed. The IMEI 135 is a code, normally a number, usually unique, to identify 3rd Generation Partnership Project, (3GPP) (i.e., GSM, UMTS, LTE) and/or Integrated Digital Enhanced Network (iDEN) mobile devices as well as some satellite phones. It is usually found printed inside the battery
15 compartment of the phone, but can also be displayed on-screen on most phones by entering a code in the dial pad, such as *#06#, or alongside other system 100 information in the settings menu on various operating systems. The IMEI 135 has not been associated with financial transactions and/or the security of financial transactions previously.

The International Mobile Subscriber Identity (IMSI) 145 is a unique identification
20 associated with all cellular networks. It may be stored as a code, such as a 64 bit field, and may be sent by a mobile device to a network. The IMSI 145 may also be used for acquiring other details of the mobile device in the home location register (HLR) or as locally copied in the visitor location register. According to various embodiments, an IMSI 145 may be used as an international identifier on a SIM card 260 for correct account billing (particularly in
25 international roaming) and also again in the case of "restricting" use for stolen/lost or decommissioned accounts.

According to various embodiments, financial networks standards may be leveraged with mobile device data and SIM card 260 chip knowledge to authenticate a device. For instance a party to a transaction, such as a third party to a transaction, may utilize these
30 elements of information, not traditionally associated with wireless transactions, to achieve a lower probability of fraud and/or a higher confidence associated with the transaction.

In various embodiments, a payment via a mobile device may be initiated by the user of the transaction mobile device via their own device. In this way, the Merchant or

Recipient details are located and/or entered by the user and used to complete the transaction request 360. These details may be entered into a user application or user menu on the mobile device. This may be referred to as a "Pushed" transaction, "Push Authorization" and/or "Push Funds". The responsibility for the handling of the transaction rests with the
5 mobile device User rather than the Merchant, who, in general, receives a receipt of successful transactions and may reverse the transaction if the details are incorrect. Compared to some techniques, repudiation may be more difficult given the Customer/User responsibility on their own device. According to various embodiments, Pulled transactions where the responsibility for the handling of the transaction rests with the Merchant are also
10 contemplated herein.

As previously mentioned, in some near field communication (NFC) payments via some NFC transaction instruments, the "Card Present" rate is applied to the users. However, mobile device payments made utilizing NFC technology are beholden to strictly controlled certification processes with agreed suppliers to allow the "Card Present" policy. Aspects of
15 the present disclosure are intended to increase reliability of transactions, decrease fraud opportunities, and achieve wider adoption of "card present" status to mobile device generated transactions.

The primary difference between a contactless enabled transaction instrument, such as a transaction card, and a contactless enabled mobile device is that one is accessing an ICC of
20 the contactless enabled transaction instrument while the other is accessing an ICC of a SIM card 260 of the mobile device made to the same specifications. According to various embodiments, the present description may alleviate some of the concerns with this discrepancy and lead to wider adoption of new technologies.

According to various embodiments, through collaboration between Issuers and
25 Mobile Network Operators, (MNO) 250 payment schemes and techniques leveraging previously ignored technical data may be utilized to approve/authorize transactions. Previously MNOs or Mobile Virtual Network Operators (MVNOs) 250 have not had or contemplated use of the Financial Regulation standards and/or Financial Networks have not had access to mobile call logging data (including IMSI 145, IMEI 135 data), such as
30 substantially real-time mobile call logging data. Those that license mobile devices and their use may be a MVNO 250 and/or a MNO 250. The model disclosed herein combines several standards from the SIM card 260, Device, Financial Network specifications and a new

proprietary "Tokenization" system and registry 220 based on the knowledge of these standards.

According to various embodiments, mobile devices are allocated a unique identifying number, such as an IMEI 135 number. At times, this IMEI 135 number may be used to reduce counterfeit mobile devices. Lost or stolen mobile devices may be flagged in a registry 220 and/or decommissioned by a Mobile Network Operator 250. Thus, an IMEI 135 number may be matched to a registry 220 to determine if the mobile device is commissioned or decommissioned. IMEIs 135 are device specific codes. Each device of a manufacture has its own specific IMEI 135 code.

The MVNO 250 and/or a MNO 250 may license a brand, via a SIM card 260, and lease the service and the mobile device bandwidth of a company. Each SIM card 260 has a SIM card 260 specific code, such as a number, (e.g. the IMSI 145). Similarly, traditionally each transaction instrument has a transaction instrument specific EMB code.

For a traditional mobile device operating on a mobile network, a SIM card 260 is issued to each mobile device for consumption of data over the network, such as for telephone communications. In these cases, an international subscriber number, such as an IMSI 145 number, is issued individually for a network and to a specific individual. Generally, associated with this number is a country designation, a network is identified, and details of the user are inscribed, i.e., stored on each SIM card 260. This stored information is generally static. Stated another way, the IMSI 145, which is generally static, identifies the SIM card 260. Additional identification and information may be associated with the SIM card 260, individual, and network, such as a MSISDN 140, TMSI and/or an ICCID. A MSISDN 140 is a number uniquely identifying a subscription to a mobile network. An ICCID or Integrated Circuit Card Identifier identifies each SIM card 260 internationally. A Temporary Mobile Subscriber Identity (TMSI) is randomly assigned by a visitor location register to every mobile device in the area, in response to the mobile device being switched on. Optionally, any of these identifiers may be used for validation and/or verification processes.

ICCID, TMSI and/or MSISDN 140 may be temporary, nonstatic designators. For instance, these identifiers may be assigned and/or switched when a user moves from a first country to a second country, and/or participates in international roaming. Thus, a different TMSI identified or MSISDN 140 may be associated with the mobile device depending on where a user is located. However, the IMSI 145 is static, non-changing, as the IMSI 145 is

the designator that is used to bill an individual for use of bandwidth regardless of device used to consume the bandwidth.

