IMPROVEMENT IN COMPOUNDS FOR THE CURE OF COLIC AND BOTTS IN HORSES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 125,933, dated April 23, 1872.

SPECIFICATION.

Specification describing a certain Compound called "Remedy for Colic and Botts," invented by THOMAS BURNS, of the town of Richmond, county of Jefferson, State of Ohio; to be used in severe cases of colic or botts in horses.

The nature of the invention of said BURNS consists of four parts of tincture of opium, four parts of sage-sirup, four parts tincture of aloes, two parts spirits niter, one part of sulphuric ether, four parts of oil of turpentine, and eight parts of ninety-eight per cent. alcohol. Shake well before using. Give two ounces. If relief is not given in thirty minutes repeat the dose. Follow the first dose by bleeding freely in the mouth. In very severe cases it will be necessary to bleed in the neck-

vein; and especially where there is danger of inflammation of the bowels it is good practice from the commencement to back-rake and follow with injections. Injections may consist of two gallons of warm water, a pint of salt, and a half-pint of soap; to be replenished if necessary.

I claim as the invention of the said THOMAS BURNS—

A compound composed of the above ingredients, substantially in the proportions and for the purpose set forth.
