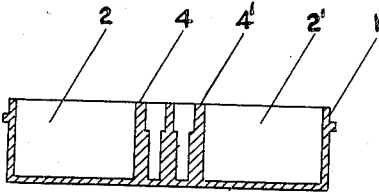

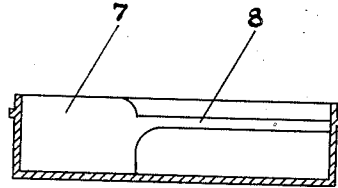

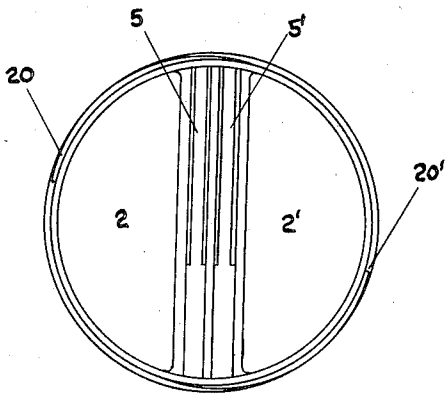

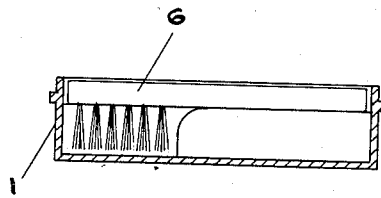

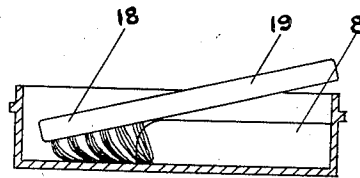

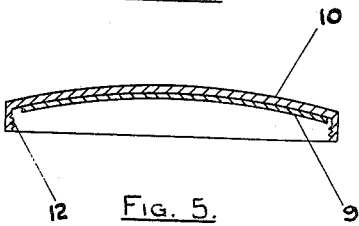

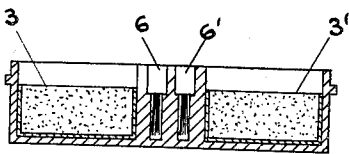

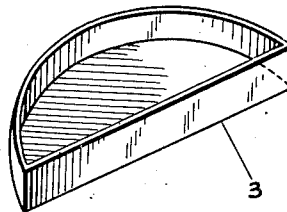

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COSMETIC CONTAINER

This invention relates to a container primarily for holding eyelash cosmetic with brush, or brushes, mirror, and protecting mirror pad, and is characterised by providing in the container two self contained compartments to be charged or filled with the cosmetic preparation.

Through this form of cosmetic having to be applied by damping, or dipping one of the brushes forming part of the outfit into water, then rubbing the cake of preparation with the wet brush to collect a portion of the cosmetic, naturally this action leaves the cake damp and partly soft and it is to obviate this disadvantage that two compartments are provided to allow time for the damp, or partly soft cake to dry and harden and use on the next application from the dry cake in the second compartment, thereby insuring that a more uniform consistency of preparation is collected to give a perfect and even covering to the eyelash, a very important essential in the art of this form of beauty treatment.

A further object is to facilitate the speed and accuracy of applying this form of cosmetic to the eyelash and to give greater protection to the eyes, especially to those with weaker eyesight, and to enable every eyelash to be perfectly and evenly covered with this form of cosmetic by fitting the lid of the container with a convex lens, to magnify the eye and eyelash instead of the ordinary mirror common to all other eyelash cosmetic make-up containers, these ordinary mirrors make it more exacting to undertake this delicate form of make-up.

A further feature of this invention is the provision for two brushes one for applying the preparation wet and the other for removing any superfluous preparation which may have been left on the eyelashes after application and to cause each eyelash to be properly and naturally separated and so avoid all the thick and clogged appearance so usual in this form of cosmetic. Both the brushes are housed in self contained compartments so that they are protected from each other and each may have a distinctive mark or colour to distinguish their respective use.

An embodiment of the present invention is illustrated in the accompanying drawing, wherein:

Fig. 1 is a section of the case with cover removed.

Fig. 2 is a plan of the case empty.

Fig. 3 is a sectional side view.

Fig. 4 is a section showing brush in position.

Fig. 5 is a section of lid and magnifying mirror.

Fig. 6 is a side view of protecting pad.

Fig. 7 is a side section of case with brush pressed down.

Fig. 8 is a section through the case showing pans for the material and brushes in their respective compartments.

Fig. 9 is a perspective view of one cake of material.

Referring to the drawing the container comprises a circular case 1, divided into two compartments 2, 2' for holding pans containing cakes of cosmetic preparation 3 and 3' by central partitions 4, 4', which also forms the rack 5, 5' for holding or seating the two brushes 6, 6', each brush is protected from each other by a central web 7, and a platform 8 is provided for the handle portion of the brushes 6, 6', to rest on, so that the outer edges of the brushes are flush with the height of the body portion of the case 1.

The central partition and rack may be moulded, cast, pressed, or built up in one piece in any suitable material such as Bakelite, urea, or other plastic moulding material, or materials and pressed into the case, or the whole body of case partition and rack may be moulded in one piece as shown in Figs. 1, 2, 3, 4, 7 and Fig. 8 in the accompanying drawing.

The magnifying mirror 9 is pressed or glued into lid 10 Fig. 5, and a protecting disc 11 Fig. 6, fits loosely into the lid portion 10 for keeping the mirror 9 free from the cosmetic in pans 3, 3' Fig. 8.

This protecting disc 11 is provided with a finger grip or tag 15 projecting around from each side of the disc to facilitate its removal and replacement.

This disc 11 may be made of any suitable material; one preferred is a form of blotting paper with the underface 16, waterproofed and the upper face 17, left absorbent. This upper face may be embossed or printed with a design, trade-mark or directions for using the cosmetic outfit.

To facilitate removal of each brush it is intended the user will press the head of the brush 18 downwards with the finger nail as shown in Fig. 7, in this way it levers the handle 19, into a position handy for removal. The lid 10 is held on the body of the case 1 by a two threaded screw 20 and 20' Fig. 2.

What I claim as my invention is:

1. A cosmetic container comprising two self-contained compartments for holding pans of eyelash cosmetic preparation intended to be used alternately to facilitate drying, two central self contained compartments for holding two brushes for applying and removing the preparation, a

magnifying mirror to enlarge the eyelash fixed in the lid of the container, a protecting damp proof embossed disc for keeping the mirror free from the cosmetic.

5 2. A cosmetic container according to claim 1, a rack for holding or seating two brushes in the central compartment, a central web for separating each brush and a platform for the handle portion to rest on.

10 3. A cosmetic container according to claim 1, a

rack for holding or seating two brushes in the central compartment, a central web for separating each brush and a platform for the handle portion to rest on and in which the mirror protecting discs underface in contact with the preparation is made damp proof and the upper face embossed with the directions in contact with the mirror and a finger grip attached to facilitate removal.

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