Thus, the MSISDN 140 may be assigned, and an IMEI 135 designating a mobile device and the IMSI 145, are generally static information designators. Thus, each mobile device comprises two static pieces of information for an MVNO 250 to register to a database and/or registry 220. These two static designators, the IMEI 135 and the IMSI 145 may be linked to a third designator. The third designator may be a user, a transaction account, an expected location, a mobile application specific code and/or the like.

With reference to Figure 1, and in accordance with various embodiments, a BAN 110, which may be an international bank account number, which may be a 16-digit code, may identify a country of origin, identify a bank of origin and/or designate a user's personal transaction account number. The BAN 110 may be an issuer 200 of transaction accounts and/or acquirer 200 of transaction accounts 200. The BAN 110 may be used for payments or bank to bank transfers, and/or the like. In a traditional transaction account scheme 210, a personal account number 115, (PAN 115) may be embossed into a physical transaction instrument, such as a transaction card. A PAN 115 may be used for web payments, paper bills, and the like. The PAN 115 may be a way for point of sale terminal transactions to track data. Both the PAN 115 and the BAN 110 may identify a funding source, such as a credit funding source or debit funding source, and can be used in an ISO message and associated with a transaction on a financial network. Traditionally, embossing this number on a physical instrument introduces communication difficulties and security risks.

Historically, short message service (SMS), unstructured supplementary services data (USSD) and lower bands of communication methods have not been well suited for financial transaction messages, either because of the memory and the length of the message or because the network is a public network and security of data cannot be ensured. According to various embodiments, to address this concern, a registry 220 is created linking the IMSI 145 and the IMEI 135 number. Stated another way, a user having a mobile device, an IMSI 145 and a SIM card 260 may be able to conduct secure transactions via the mobile device. Thus, a relationship between the issuer 200 and the MNO 250 and/or MVNO 250 is created to facilitate financial transactions where none existed or was envisioned before. This relationship may enable secure transmission of information. In this way, fraud mitigation may be achieved. Based on this relationship and the security it provides, in some cases liability may be shifted from a merchant to a payment processor. Also, the cost of doing

business may be decreased to the merchant as the higher premium for a “card not present” transaction may be removed. As stated above, the MNO 250 and/or MVNO 250 may issue a SIM card 260 associated with the mobile device. Thus, the MNO 250 and/or MVNO 250 have the IMSI 145 number in their system 100. The MNO 250 and/or the mobile device user may register their IMEI 135 number in a registry 220. This may be via a mobile application downloaded to the mobile device. For instance, the mobile application may pull a IMEI 135 code from an operating system of the device. Also, by dialing *#06#, the mobile device will display its IMEI 135. Generally, the IMSI 145 number of the SIM 260 card is held private by the MVNO 250 and/or MNO 250.

According to various embodiments, the IMSI 145 number may be linked to the IMEI 135 number and a funding source that an individual/user wants to pay from. This may be accomplished via a funding source link request 120. A registry 220 may encrypt and store the funding source information. A stand-in token linked to the funding source information may be stored the mobile SIM 260 card.

For instance, according to various embodiments, a user and/or a MNO 250 may provide to a registry 220 provider/host an IMEI 135 number. According to various embodiments, a user may also provide an IMEI 135 number to the registry 220 provider/host. The user may present a valid ID, such as a government issued ID at this time. This may be linked to and/or associated with an issued and/or to be issued SIM 260 card. A confirmation, of identity, such as through a valid ID may be made at this time. A user transaction account may be linked to the provided values in a registry 220. A private key 125 may be generated by a trusted certificate authority 230 to facilitate an exchange of information. The private key 125 may be mapped 130 to the IMEI 135, MSISDN 140, and/or the IMSI 145. A trusted certificate authority 230 may generate 155 a public key 155 which along with private key 125 data, allows access to communication session over a network. This private key and/or private key public key pair may be stored to the SIM 260 card. The SIM 260 card may be pre-provisioned to accept this data. This data may be stored in a secure location of the SIM 260 card.

As used herein public-key/private-key cryptography may refer to a cryptographic system 100 utilizing two separate keys, one of which is secret and one of which is public. Although different, the two parts of the key pair are linked. One key locks or encrypts the plaintext, and the other unlocks or decrypts the ciphertext, and/or encoded information. Neither key can perform both functions by itself. Thus, the public key 155 may be

published without compromising security, while the private key 125 is generally not revealed to the unauthorized.

According to various embodiments a digital signature may be associated with communications described herein. In response to data being signed by a private key 125, the
5 corresponding public key 155 is bound to the signed data. Stated another way, only the corresponding public key 155 can be used to verify the signature and ensure that the data has not been modified. A public key 155 can be protected from tampering by using its corresponding private master key to sign the public key 155 components and user IDs, thus binding the components to the public master key. Signing public key 155 components with
10 the corresponding private master signing key may be referred to self-signing, and a public key 155 that has self-signed user IDs bound to it is called a certificate.

As disclosed herein, a secure mutual authentication process is described in terms of encrypting and/or decrypting security keys. However, the present disclosure contemplates authentication by way of encrypting and decrypting any type of security protocol. For
15 example, the present disclosure contemplates the use of digital signatures, digital certificates, GPS information, identifier information, and the like.

For instance, and with reference to Figure 2 and flow diagram 201, the private key 125 may be linked to a user menu (of the mobile device) for requesting payment 310, such as a user generated request for payment, to create a signed message 320.

20 Through use of the public key 175 upon reading the signed message 320, a session may be initiated and a verification request 340 may be issued. Optionally, a user passcode 345 may be provided by the user and transmitted with the verification request 340 as an additional fraud prevention technique. This user passcode 345 may be a code of determined length established by the user that may be easily remembered by the user. This user
25 passcode 345 may be pre-stored by the registry 220 host.

