



DESIGN FOR A BADGE.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 16,670, dated May 4, 1886.

Application filed March 5, 1886. Serial No. 194,172. Term of patent 3½ years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK W. CHILD, of Greenwich, in the county of Fairfield, State of Connecticut, have invented a new and original Design for Badges, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, making part of this specification, in which a face view of my newly-designed badge is shown.

10 The leading feature of my design consists in the Maltese-cross shape of the badge, the representation of the base-ball, crossed bats and the base-ball cap on the badge, and the cross-bar.

15 The badge *a* has the shape of a Maltese cross, and has a roughened background and a beaded edge.

20 *b* represents the base-ball at the center of the badge; *c*, crossed bats, the intersection of which is covered by the ball *b*.

d is the base-ball player's cap in the bottom end of the cross.

m is the cross-bar.

Having thus described my design, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent— 25

The herein-described design for badges, the same consisting of the Maltese-cross shape of the badge, a roughened background and beaded edge, the bats, and base-ball player's cap, substantially as shown and described. 30