The MNO/MVNO 250 may be instructed to push and store this information to the user's specific mobile device address. Thus the MSISDN 140, is configured to reside in an EMV approved secured area on the SIM 260 card, such as a secure portion of the ICC of the SIM 260 card. EMV is a global standard for inter-operation of integrated circuit cards and
30 integrated circuit card capable point of sale (POS) terminals and automated teller machines (ATMs), for authenticating credit and debit card transactions. According to various embodiments, the MSISDN 140 may be used to contact a user mobile device and push the private and public keys into a storage area of the SIM card 260, such as a secure storage area

of the SIM card 260. Thus, in response to registration of a user with the system 100, generation of the public 175 and private keys 125, the user may be uniquely identified and authorized by the system 100.

As previously described, a SIM 260 card may be issued to the user and/or mobile device with a holding block ready to receive this information. For instance, the SIM 260 card may be pre-provisioned to receive and store a key pair for requesting transactions.

In operation, in response to registration and a user setting up their identification information, the user is ready to transmit payments via their mobile device.

Thus, a user may elect to perform a transaction. A transaction request 360 may be associated with this transaction. Using a mobile device pre-stored menu, such as a menu of a mobile application, merchant identification data, such as a merchant specific number may be entered into and/or provided to the application. Merchant information may be displayed via the mobile device to identify and verify the correct parties are present. For instance, the merchant address, name, and other distinguishing information may be presented via the mobile application on the mobile device. The user may agree with this validation prior to proceeding.

The private key 125 information may be linked to the transaction request 360 and create a signed message 320. This message may contain transaction information, such as information describing the amount of value desired to transmit, the parties and/or the like. As previously described, using the public key 175 the signed message 320 may be decrypted to uncover the details of the verification request 340.

The public key 175 may be initially transmitted from a mobile device and verified by a trusted certificate authority 230. Later, the additional details of the mobile transaction request 360 may be transmitted from the mobile device and verified by the trusted certificate authority 230. Of course, according to various embodiments, a single message comprising the public key 175 and the details of the mobile transaction request 360 may be transmitted from the mobile device via an application and verified by the trusted certificate authority 230.

This transmittal may optionally be in response to a user providing a validation and/or passcode. For instance, an option on the menu system of the mobile application may be to add a further user passcode 345 prior to transmitting data. This may be a static or dynamic passcode to be entered prior to the transaction request 360 being sent over the mobile network, such as the 3G network and/or iDEN network. A static passcode may refer to a

passcode issued by the registry 220 host to the user. A dynamic passcode may refer to a passcode that may be elected by and/or selected by the user. The MNO 250 and/or MVNO 250 may route the transmittal of the mobile transaction request 360 over the mobile network. With this routing the IMSI 145 number may be captured, such as by the MNO 250. IMSI
5 information is commonly captured by the MNO 250 and/or MVNO 250 to bill the actual call/transfer of data itself. However, IMSI information is not captured by the MNO 250 for use in verification and fraud prevention. The MNO 250 and/or MVNO 250 may determine the IMEI 135 number to validate that the device is correct (expected). This call/transfer of data over the network may be into a registry system 220. This end point and/or destination
10 number may be hidden from the user. A record of this call/transfer of data may be created and stored to a database.

Once connected to the verification system, the verification/public key 175 may be checked to verify that the public key 175 is correct. In response to the public key 175 being incorrect, the transaction may be halted. In response to the public key 175 being correct the
15 IMSI 145 detail, the IMEI 135 detail, and/or optionally the MSISDN 140 information may each be individually checked against the registry 220 information.

For instance, the MVNO 250 and/or MNO 250 may exchange the details with the trusted certificate authority 230 and/or registry host 220 to identify that the device is correct. In response to the details being incorrect, the MNO 250 and/or trusted certificate authority
20 230 may halt transaction and communicate a message to be stored, indicating that the public key 175 was correct but other expected details are wrong. For instance, an message indicating that an incorrect SIM card 260 was used or a SIM card 260 that is not expected for use with this device or with these other details was used. For instance, if a SIM card 260 was swapped into a different device and not updated/registered in the registry 220 the
25 transaction would not be able to proceed.

In response to a correct public key 175 being verified/established, expected IMSI 145 and IMEI 135 data being found, then the SIM card 260 and specific mobile device is authenticated. At this time, the MSISDN 140 may be reviewed to indicate that this is in fact a domestic transaction, and that the transfer of data/call is occurring in the expected
30 geographic location.

Thus, a plurality, such as at least three points, of authentication elements and systems may be used. According to various embodiments, the first point of authentication may indicate that a valid person that has previously registered in the registry 220 is involved with

the transaction request 360. The second point may be a determination that the mobile device is the expected device. The third point may be ensuring the one to one mapping is a valid mapping. In response to all of these three being correct/validated, the registry 220 system may release 420 the BAN 110 or the PAN 115 details to a transaction account/financial transaction processor. These may be proxy account numbers. According to various embodiments, this financial transaction processor or their involvement is not seen by the merchant or the customer.

The payment details may be added to/appended to the transaction request 360 by the registry 220 system host, such as information identifying a source of funding and a individual associated with the source prestored in the registry 220 associated with the received authentication credentials. The original transaction request 360 may include an amount of value to transfer and to whom. The network may complete/transfer the details of the transaction to an issuer and/or acquirer 200. In response to the transaction being completed a memorization of the authorization of the transaction may be communicated to any party to the transaction.

In this way, the the registry 220 system host may act similar to the workings of a traditional point-of-sale device which may combine the cardholder information with transaction information (including total price of sale and merchant identification), and send the combined data set to an acquirer 200 or third-party processor 215. The third-party processor 215 may respond by forwarding the data set to the card association's (e.g., Visa, American Express, etc.) proprietary transaction network, whereby the data set is routed to the issuing bank. The processor 215 may format the combined data set into an ISO message if it is not already in that form.

For instance, the third-party processor 215 may format 440 the PAN message into a ISO 8583 authorization request or an BAN message into 445 an ISO 7812 Funds transfer request. ISO 8583 defines a message format and a communication flow so that different systems can exchange these transaction requests and responses. The vast majority of transactions made at ATMs use ISO 8583 at some point in the communication chain, as do transactions made when a customer uses a card to make a payment in a store electronic fund transfers at a point of sale. ISO 7812 is the international standard that specifies "a numbering system for the identification of issuers of cards that require an issuer identification number (IIN) to operate in international, interindustry and/or intra-industry interchange" and procedures for registering IINs

Upon reception of the data set, the issuing bank checks the proposed financial transaction against a set of credit rules and either approves or denies the financial transaction. If approved, the approval is transmitted to the merchant and/or merchant computer system. Thereafter, the card-issuing bank forwards a monetary sum equal to the sale price to the merchant's bank (typically, a processor is used as an intermediary that forwards the monetary sum to the merchant's bank). At the expiration of the billing period, the cardholder pays the sales price (plus interest and finance charges) to the card-issuing bank.

A user may re-register their mobile device at any time. For instance, a user may re-register their mobile device in the case of upgrading devices or due to mobile device theft or mobile device loss.

The trusted certificate authority 230 and the registry 220 host may be the same entity. The trusted certificate authority 230 and/or the registry 220 host may be a financial institution, such as an issuer/acquirer 200 or the network/processor 215. According to various embodiments the trusted certificate authority 230 and/or the registry 220 host issuer 200 may be operated by the MNO 250 and/or MVNO 250.

The messages described here may conform to the USSD messaging protocol. For instance, each message may be limited to a 182 characters maximum. For instance, the public key 155 may be sent in a first message limited to 182 characters followed by a second message containing additional transaction information. According to various embodiments the private key 125 may be combined with additional information, such as the information which is being encrypted in a single USSD message. These messages may conform to the X509 certificate standard.

The present disclosure is described herein in terms of functional block components, screen shots, optional selections and various processing steps. Such functional blocks are realized by any number of hardware components configured to perform to specified functions. For example, the present disclosure may employ various integrated circuit components (e.g., memory elements, processing elements, logic elements, look-up tables, and the like), which may carry out a variety of functions under the control of one or more microprocessors or other control devices. Similarly, the software elements of the present disclosure can be implemented with any programming or scripting language such as C, C++, Java, COBOL, assembler, PERL, extensible markup language (XML), JavaCard and MULTOS with the various algorithms being implemented with any combination of data

structures, objects, processes, routines or other programming elements. Further, it should be noted that the present disclosure may employ any number of conventional techniques for data transmission, signaling, data processing, network control, and the like. For a basic introduction on cryptography, review a text written by Bruce Schneier entitled "Applied
5 Cryptography: Protocols, Algorithms, and Source Code in C," published by John Wiley & Sons (second edition, 1996), herein incorporated by reference.

In addition, many applications of the present invention could be formulated. The exemplary network disclosed herein may include any system for exchanging data or transacting business, such as the Internet, an intranet, an extranet, WAN, LAN, satellite
10 communications, telephone communication networks, VOIP, NFC and/or the like.

The messages transmitted, such as the appended transaction request messages, as disclosed herein, may be transmitted via NFC protocols, such as through an RFID tag, a transponder and/or an RFID read/write device.

In accordance with another aspect of the present disclosure, an RF transaction using
15 transponder, RFID read/write device, and/or tag (collectively "transaction devices") are secured by limiting the number of transactions which are performed with a particular transaction device. Once the maximum transactions value is reached, the transaction device may automatically disable itself against further usage.

In another exemplary embodiment, the transaction devices in accordance with the
20 present disclosure may further include a transaction counter for recording and reporting the number of transactions performed with the particular transaction device. For a detailed explanation of a suitable counter for use with the disclosure, please refer to commonly-owned U.S. Patent Application No. 10/708,545, entitled "SYSTEM AND METHOD FOR SECURING RF TRANSACTIONS USING A RADIO FREQUENCY IDENTIFICATION
25 DEVICE INCLUDING A TRANSACTIONS COUNTER," filed March 10, 2004, incorporated by reference in its entirety.

References to a SIM card may be referring to a subscriber identity module or subscriber identification module (SIM). A SIM card is an integrated circuit that securely stores the international mobile subscriber identity (IMSI) and the related keys used to identify and authenticate subscribers on mobile telephony devices (such as mobile phones and computers). These keys are for use of the phone on the network and are distinct from Keys described herein for verification of identification transferred and/or associated with a transaction request.

A SIM circuit is embedded into a removable plastic card. This plastic card is called "SIM card" and can be transferred between different mobile devices. SIM cards were first made the same size as a credit card (85.60 mm × 53.98 mm × 0.76 mm). The development of physically smaller mobile devices prompted the development of a smaller SIM card, the mini-SIM card, micro-SIM card and/or Nano-SIM card. Mini-SIM cards have the same thickness as full-size cards, but their length and width are reduced to 25 mm × 15 mm. Micro-SIM cards have the same thickness and contact arrangements as the min-SIM card, but the length and width are further reduced. The Nano-SIM card, which measures 12.3 × 8.8 × 0.67 mm and maintains the existing contact arrangements of prior form factors.

A SIM card may contains its unique serial number (ICCID), international mobile subscriber identity (IMSI), security authentication and ciphering information, temporary information related to the local network, a list of the services the user has access to and two passwords: a personal identification number (PIN) for ordinary use and a personal unblocking code (PUK) for PIN unlocking. SIM cards are not traditionally used in financial transfers.

The system may contemplate a data storage arrangement wherein the header or trailer, or header or trailer history, of the data is stored on the transaction instrument in relation to the appropriate data.

One skilled in the art will also appreciate that, for security reasons, any databases, systems, devices, servers or other components of the system may consist of any combination thereof at a single location or at multiple locations, wherein each database or system includes any of various suitable security features, such as firewalls, access codes, encryption, decryption, compression, decompression, and/or the like.

Encryption may be performed by way of any of the techniques now available in the art or which may become available - e.g., Twofish, RSA, El Gamal, Schorr signature, DSA, PGP, PKI, GPG (GnuPG), and symmetric and asymmetric cryptosystems.

The computing unit of the web client may be further equipped with an Internet browser connected to the Internet or an intranet using standard dial-up, cable, DSL or any other Internet protocol known in the art. Transactions originating at a web client may pass

through a firewall in order to prevent unauthorized access from users of other networks. Further, additional firewalls may be deployed between the varying components of CMS to further enhance security.

The account number may optionally be located on or associated with a rewards account, charge account, credit account, debit account, prepaid account, telephone card, embossed card, smart card, magnetic stripe card, bar code card, transponder, radio frequency card or an associated account.

The system may include or interface with any of the foregoing accounts, devices, and/or a transponder and reader (e.g. RFID reader) in RF communication with the transponder (which may include a fob), or communications between an initiator and a target enabled by near field communications (NFC). The account number may be distributed and stored in any form of plastic, electronic, magnetic, radio frequency, wireless, audio and/or optical device capable of transmitting or downloading data from itself to a second device. A consumer account number may be, for example, a sixteen-digit account number, although each credit provider has its own numbering system, such as the fifteen-digit numbering system used by American Express.

Each company's account numbers comply with that company's standardized format such that the company using a fifteen-digit format will generally use three-spaced sets of numbers, as represented by the number "0000 000000 00000". The first five to seven digits are reserved for processing purposes and identify the issuing bank, account type, etc. In this example, the last (fifteenth) digit is used as a sum check for the fifteen digit number. The intermediary eight-to-eleven digits are used to uniquely identify the consumer. A merchant account number may be, for example, any number or alpha-numeric characters that identify a particular merchant for purposes of account acceptance, account reconciliation, reporting, or the like.

In various embodiments, an account number may identify a consumer. 5 Front-end payment processors have connections to various transaction accounts and supply authorization and settlement services to the merchant banks’ merchants. Back-end payment processors accept settlements from front-end payment processors and, via The Federal Reserve Bank, move money from an issuing bank to the merchant bank. In an operation that will usually take a few seconds, the payment processor will both check the details received
10 by forwarding the details to the respective account’s issuing bank or card association for verification, and may carry out a series of anti-fraud measures against the transaction. Additional parameters, including the account’s country of issue and its previous payment history, may be used to gauge the probability of the transaction being approved. In response to the payment processor receiving confirmation that the transaction account details have
15 been verified, the information may be relayed back to the merchant, who will then complete the payment transaction. In response to the verification being denied, the payment processor relays the information to the merchant, who may then decline the transaction. Phrases similar to a “payment gateway” or “gateway” may include an application service provider service that authorizes payments for e-businesses, online retailers, and/or traditional brick
20 and mortar merchants. The gateway may be the equivalent of a physical point of sale terminal located in most retail outlets. A payment gateway may protect transaction account details by encrypting sensitive information, such as transaction account numbers, to ensure that information passes securely between the customer and the merchant and also between merchant and payment processor.

25 Phrases similar to “vendor software” or “vendor” may include software, hardware and/or a solution provided from an external vendor (e.g., not part of the merchant) to provide value in the payment process (e.g., risk assessment).

CLAIMS

1. A method comprising:
 - associating, by a fraud prevention computer and in an electronic registry, a mobile device user identifier with transaction account information of a mobile device user, a unique
 - 5 SIM card hardware identifier of a SIM card of a mobile device, and a unique mobile device hardware identifier;
 - transmitting, by the fraud prevention computer, public key data to a memory location of the SIM card, wherein the public key data is securely stored in the memory location of the SIM card;
 - 10 transmitting, by the fraud prevention computer, private key data to the memory location of the SIM card, wherein the private key data is securely stored to the memory location of the SIM card;
 - receiving, by the fraud prevention computer, a transaction request message over a mobile network via a transaction application stored to a memory associated with the mobile
 - 15 device, wherein the private key data is appended to the transaction request message to create a signed message, and wherein the public key data is appended to the signed message by the transaction application;
 - verifying, by the fraud prevention computer, that the public key is correct;
 - validating, by the fraud prevention computer, by comparing the mobile device
 - 20 hardware identifier captured with the transaction request message with expected mobile device hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry and associated with the received public key;
 - validating, by the fraud prevention computer, by comparing the SIM card hardware identifier information captured with the transaction request message with expected SIM card
 - 25 hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry and associated with the received public key;
 - verifying, by the fraud prevention computer, that the private key data is correct;
 - appending, by the fraud prevention computer, transaction account information of the mobile device user to the transaction request message; and
 - 30 transmitting, by the fraud prevention computer, the appended transaction request to a processor for authorization.

2. The method of claim 1, wherein the transaction account information is not stored to the memory coupled to the mobile device.

3. The method of claim 1, wherein at least one of the SIM card hardware identifier information and the mobile device hardware identifier captured during transmitting of the transaction request message via the mobile device are captured by a mobile network operator.

4. The method of claim 1, wherein the SIM card hardware identifier information comprises an international Mobile subscriber identity (IMSI) code.

5. The method of claim 1, wherein the mobile device hardware identifier comprises an international Mobile Equipment Identity (IMEI) code.

6. The method of claim 1, further comprising validating, by the fraud prevention computer, by comparing mobile device location information captured with the transaction request message with expected mobile device location information stored in the electronic registry and associated with the received public key.

7. The method of claim 6, wherein the mobile device location information captured during transmitting of the transaction request message via the mobile device are captured by a mobile network operator.

8. The method of claim 6, wherein the mobile device location information comprises a Mobile Subscriber Integrated Services Digital Network Number (MSISDN).

9. The method of claim 1, further comprising requesting the mobile device user enter a user passcode prior to accessing the transaction application.

10. The method of claim 1, further comprising storing the transaction application to the memory associated with the mobile device.

11. The method of claim 1, wherein the transaction processor formats the appended transaction request message into International organization for standardization format.

12. The method of claim 1, wherein an issuer receives the transmitted appended
5 request to a transaction processor for authorization decisioning.

13. The method of claim 1, wherein the transaction application locates the mobile device hardware identifier from an operating system of the mobile device.

10 14. The method of claim 1, further comprising pre-provisioning a secure memory location of the SIM card for receiving at least one of the public key data and the private key data prior to issuing the SIM card for use on a mobile network.

15 15. The method of claim 1, further comprising presenting government issued identification in concert with providing at least one of the unique mobile device hardware identifier to a registry and providing the unique SIM card hardware identifier to the electronic registry.

20 16. The method of claim 1, further comprising at least one of providing the unique mobile device hardware identifier to the electronic registry and providing the unique SIM card hardware identifier to the electronic registry.

25 17. The method of claim 1, wherein a trusted certificate authority working with the mobile network operator transmits at least one of the private key data and the public key data to the memory location of the SIM card.

18. The method of claim 1, further comprising:
transmitting, by the fraud prevention computer and to the transaction application, at least one of:
30 that the public key is incorrect,
that the mobile device hardware identifier is incorrect,
that the SIM card hardware identifier information is incorrect,
that the private key is incorrect, and

displaying, via the mobile device, a message indicating that the transaction will not proceed.

19. An article of manufacture including a non-transitory, tangible computer readable storage medium having instructions stored thereon that, in response to execution by a computer-based system, cause the fraud prevention computer-based system to perform operations comprising:

associating, by the computer-based system and in an electronic registry, a mobile device user identifier with transaction account information of the mobile device user, a unique SIM card hardware identifier of a SIM card of a mobile device, and unique mobile device hardware identifier ;

transmitting, by the computer-based system, public key data to a memory location of the SIM card, wherein the public key data is securely stored in the memory location of the SIM card;

transmitting, by the computer-based system, private key data to the memory location of the SIM card, wherein the private key data is securely stored to the memory location of the SIM card;

receiving, by the computer-based system, a transaction request message over a mobile network via a transaction application stored to a memory associated with the mobile device, wherein the private key data is appended to the transaction request message to create a signed message, wherein the public key data is appended to the signed message by the transaction application;

verifying, by the computer-based system, that the public key is correct;

validating, by the computer-based system, by comparing the mobile device hardware identifier captured with the transaction request message with expected mobile device hardware identifier information stored in an electronic registry and associated with the received public key;

validating, by the computer-based system, by comparing the SIM card hardware identifier information captured with the transaction request message with expected SIM card hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry and associated with the received public key;

verifying, by the computer-based system, that the private key is correct;

appending, by the computer-based system, transaction account information of the mobile device user to the transaction request message; and

transmitting, by the computer-based system, the appended transaction request to a processor for authorization.

5

20. A system comprising:

a tangible, non-transitory memory communicating with a processor,

the tangible, non-transitory memory having instructions stored thereon that, in response to execution by the processor, cause a fraud prevention processor to perform

10 operations comprising:

associating, by the processor and in an electronic registry,

a mobile device user identifier with transaction account information of the mobile device user,

a unique SIM card hardware identifier of a SIM card of a mobile device, and

15 a unique mobile device hardware identifier ;

transmitting, by the processor, public key data to a memory location of the SIM card, wherein the public key data is securely stored in the memory location of the SIM card;

transmitting, by the processor, private key data to the memory location of the SIM card, wherein the private key data is securely stored to the memory location of the SIM card;

20 receiving, by the processor, a transaction request message over a mobile network via a transaction application stored to a memory associated with the mobile device, wherein a private key is appended to the transaction request message to create a signed message, wherein a public key is appended to the signed message by the transaction application;

verifying, by the processor, that the public key is correct;

25 validating, by the processor, by comparing the mobile device hardware identifier captured with the transaction request message with expected mobile device hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry and associated with the received public key;

30 validating, by the processor, by comparing the SIM card hardware identifier information captured with the transaction request message with expected SIM card hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry and associated with the received public key;

appending, by the processor, transaction account information of the mobile device user to the transaction request message; and

transmitting, by the processor, the appended transaction request to a transaction processor for authorization.

providing, by the mobile network operator computer, the intercepted the device hardware identifier information and the SIM card hardware identifier to the registry host for
30 verification, wherein the registry host compares the mobile device hardware identifier information intercepted with the transmitted transaction request message with the expected mobile device hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry associated with the mobile device and the SIM card hardware identifier information intercepted with

the transmitted transaction request message with expected SIM card hardware identifier information stored in the electronic registry associated with the mobile device.

22. The method of claim 21, wherein the transaction account information is not
5 stored to a memory coupled to the mobile device.

23. The method of claim 21, further comprising transmitting, by the mobile network operator computer, the mobile transaction request from the mobile device over the mobile network to the trusted certificate authority for verification of a private key associated with
10 the mobile transaction request.

24. The method of claim 21, wherein the SIM card hardware identifier information comprises an International Mobile Subscriber Identity (IMSI) code.

15 25. The method of claim 21, wherein the mobile device hardware identifier information comprises an International Mobile Equipment Identity (IMEI) code.

26. The method of claim 21, further comprising intercepting, by the mobile network operator computer, mobile device location information of the mobile device transmitting the
20 mobile transaction request.

27. The method of claim 26, wherein the mobile device location information comprises a Mobile Subscriber Integrated Services Digital Network Number (MSISDN).

The method of claim 26, further comprising providing, the mobile network operator computer, the intercepted mobile device location information to the registry host for verification, wherein the registry host compares the mobile device location information intercepted with the transmitted transaction request message with expected mobile device location information stored in the electronic registry associated with the mobile device.
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29. The method of claim 21, further comprising receiving, by the mobile network operator computer, the transmitted transaction request message from a transaction application of the mobile device.

30. The method of claim 23, wherein the verified transmitted transaction request message is appended with the transaction account information.

5 31. The method of claim 30, further comprising transmitting, by the mobile network operator computer, the mobile device location information appended transaction request message to a transaction processor for authorization.

10 32. The method of claim 31, wherein the transaction processor formats the mobile device hardware identifier appended transaction request message into International organization for standardization format.

15 33. The method of claim 31, wherein an issuer receives the appended transaction request message for authorization decisioning.

20 34. The method of claim 21, further comprising pre-provisioning, by the mobile network operator computer, a secure memory location of the SIM card for receiving at least one of the public key and the private key information prior to issuing the SIM card for use on the mobile network.

25 35. The method of claim 21, further comprising reviewing government issued identification presented by a user of the mobile device prior to providing at least one of the unique mobile device hardware identifier to the electronic registry and providing the unique SIM card hardware identifier to the electronic registry.

30 36. The method of claim 21, wherein the trusted certificate authority working with a mobile network operator transmits at least one of private key data and public key data to a secure memory location of the SIM card.

2. The method of claim 1, wherein the transaction account information is not stored to the memory coupled to the mobile device.

3. The method of claim 1, wherein at least one of the SIM card hardware identifier information and the mobile device hardware identifier captured during transmitting of the transaction request message via the mobile device are captured by a mobile network operator.

4. The method of claim 1, wherein the SIM card hardware identifier information comprises an international Mobile subscriber identity (IMSI) code.

5. The method of claim 1, wherein the mobile device hardware identifier comprises an international Mobile Equipment Identity (IMEI) code.

6. The method of claim 1, further comprising validating, by the fraud prevention computer, by comparing mobile device location information captured with the transaction request message with expected mobile device location information stored in the electronic registry and associated with the received public key.

7. The method of claim 6, wherein the mobile device location information captured during transmitting of the transaction request message via the mobile device are captured by a mobile network operator.

8. The method of claim 6, wherein the mobile device location information comprises a Mobile Subscriber Integrated Services Digital Network Number (MSISDN).

9. The method of claim 1, further comprising requesting the mobile device user enter a user passcode prior to accessing the transaction application.

10. The method of claim 1, further comprising storing the transaction application to the memory associated with the mobile device.

11. The method of claim 1, wherein the transaction processor formats the appended transaction request message into International organization for standardization format.

12. The method of claim 1, wherein an issuer receives the transmitted appended request to a transaction processor for authorization decisioning.
- 5 13. The method of claim 1, wherein the transaction application locates the mobile device hardware identifier from an operating system of the mobile device.
14. The method of claim 1, further comprising pre-provisioning a secure memory location of the SIM card for receiving at least one of the public key data and the private key data prior
10 to issuing the SIM card for use on a mobile network.
15. The method of claim 1, further comprising presenting government issued identification in concert with providing at least one of the unique mobile device hardware identifier to a registry and providing the unique SIM card hardware identifier to the electronic
15 registry.
16. The method of claim 1, further comprising at least one of providing the unique mobile device hardware identifier to the electronic registry and providing the unique SIM card hardware identifier to the electronic registry.

19. An article of manufacture including a non-transitory, tangible computer readable storage medium having instructions stored thereon that, in response to execution by a computer-based system, cause the fraud prevention computer-based system to perform operations comprising:

associating, by the computer-based system and in an electronic registry, a mobile device user identifier with transaction account information of the mobile device user, a unique SIM card hardware identifier of a SIM card of a mobile device, and unique mobile device hardware identifier ;

transmitting, by the computer-based system, public key data to a memory location of the SIM card, wherein the public key data is securely stored in the memory location of the SIM card;

transmitting, by the computer-based system, private key data to the memory location of the SIM card, wherein the private key data is securely stored to the memory location of the SIM card;

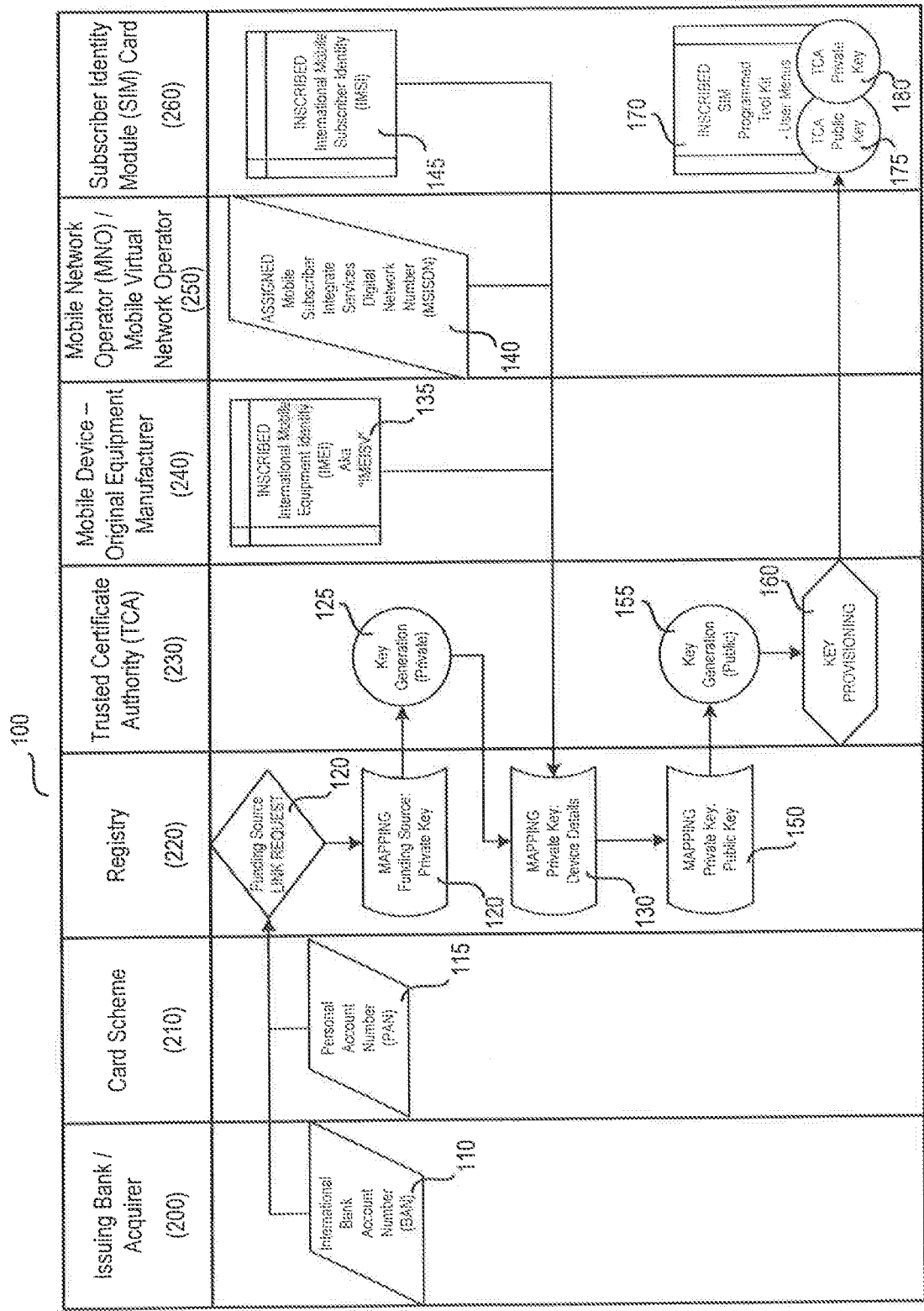

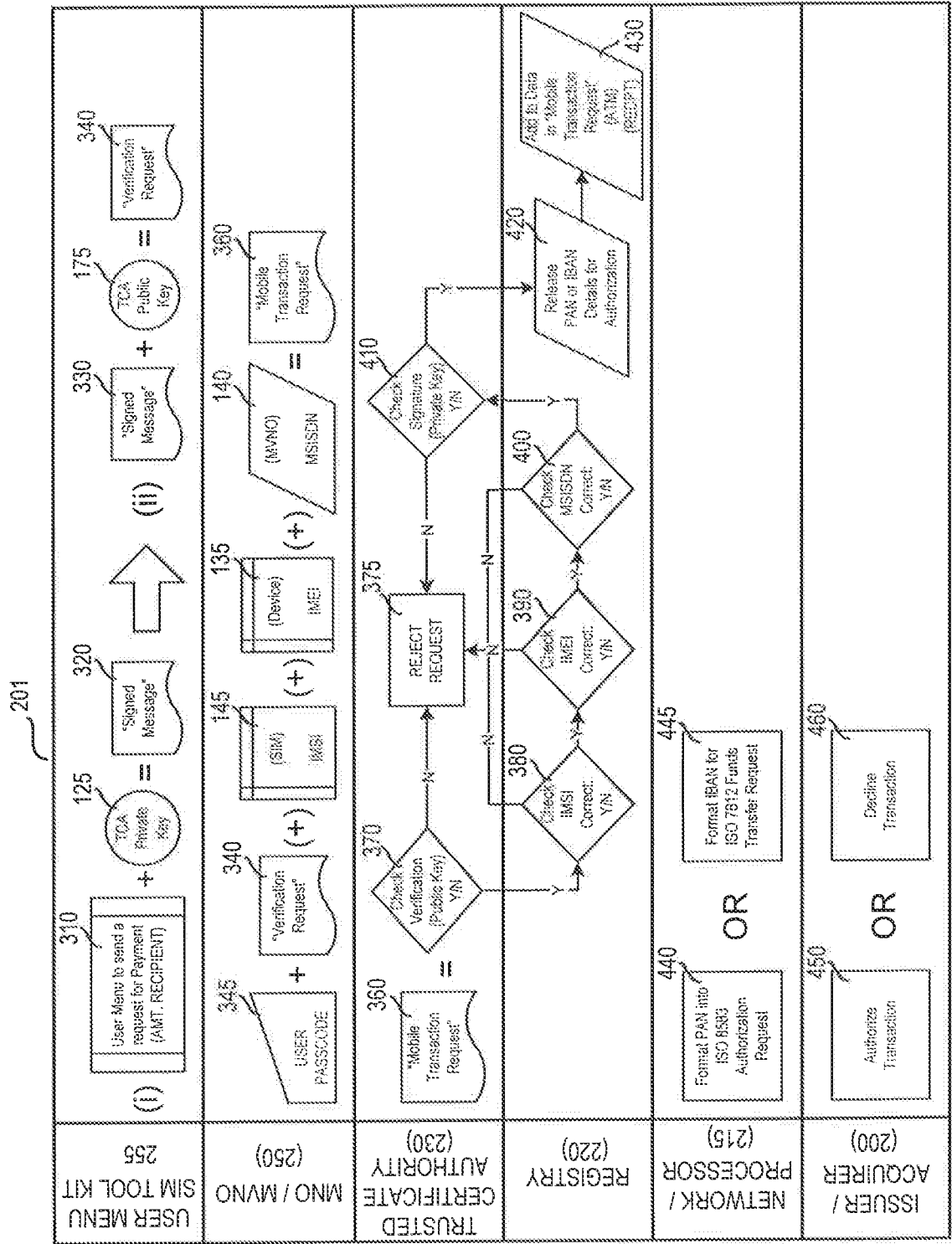
